THE KRASSIN HOPES TO RESCUE THE SIX MEN CARRIED AWAY ON THE DIRIGIBLE ITALIA

Moscow, July 16—With all refugee explorers and rescuers saved from the barren coasts and icy waters around Spitzbergen, the Soviet rescue expedition is turning its attention towards the forlorn hope that the six men carried away in the balloon portion of the dirigible Italia may be found alive and that Raold Amundsen and his missing companions may also be discovered in that vicinity.

The Russian ice-breaker Krassin, the 10,000 ton vessel which last week rescued seven survivors of General Umberto Nobile's expedition, today was heading toward Advent Bay to refuel for the attempt to locate trace of the 12 men whose fate is yet in doubt.

The Krassin reported today by radio that late last night she took aboard the Russian aviator Chukhnovsky and the four men who were with him when he made a forced landing near Cape Pleten after discovering Captains Zappi and Mariano on their ice-berg. The Krassin also took aboard three Italians and a Norwegian guide by the name of Noiss who had been put ashore by the Norwegian ice-

breaker Braganza to bring out the Chukhnovsky party.

Soviet government circles do not try to conceal their delight at the record made by their big ship in the Arctic drama, now nearing its end. Without disparaging the heroic work of Finnish, Norwegian and Italian aviators, they lay emphasis on the fact that the Krassin has taken 15 men off the ice against five rescued by all other expeditions combined.

The five were General Nobile, Lieut. Lundborg, Captain Sora and his dog driver, Van Dongen and Varming.

All other known survivors of the Nobile expedition as well as the men picked up today at Cape Platen, found safely aboard the Krassin.

All the rescued Italians now aboard the Krassin, will be transferred as quickly as possible to the Citta Di Milano. This was decided today by the Soviet rescue commission after a request to that effect had been received from General Nobile. The Krassin will coal at Advent Bay and then proceed to some convenient harbor to meet the Citta di Milano and effect the transfer.

QUEBEC MAY CURTAIL OUTPUT OF NEWSPRINT

Montreal, July 16—Ontario and Quebec will soon conclude a definite agreement with a view of putting an end to the overproduction of paper, which has resulted in falling prices, affecting the present and future of this vital national industry.

Today at the provincial government offices, Hon. L. A. Taschereau, Premier of Quebec, had a lengthy conversation with Hon. William Finlayson, Minister of Lands in Ontario. The Honorable Mercier, Minister of Lands and Forests in Quebec and Gustave C. Piche, chief engineer of the department was present at the interview.

Though not wishing to commit himself, Mr. Taschereau, after both Ministers' departure, made the following statement.

"The overproduction of paper in both provinces is enormous. Prices have fallen considerably. The time has come for both provinces to come to a mutual understanding. Hon. Mr. Finlayson and Hon. Mr. Mercier have discussed the question before our chief engineer and myself. Mr. Finlayson has full power to come to an agreement. Both governments see the problem from exactly the same angle.

"In the very near future, our common decisions will be announced to the public. Should it be necessary—though I do not think it will be—we might wait until Hon. Mr. Ferguson's return from Europe. But something quite satisfactory is bound to come out of our conversation on the matter."

Charlottetown, July 16—Hurrying on to board a branch line train at Emerald Junction this afternoon, Mrs. Michael Crocken, 65, resident of this city, stepped in front of a regular main line train, and was instantly killed. Her husband was only a few steps behind. Father Basil Crocken of Lot 65, is a son of the dead woman.

INVESTIGATION SURE

Rome, July 16—That there will be a full inquiry into the causes of the disaster to General Umberto Nobile's polar dirigible the Italia, is taken for granted in official circles here. It was stated that this inquiry will be conducted as soon as practicable and that an early and full investigation would be to the general's own interest.

The report in the Stockholm newspaper Dageblat that General Nobile is held on the base ship Citta di Milano as virtually a captive of the Italian government is scoffed at here.

Intimations in Russian newspapers, that the leader of the expedition abandoned his men, is treated here as a piece of scurrilous libel.

The point is that the general is too ill yet to give a report.
