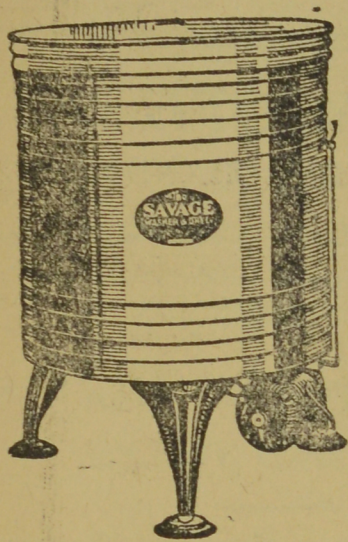

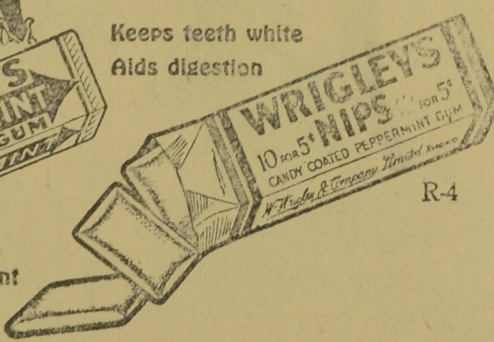

SUGGESTED IMPROVEMENTS IN CANADA'S BANKING SYSTEM TO BE GIVEN CONSIDERATION

Ottawa, Feb. 13—Improvements in Canada's banking system will be considered by the banking committee of the House. Tonight the House carried a motion to give the committee authority to this end. J. S. Woodsworth (Labor, Winnipeg North Centre) raised the issue with a motion that the time had come for establishment of a national system of banking.

Discussion on this motion held the House practically all afternoon and on into the early evening. Eventually the motion was adopted but with an important amendment. This struck from the original motion the reference to a "national" system and substituted authority to the banking committee to consider an improved banking system and report thereon.

Proposal Made.

In urging the members to accept a resolution proposed by him for such a system, Mr. Woodsworth suggested to the government that his proposal should be placed before the banking and commerce committee for full consideration. He believed that all currency should be issued by the Dominion Government and that private savings banks should be developed. Private savings banks should be given full banking privileges. There should be larger facilities for credit, said Mr. Woodsworth, and central banking boards should be created.

Greater government control over currency was essential, he declared. Under the prevailing practice a few men on bank directorates were able to manipulate the credit of the people for their own interests.

H. E. Spencer (U. F. A., Battle River) said a complete fiscal monopoly existed in this country. Eleven private organizations filled the field today where 20 years ago there were 32. Our banking system had not in its methods kept abreast of the developments of trade and commerce.

For Federal System

Mr. Spencer advanced the theory of a federal banking system.

John Evans (Progressive Rosetown) said banks were another example of a public utility in private hands operated for private gain.

A. M. Carmichael (U. F. A., Kindersley), agreed with Mr. Evans that banking was the people's business and should be done by the people.

C. E. Bothwell (Liberal, Swift Current) said he had always believed that the system now in vogue was a national system of banking. He did not think the proposed resolution was "sufficiently clear" to be discussed in its present form before the banking and commerce committee.

Robb's Comments.

Hon. J. A. Robb, Minister of Finance, had personally no objection to the resolution going before the banking and commerce committee. He did object, though, to the leak of clearness of the terms of the resolution. He hoped that in any event the resolution would be modified so that the impression would not be created that Canada had not a real banking system.

"When you compare the banking system of Canada with the banking system and bank failures of other countries in recent years, Canada has every reason to be proud of her banking system," said Mr. Robb.

"When they ask the Dominion of Canada to go directly into the banking business" he continued in referring to the earlier remarks of western members "they have not carefully reviewed the record of Canada even in loaning money out in that particular part of the country in which they reside."

Bring in Money.

"Canadian banks doing business in and competing with banks in other countries were bringing in more money than they are sending out."

