HOW TO AVOID SUNBURN

Did you know that the vegetable
fibers, cotton or linen, transmit the
rays of the sun and produce sun-
burn, while wool or silk keeps the
skin underneath from tanning?

This was proved recently in ex-
periments made by the Kansas State
Agricultural College. Girls wishing
to avoid sunburn should wear light
weight woollens and silks but if you
wish the full value of the ultra vio-
let life giving rays cotton or linen
is the material to wear in summer.

TO CIRCUMVENT THE MOTH

The best way to prevent moths
from injuring woolen garments is to
spray them with one of the new
prepared mixtures, both odorless
and colorless. The worms just won't
eat wool which has been so sprayed.

BLACKBERRY ROLY POLY

- 3 cups blackberries
- 3-4 cup sugar
- 1 1-2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1-2 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon shortening
- Milk

Sift the flour, baking powder and
salt into bowl, add the shortening
and rub in very lightly with the tips
of the fingers; add enough milk to
hold together. Roll out on floured
board one quarter inch thick; cover
with the blackberries and sugar; roll
the same as jelly roll. Put into bake
dish that has been brushed with
butter; brush the top of roll with
milk and sprinkle with sugar; cover
the dish and bake 25 minutes; re-
move the cover and bake 20 minutes
or until nicely browned.

BLACKBERRY WHIP

- 1 cup blackberry juice
 - 1 cup water
 - 1-4 cup sugar
 - 1 tablespoon granulated gelatin
- Bring the cup of water to a boil;
dissolve the gelatin which has been
soaked in 2 tablespoons of cold water
10 minutes; then add the blackberry
juice and sugar. Pour the mixture
into bowl; set into pan of cold water
and whip until it begins to form;
then put into ice cream glasses and
place 1 marshmallow on top.

STEWED BLACKBERRIES

- 1 quart blackberries
 - 1 cup water
 - 1 cup sugar
- Rinse the blackberries; add the
sugar and water; a few grains of
salt and boil 10 minutes.

BLACKBERRY JAM

Put the blackberries into preserv-
ing kettle on moderate fire until
soft. When the juice begins to run
mash through wire strainer and to
each cup of strained blackberry add
1-2 cup of sugar; return to the fire
and boil 25 minutes. Remove the
scum and stir occasionally. Pour
into sterilized, wide mouthed bottles
or glasses. Cover with wax and
paper.

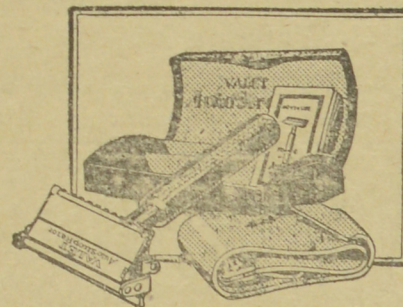
