HEENEY IS NOT SURPRISED AT TUNNEY CHANCE

New York, April 3—The least surprised and concerned person at the official announcement that Heeney will be Gene Tunney's adversary in the next "battle of the century" is the rugged, New Zealander himself. On the night he sailed for London, he called every shot of maneuvers that have taken place recently, and even went so far as to explain carefully why the fight with Tunney would not be held in London.

"It might be a bit presumptuous on my part to seem to announce to the public the outcome of the controversy at this time," he told the writer "but there's no harm in chatting about it. It may be that I will fight Risko, but I doubt it very much."

"Although that fight would be a very satisfactory financial proposition for me, because it would bring a big gate, I don't believe that the promoters would care to keep up this elimination business, which has actually been concluded to the satisfaction of the great bulk of the sporting public."

"Except as a financial proposition there is no reason why I should be forced to meet Risko again."

HELEN WILLS IN STRONG START

San Francisco, April 3—Helen Wills in her last exhibition tennis match, prior to her departure for Europe, today defeated Phil Neer, eighth ranking player in California, 6-3, 6-4. Miss Wills will leave her home in Berkeley, April 12 for an extended European invasion.

Miss Wills, United States woman champion tennis player, was able to win from Neer because of her place ments and mid court play. Neer made many double faults and those contributed to his defeat.

The exhibition was the last of six that Miss Wills has played at the California Tennis Club in San Francisco. All of her opponents have been ranking men players as there is no woman player in the vicinity who can give her the slightest competition.

Miss Wills, while in Europe will seek to retain the British title that she won last year at Wimbledon.

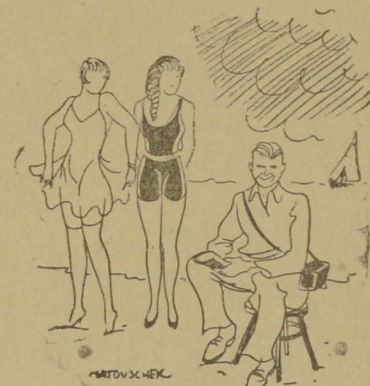
DOONE, 2.06 1-4 TO MAKE FIRST G. CIRCUIT TRY

Cleveland, April 3—Doane, the cyclonic North Carolina gelding that holds the world record of 2.06 1/4 for three year old trotters over a half mile track, will make his first appearance on the Grand Circuit this season. He is scheduled to inaugurate a series of stake engagements in The Ohio 2.08 trot at the North Randall meeting here, July 2-7.

As a result of his sensational performances over the twice-around courses, Doane will step into the big time expected to gather considerable glory. He'll have to be right up to snuff to dispose of the company he is destined to meet.

Also out for the rich plums will be such stars at Minia Dillon, 2.02 1/4 Full Worthy 2.03; Trumpet, 2.03 1/4; Kashmir 2.03 1/2; Dewey McKinney 2.03 1/2; Cinema 2.03 1/2; Bob Armstrong 2.03 1/2; High Noon 2.04 1/2; Clara Bascom 2.05 1/4; Clayworth 2.05 1/4; Tiptoe Frisco 2.07 1/4 and Signal Spring 2.08 1/4. There is a world of speed represented in this group.

Doane again will have the capable services of the Wilson, N. C. reinsman Cyrus Becker, in the sulky. Becker brought him through his two and three year old form.