There was now on the books of the department amounts totalling \$2,000,000 in loans, said Mr. Robb. The department was considering whether the money was lost as some of the borrowers could not be located. Over \$100,000,000 had been advanced under the soldiers' settlement scheme, and the impression was that the country was going to lose about \$16,000,000 in revaluation.

"It is important in Canada that we should do all we possible can to maintain our banking system," said Mr. Robb.

With respect to the absorption of banks, Mr. Robb said that it was some times necessary for banks to merge if failure was to be avoided. As Minister of Finance, he said, some years ago he had found it necessary to go and ask a larger institution to absorb the Union Bank of Canada because he knew that if this was not done a worse condition than that of the Home Bank would develop. The merger had saved the situation.

ALL BODIES TAKEN FROM THE HOLLINGER MINE

The Company Presents \$200 to the Next of Kin of the Victims to Tide Them Over.

Timmins, Ont., Feb. 13—The body of O. Tittit, the last of the thirty-nine men who died in the Hollinger Mine disaster, was brought to the surface tonight. The remains of all the victims of the fire, which broke out in the mine last Friday, have now been recovered. Nine bodies were recovered this afternoon.

Breaking an official silence of three days, Arthur Brigham, general manager of the company, and Noah Timmins, president, received newspapermen here today and submitted themselves to interrogation. The interview cast no light on the cause of the blaze.

The officials declared that until a rigorous enquiry, which they contemplated undertaking within the next few days, had been instituted they could advance no explanation for the out-break. Mr. Brigham scoffed at the suggestion that the catastrophe was deliberately brought about.

It had been established that the slope in which the fire broke out between the fifth and sixth level had been used as a dumping place for rubbish, sawdust and paper. This, Mr. Brigham said, was a direct violation of the law, but it had been done outside of the knowledge of the company officers.

Investigation Soon.

The inquest into the deaths will be opened here at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning with Coroner Montgomery in charge. The mine early this morning was reported almost free of smoke and gas and it was believed that the fire had burned itself out.

As soon as the bodies were recovered and identified they were distributed among the local undertakers. An idea of the nation-wide character of the disaster is indicated by the destinations to which the bodies have been shipped. Some have gone to Nova Scotia, others to Quebec, New Brunswick and other parts of Canada. A number of the dead men were from the Old Country, with south west England predominating.

The Hollinger Company today presented the next of kin of each victim with \$200 to tide them over the period when they will begin to receive money under the Workmen's Compensation Act. The provisions of the latter will give each widow \$40 a month with \$10 for each dependent child under 16 years of age.

Charlie will probably be used as a relief centre during the trip, helping their curly headed centre flash, Wall to hold down the centre position.

THE MARITIME ELECTRIC CO. HAS GOOD OUTLOOK

Fredericton One of Several Communities that are Served by the Company.

S.) Electric Light, Heat & Power Co. The principal communities served are Fredericton and St. Stephen in New Brunswick, Charlottetown P. E. I., Bridgetown and Lawrencetown in Nova Scotia and Calais in Maine. The company has about 8,000 meters in service.

LAPIDARIES END APPRAISAL OF VAST TREASURE

Paris, Feb. 13—Two of France's foremost lapidaries just returned from a sojourn in Angora and Constantinople indicated that Mustapha Kemal has completed the appraisal of fabulous treasures of the Sultans of Turkey with which, it is intimated, the Turkish Republic will create a state bank.

Experts were among many Europeans called in by Kemal to make a thorough estimate of the wealth to be secured from the sale of the Sultans riches. Jewels and rare objects of most dazzling profusion were described by the lapidaries, among which are scores of big emeralds, one of which is large enough to contain a bombon box sunk in the middle.

The objects contain hundreds of rock crystal, perfume flasks, manuscripts, Turkish and Persian carvings and gold filigreed work, priceless antique rugs, objects in ivory and ebony including one ebony cane of the former Sultan entirely encrusted with diamonds.
