## Labor Members May take up Case of Commander Daniels

**Believed That the Punishment Meted Out to Him  
By a Court Martial Was Altogether Too Se-  
vere—Jack Tars Call at His Hotel to Express  
Sympathy.**

London, April 4—A number of labor mem-  
bers of Parliament are understood to be con-  
templating taking up the case of Commander Q. M.  
Daniels, who was dismissed from his ship and se-  
verely re-primanded yesterday by the Royal Oak  
court martial at Gibraltar in the belief that pun-  
ishment meted out to him was unduly severe. They  
opine that after a period at half-pay he should be  
reinstated and allowed to resume his career.

Despatches from Gibraltar tell how a number  
of Jack tars called on Daniels at his hotel and  
openly expressed their sympathy for him, while  
there is little doubt that naval circles here are also  
in sympathy with him.

## ONLY 29 OUT OF 150 GIRLS WOULD WED LINDBERGH

Columbia, Mo., April 4—Of 150  
girls in South Hall at Stephens Col-  
lege, a girl's school, only 29 of them  
would marry Col. Lindbergh, a ques-  
tionnaire revealed. The question was  
"would you marry Col. Lindbergh if  
you had a chance?"

Eleven of the 29 were enthusiastic;  
15 wanted to "date him quite a while  
first," and three observed that it  
wouldn't be bad at all to be pictured  
beside him.

Of the 105 that said no, 63 were in  
love with someone else, 17 said he  
was too popular, 12 didn't care for his  
type at all, six were afraid he might  
get killed any minute, and three  
couldn't stand to marry a famous man  
and be known only as his wife.

## FEATHERED TOQUE IS THE LATEST THING

## WILD TRADING IN RUBBER AT NEW YORK

## RESTRICTIONS ON RUBBER TO BE REMOVED

London, April 4—Prime Minister  
Stanley Baldwin announced in the  
House of Commons today, that all re-  
strictions on the export of rubber  
from British Malaya peninsula and  
Ceylon will be removed November 1.

In announcing removal of the re-  
striction November 1, Baldwin said  
the existing scheme would continue  
unaltered in the meantime.

## YUKON ADOPTS THE OLD AGE PENSION PLAN

Ottawa, April 4—Yukon has entered  
the Federal old age pensions scheme.  
Late this afternoon George I. Mac-  
Lean, newly appointed gold commis-  
sioner of the Yukon territory, fixed  
his signature to an agreement with  
the Dominion government to partici-  
pate in the federal plan. An order-in-  
council will shortly be passed, in ac-  
cordance with the established pro-  
cedure, authorizing Hon. Peter Heen-  
en, Minister of Labor, to sign for the  
Federal government.

Yukon territory is the second to join  
in the Federal old age pension scheme  
passed at the last session of the Do-  
minion parliament. Several months  
ago, British Columbia executed an  
agreement with Mr. Heenen along  
similar lines to that with Yukon.  
Manitoba and Saskatchewan are now  
negotiating with Mr. Heenen.

## GEN. WRANGEL HAS ATTACK OF INFLUENZA

## GIRL TRIED TO SAVE A MAN FROM A SHARK

**Wonderful Pluck Dis-  
played by Miss Don-  
aldson of Sydney.**

Sydney, N. S., April 4—Wonderful  
heroism was displayed today by Miss  
Lucy Donaldson, aged 20, who swam  
to the assistance of a friend, Arthur  
Lane, a prominent business man, when  
the latter was attacked by a shark  
more than fifty yards out from the  
beach at Newcastle.

Before the plucky girl could reach  
her friend, she saw the shark attack  
him four times. Eventually, however,  
she succeeded in frightening the  
monster away by vigorous splashing.

Lane was shockingly mutilated and  
died on the beach a few minutes after  
being dragged ashore by Miss Don-  
aldson.

## Britain will Insist On Maintenance of The 1922 Declaration

**Reply to Egyptian Note Suggesting the Removal  
of British Troops is Awaited With Interest—  
Intimations Regarding Its Tenor Have Been  
Forwarded to Lord Lloyd.**

London, April 4—Intimations have been sent  
to Lord Lloyd, High Commissioner in Egypt, re-  
garding the tenor of the British reply to the  
Egyptian note suggesting the removal of British  
troops from Egypt, it was learned today from  
authoritative sources.

The reply is understood to reaffirm and insist  
upon the maintenance of the 1922 declaration.
