

## PROV. POLICE SEIZE CARS IN PAST FEW DAYS

**New Model Car Taken in Chase Last Evening—Moncton Men by Name of LeBlanc are Now in Jail.**

The provincial police of the Province of New Brunswick, whose headquarters are in this city, are in a great furore of activity the past few weeks, endeavoring to stop the efforts of rum running merchants, who seem to be overworking at this time in the season in order to get the full quota on hand before navigation closes for the winter season. In conjunction with increased activities on both sides, the local detachment made a seizure of a large Graham Paige automobile last night, with its cargo of alcohol and the two men who were in the car. The two men are Dominick LeBlanc and Ernest LeBlanc, father and son, who hail from Moncton. The two were taken to the local police station this morning by provincial officers and locked up pending hearing.

### New Car.

The car, which is a late model and shows very little usage, was captured between this city and Woodstock some time last night and brought here this morning. The seizure last night was the result of a watch being kept for the captured rum runners.

### Bullet Mark.

During the past few days several other cars have been seized one of which contained nearly one hundred gallons of alcohol. The occupants of the last named automobiles escaped the hands of the police, but a sharp lookout is being kept. The mark of a bullet on the side of the car seized last evening was evidence enough to show that both pursued and pursuers were engaged in no quitting party.

## PROGRAM FOR ARMISTICE DAY IS USUAL ONE

**Tenth Anniversary of Close of World War to Be Observed Elaborately Here—Decoration of Graves.**

The annual Armistice Day services, to commemorate the anniversary of the close of the great World War, November 11, 1918 will be held in the city of Fredericton with the usual solemn ceremonies and grave decoration activities. Tomorrow, November 11, is the day of the cenotaph services, appropriate church sermons and music, and the solemn custom of the two minutes of silence. The last feature which occurs at exactly eleven o'clock will be a Dominion wide observance.

### Usual Program.

The program for tomorrow will be about as in previous years, with the exception that the decoration of the graves by the Canadian Legion will take place in the morning following the service at the cenotaph, instead of in the afternoon as in past years. The veterans will assemble at the Canadian Legion quarters in Queen street at ten o'clock and will march

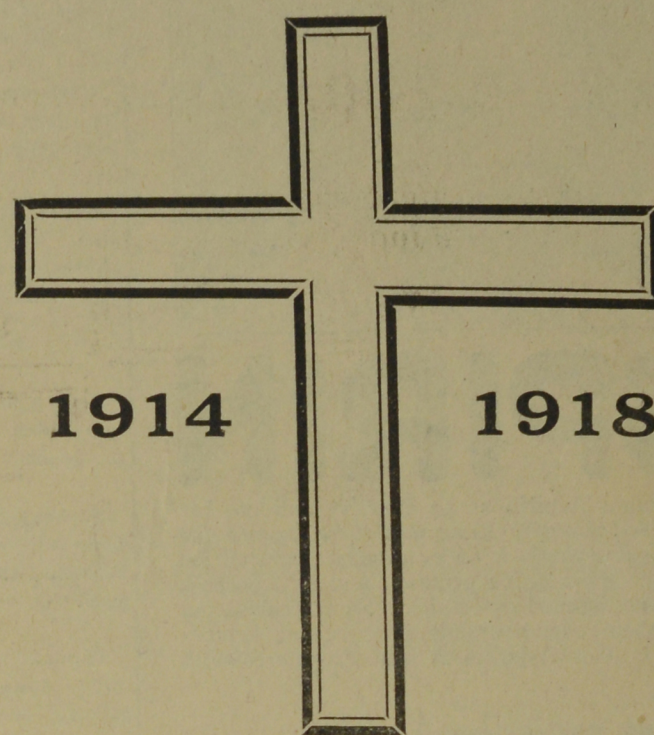
