

SAYS ENGLISH HARVEST HANDS GOT ALONG WELL

**Mr. Murray Patterson
Home From a Trip to
Western Canada —
Helped to Harvest
Bumper Grain Crop.**

Mr. Murray Patterson, former city marshal, who went west with the first harvest excursion in August, returned home yesterday. Mr. Patterson secured employment at Craig, in the Province of Saskatchewan and being experienced in farm work he found the work most congenial. In the district where he worked the yield per acre was twenty-eight bushels.

Mr. Patterson says that the western wheat crop this year smashed all records. The harvesters who went from the East he said, had no difficulty in securing employment. The weather conditions were very favorable and the crop was harvested in good condition.

Mr. Patterson says that he came into contact with quite a number of the miners who came out from the Old Country to work in the harvest fields. He said that while they knew very little about harvesting grain in this respect they were no different from scores of men who went from Eastern Canada. They were as a rule husky young fellows, and were not only willing to learn but willing to work. After a few days experience they seemed to get along all right. He said that quite a number of the Britishers were willing to remain in Canada providing they could obtain employment during the winter months.

When on his way East Mr. Patterson stopped off a few days at Winnipeg and visited his son, who is a resident of that city.

FLOUR THIEVES BEING TRIED IN DEVON COURT

**Trial of Four Men For
Theft of Bags of Flour
at Hawkshaw attracts
Attention—Case Now
On.**

The case against the four men who were arrested last week by Provincial Police constables, charged with breaking into and stealing several bags of flour from the store of Thomas Brewer, Hawkshaw grocer, was resumed in the Devon police court this morning before Magistrate Haines, after having been adjourned from yesterday afternoon. Evidence was given at this morning's hearing by Sergeant John Bird of the Provincial police and constable Grey, who assisted in the capture of the men following the break. Thomas Brewer, proprietor of the store, Jesse Stairs, one of the four arrested. The case is being resumed this afternoon at 2.30 o'clock when it is expected that the case will be finished.

Following his alleged assault on a local garage employee Clark made his way to St. John by auto. 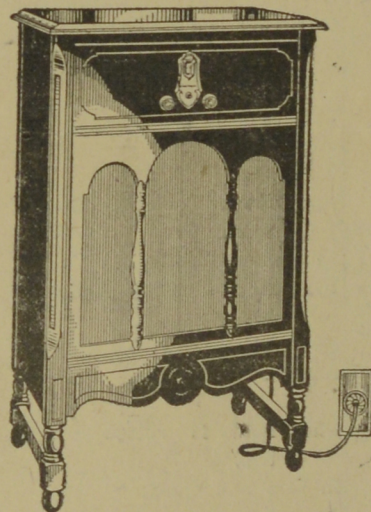
