TOMMY BERRY HAS 28 HORSES IN TRAINING

New Jersey Trainer is Kept Busy with Large Stable — Has Peter Manning 1.56 $\frac{3}{4}$, Guy Watts and Many Others.

Macon, Ga., Feb. 20—Tommy Berry, the young man from New Jersey who drove Guy McKinney his four year old record trotting mile of 1.58 $\frac{3}{4}$ last Thanksgiving day, is being kept on the jump at the mile track here with 28 performers in training. All but two are the property of the Hanover Shoe Farms of Hanover, Pa., for which he trains.

Included in the lot are several promising futurity candidates. They are the three year olds Kentucky, Hiram Dillon, Miss Bertha Worthy and Foster Dillon, all eligible to this year's Hambletonian stake, the Kentucky Derby of the trotting turf, and other rich engagements, and the two-year-olds, Miss Bertha Hanover, Chestnut Hanover, Jim Hanover, Miss Hanover, Madam Hanover, Czar Hanover, Kahla Hanover, Harrison Hanover, Mary Hanover and Bonnie Hanover.

Sixteen of Berry's pupils are by Dillon Axworthy, the Hanover Farms' noted futurity sire. The remainder of his stable consists of the world champion trotter, Peter Manning, 1.56 $\frac{3}{4}$; Guy Watts 2.04 $\frac{1}{4}$ the property of A. T. Cole of Wheaton, Ill.; Dean Etawah, 2.08 $\frac{3}{4}$, owned by A. S. Case of Three Bridges, N. J.; Zombro Dillon 2.04 $\frac{1}{4}$; Bennett 2.03 $\frac{1}{4}$ Mr. Hanna, 2.08; Micro Dillon, Just Dillon, Roma Dillon and the three year olds, Stevens Dillon, Kahla Dillon, Julia Dillon and Ulysses Dillon. Bennett is the only pacer in the string.

QUEBEC BEAVERS HOLD LEAGUE LEADERS TO TIE

Third place Beavers hold Boston to 1 to 1 Tie in Drive for Top—Beavers Have Won Seven Out of Last Eight.

Boston, Feb. 20—Boston Tigers were unable to beat the Quebec Beavers in the Canadian-American Hockey League last night at the Arena, but they did manage to hold the Canadians to a tie score, 1 to 1 after 70 minutes of play, which is some accomplishment, considering the success the Beavers have been having the last two weeks.

The Tigers scored in the first period on a long shot by Eddie Burke, that sent the rubber hurtling between goalie Lamontague's pads, and Larocche evened it up in the second period, taking a pass from Gariepy which was a forward, and beating Rheume.

The Beavers had won seven games and tied one of the last eight games previous to last night, and therefore were somewhat of a threat to the leading Tigers. They played fast hockey but the defensive tactics of Tigers kept them from getting more than one goal in a game that saw the teams battling with might and main and the Beavers apparently were getting a tie, which strengthened their hold on third place in the race.

URBAN SHOCKER HAS RETIRED FROM DIAMOND.

New York, Feb. 20—Urban Shocker, veteran right-handed pitcher of the Yankees, apparently has ended his 12-year career of major league baseball by voluntary retirement, but officials of the Yankees means it or not.

The announcement came in a telegram to Business Manager Ed Barrow of the World's Champions in which Shocker said he was retiring "for the furtherance of my business interests at home."



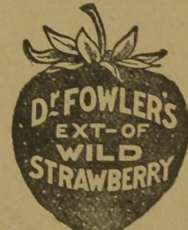
