More than one hundred and fifty years ago a man by the name of George Anson made a voyage around the world. It took him three years and nine months to make the trip. There were no steamboats or railway trains in those days. Anson kept a record of his trip and concluded it by writing:

"Thus was this expedition finished after having strongly evinced this important truth, that though prudence, intrepidity and perseverance united are not exempt from the blows of adverse fortune, yet in a long series of transactions they usually rise superior to its power and in the end rarely fail of proving successful."

That was reasoning based on experience. He knew that he could not escape the blows of misfortune. But he proved that certain human qualities adhered to will generally win in the end whatever the trials, what ever the blows.

MR. FULTON SPOKE TO NORTH SHORE GYROS

Campbellton, Feb. 20—In a speech before the Campbellton Gyro Club at their regular weekly dinner here this evening, R. G. Fulton, chairman of the N. B. Liquor Control Board, reviewed the chief features of the Intoxicating Liquor Act of 1927 explained briefly how the law was being enforced and claimed conditions were improved as a result of this enforcement. During his address, Mr. Fulton declared that the present law was the best liquor law New Brunswick ever had.

The speaker told of how a few men in this province had been growing fabulously wealthy through illicit traffic in liquor. He contended that it was a great deal better to grapple with this problem and convert this revenue to the use of the province and for the good of the people. Mr. Fulton declared that the liquor stores operated by the government did not create new trade in liquor. The trade, he said, had always been there but this law was forcing people to buy liquor openly.

Mr. Fulton said the percentage of persons who bought liquor just to get drunk was relatively small. The majority of the patrons were prominent people, people who were prominent on church lists, and in the pews and leaders in various branches of community work.
