25 m. salt oysters  
Dash of pepper

Drain the oysters and dry them on a soft towel; fold the well beaten whites of the eggs into the batter, take up a tablespoonful drop an oyster in the spoon and give it a twist into a pan of very hot fat. The oyster must be entirely covered

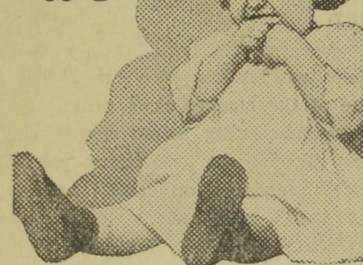
### VIRGINIA OYSTER RAGOUT
