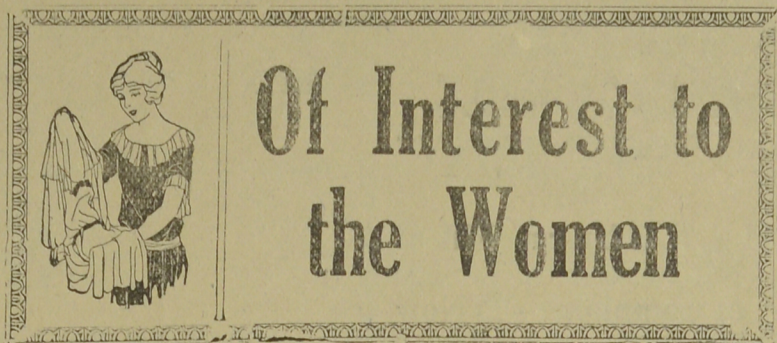
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## Of Interest to the Women

STAINS, SCORCHES, GREASE  
SPOTS EASILY REMOVED BY  
THESE METHODS.

Hot apple vinegar is good for removing dry paint from white clothes.

It is well to remember that any cleaning preparation should be applied to the right side of the clothing, but the rubbing should be done on the wrong side. This preserves the material and prevents the leaving of shiny spots.

Another old household remedy which usually will be found effective is the use of onion juice for the removal of scorching if the threads themselves are uninjured. They should be wet, then exposed to the sun, after which a preparation made of the juice of two onions, a cupful of vinegar, two ounces of fuller's earth and half an ounce of soap should be boiled together and spread over the scorched surface. Let dry in the sun and then wash thoroughly.

All colored goods should be washed quickly in water which is only lukewarm. Only the mildest soaps should be used. They should, of course, never be washed with clothes of another color, or let dry in the sun. For plain materials a little cold water dye should be added to the last rinsing water every now and then.

Often it is necessary to set the color, and certain dyes are best set by salt, others by vinegar and still others by sugar of lead. It is well to take small samples of the material and do a little experimenting. All of the following are good: Two tablespoonfuls of mild vinegar to the quart of water; one fourth table spoonful of sugar of lead; one half a cupful of salt; one fourth table spoonful of alum. By soaking the sample in each of these solutions one may readily discover which is most effective for that particular dye.

Generally speaking for browns, blacks and pinks salt is effective; for blues, the vinegar solution. Turpentine is another good fixative for many colors and may be used in the proportion of four tablespoonfuls to a gallon of clear water.

For the discolored carpet here is an excellent solution; One fourth pound of castile soap, shredded into a quart of water which has been brought to a boiling point, into which as been put two ounces of salts of tartar. Dilute this mixture with hot water two tablespoonfuls to a cup and rub the rug with a flannel rag saturated with the mixture.

For grease spots on thin silk, dip the spot in cold water and cover it with French chalk or starch. Let dry and you will find the grease is rubbed away with the starch.

### GRAPEFRUIT, STUFFED CELERY SALAD

1 can grapefruit  
6 stalks celery  
2 to 3 ounces snappy package cheese  
French salad dressing  
Lettuce or other salad green  
Stuff the celery stalks with the cheese, slice into half inch sections. Place in the center of salad plate and surround with grapefruit sections. Serve with French dressing or mayonnaise.

### PICKLED PEARS

Pare and halve fruit. Boil together for 5 minutes three pounds of brown sugar, 1 1-2 pints of vinegar, two ounces of stick cinnamon one tablespoon whole cloves and two blades of mace (the spices in a bag). Add the pears and simmer until transparent. Can and seal.

## FLAPPERS TO VOTE SOON IN LONDON

London, Oct. 20.—The municipal elections to be held throughout England on Nov. 1 are expected to provide a clue to the results of the general election next year. While the new parliamentary register reducing the age requirements of women voters from 30 to 21 years is not operative until May, women have the right of local vote at 21, providing property conditions are fulfilled.

This has given the women a slight majority in the local government registers and their preferences in the municipal elections are expected to show the trend that the "flapper vote" will take in the national election.

Conservative candidates this year are contesting all of the 1300 seats on the 28 London borough councils. There are now Socialist majorities in eight of the London boroughs. In some cities Liberals and Conservatives have made an alliance against the Socialists.

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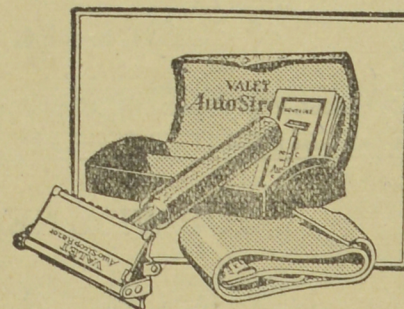
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
