CLINKERLESS SMOKELESS COAL ON MARKET

Pittsburgh, Pa., Nov. 20.—(A. P.)—Quantity production within a short time of a clinkerless, smokeless coal briquette, made from slack bituminous coal under a new process which turns the material which heretofore went up in smoke into valuable by-products, was indicated in a joint paper read at the second international conference on bituminous coal which opened at Carnegie Institute of Technology yesterday.

The paper submitted by James Balph, secretary of the Coal Carbonization Company, Pittsburgh, and M. J. McQuade, president of the Ben Franklin Coal Company of West Virginia, said the product was being turned out in very small portions at this time, but that plant facilities were being extended.

W. A. Darrah, president of the Continental Industrial Engineers, Chicago, believes a widely and properly diversified line of products would make for stability of the coal industry and at the same time help remove the present labor unrest which he attributed to lack of economic ingenuity or foresight on the part of the management.

Darrah told the delegates he felt "quite strongly that any bituminous coal producer can diversify his products and thus do much to increase the stability of his sales, therefore compensating in a large part for the seasonal and periodic fluctuations in the coal market."

As a means of diversifying the coal business, Darrah suggested the coal producer might enter the field of power production and sell electric power; the field of producing and distributing gas either for industrial fuel purposes, domestic purposes or both; the field of the electro-chemical industry; the field of manufacturing

Improved conditions prevailing throughout New Brunswick are reflected in statistics made public by Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works, showing 5,240 new motor vehicles registered at the motor vehicle branch of the provincial Department of Public Works during the present year up to October 31, there being an increase of 14 per cent over the full year of 1927 in the number of motor vehicles licensed in the province this year. These totalled 27,931 up to October 31.

The number of motor vehicles re-licensed this year was 22,691 as compared with 19,530 in 1927.

MY NEIGHBOR SAYS

If you would have healthy house plants keep the leaves free from dust, stir the earth in flower pots frequently and give the plants a little plant food occasionally.

When bath towels become dingy put them in a boiler of cold water, add soap and a little lemon juice and heat the water to the boiling point. Rinse them in lukewarm blueing water and hang them in the sun.

Remember that every time you open the oven door to look at what is baking you will allow cold air to enter. On the other hand, don't think that cake while baking can be neglected. Open the oven to look at it occasionally but not too often.

DATE CAKES

2 1-2 cups oatmeal
1-2 cup white flour
1-2 cup water
1 teaspoon soda
1 cup butter
1 cup brown sugar

Cream butter and sugar. Add soda and water, then oatmeal and flour. Roll thin and spread with date paste. Cover with another layer and cut in strips 4 inches by 1 inch. Bake in moderate oven. Recipe makes 50 cakes.

DATE PASTE

1-2 package dates
Lemon juice
Water

Wash, stone and chop dates in small pieces. Simmer until soft. Add lemon juice to taste.

ANGEL GINGERBREAD

1-2 cup butter
1 cup light brown sugar
2 teaspoons ginger
1-2 cup milk
1 7-8 cups bread flour

Cream the butter; add sugar gradually, and milk very slowly. Mix and sift flour and ginger and combine mixture. Spread very thinly with a broad, long bladed knife on a buttered inverted dripping pan. Bake in a moderate oven. Cut in squares before removing from pan.

FILLED TEA CAKES

(Cheap Sponge Cake)

3 eggs
1 cup sugar
1 tablespoon hot water
1 cup flour
1 1-2 teaspoon baking powder
1-4 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons vinegar

Mix and bake in small, drum shaped cups. When baked, remove centres and fill with lemon butter filling.

GINGER CREAM CANDY

2 cups white sugar
1 cup light brown sugar
3-4 cup milk
2 tablespoons corn syrup
2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons crystallized ginger
1 teaspoon vanilla

Put white and brown sugar, milk and corn syrup in saucepan and boil to 238 degrees F., or until a soft ball forms when tried in water. Remove from fire and add butter and ginger which has been cut fine, but do not stir. When cooled to lukewarm (110

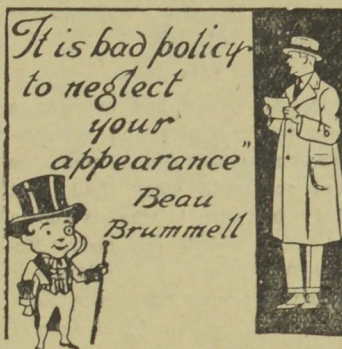
