Its length, however, was regulated according to no fixed principle the matter being left to the pontiffs and some times more days were added to prolong the term of a certain magistrate or several were shaved off to hasten the elections.

How it Happened.

Caesar then did away with the lunar year and the intercalary month and fixed his year entirely by the sun. Its mean length was 365 1/4 days the quarters were collected together for an extra day once in four years making the fourth year 366 days. February being the shortest month received the extra day between the 24th and the 25th. The 25th was

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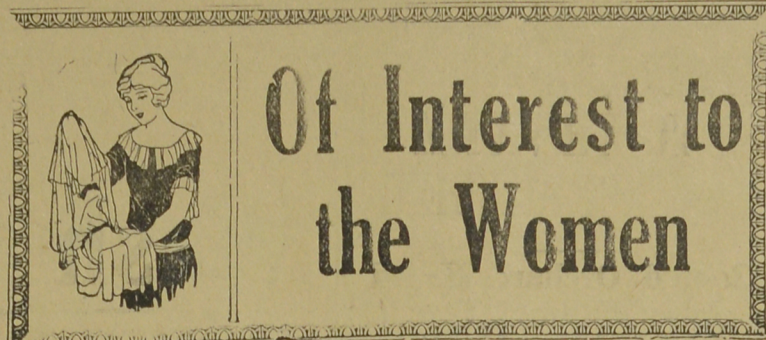

CORDUROY COATS FOR SPORTS WEAR.

Have you ever wondered whether corduroy would some day be smart rather than simply a serviceable material for sports knickers and little boys' suits? HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

"I take my husband's shirts that are worn around the collar band" writes Mrs. M. G. S. "and turn top to bottom and make my little boy creepers and pay aprons out of them. I also do the same with my house aprons when the bottom of the apron is still good and strong."

"A pair of inexpensive window drapes may be made from five yards of unbleached cotton at about 20 cents a yard a package of transfer patterns at 20 cents and a set of colored wax crayons at 20 cents. When the material is cut the required length for the curtains there will be enough remaining for a dresser cover. Stamp the designed pattern on the cloth, then trace heavily with the desired colored crayons and after placing the finished work between six layers of paper press with medium hot iron. The experiment will be interesting and the result delightful—Mrs. E. H. P.

"I wet the rim and inside well of a cooking dish which is sticky or likely to be hard to wash, then turn the utensil upside down on the table or drainboard. I do this before I sit down to dinner" writes Mrs. J. R. "then by the time I am ready to do dishes I find they wash as easily as any of the china dishes. This has the advantage of making the rim wash easily which is not so true of the utensil when filled with water and left standing around."

"After washing my linoleum" writes Mrs. S. E. R. "I put a little floor wax on a wool cloth which I put on my dust mop and polish the floor with this. It has not only preserved it but the linoleum looks better than when I first got it over a year ago."

QUICK CHOCOLATE CAKE.

One tablespoon butter, 1 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1 teaspoon baking powder 1-4 teaspoon salt, 1 cup flour, 3-4 cup milk, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla, 2 squares unsweetened chocolate.

Cream butter and sugar. Add beaten egg yolk. Sift baking powder salt and flour, and add to the butter mixture together with milk. Flavor. Stir in beaten egg white.

Bake in a greased loaf tin in a moderate oven. Ice when cold.

MOCHA ICING.

One tablespoon butter 1 tablespoon cocoa, 1 cup confectioners sugar 2 tablespoons coffee 1-2 teaspoon vanilla.

Cream butter, cocoa and sugar. Add coffee and vanilla. Mix until smooth and spread on top of cake.

CHOCOLATE COOKIES.

One half cup butter or butter substitute, 1 cup sugar, 1 egg, well beaten, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 2 ounces chocolate melted 2 1/2 scant cups flour 2 teaspoons baking powder 1-4 cup milk.

Cream the shortening, add sugar gradually, egg, salt and chocolate. Beat well and add flour and baking powder sifted together, alternately with milk. Chill, roll thin then shape with a small cutter first dipped in flour and bake in a hot oven.

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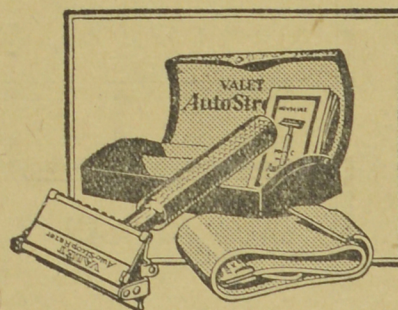
