COFFEE SEA FOAM.

1 cup strong coffee
2 cups dark brown sugar
1 cup cocoanut or pecan
2 egg whites
Pinch of baking soda
Put the sugar and coffee into saucepan; stir until dissolved; place over slow fire and boil slowly until it spins a thread or makes a soft ball when tried in cold water. Beat the whites of eggs until dry (on a platter); add the sugar slowly and keep beating until stiff; then add the soda and cocoanut which has been chopped fine. Drop a teaspoonful at a time onto a platter that has been brushed with butter or margarine. Sprinkle top with cocoanut. Set in cold place until dry.

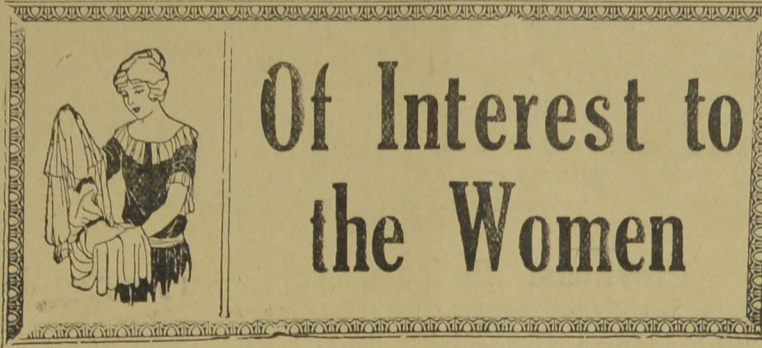

Of Interest to the Women

SPONGE CAKE DESSERT.

For this dainty dessert which is prepared on small individual plates one needs:

10 slices Sponke Cake
Glass Raspberry Jelly or Jelly of Choice.

Pint whipping Cream.

Ten three inch fancy paper doilies

Put the doilies on plates, spread

the slice of sponge cake with jelly

and put it on the plate; cover cake

with whipped cream which has been

sweetened and flavored to taste;

garnish top with small bits of red

jelly and sprinkle very lightly with

either cinnamon or cocoa. This des-

sert can be prepared early in the

day and set in a cold place.

PEACH TAPIOCA WITH MARSH- MALLOW WHIP.

1-4 cup granulated tapioca
1-4 cup sugar
2 cups cut peaches
2 cups water
Pinch of salt
1-2 cup marshmallow whip
Add the tapioca to the boiling water and boil until clear; add the peaches, sugar and salt; boil five minutes. Pour into ice cream glasses; when cold garnish with a spoonful of marshmallow whip with a piece of peach on top.

STEAMED PRUNE ROLL.

1 cup prunes after pitting and cutting into small pieces
1 1-2 cups flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1-4 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon shortening
1-4 cup milk
1-2 cup sugar
1 egg
1 teaspoon butter
1 teaspoonful lemon or orange peel
Sift the flour, baking powder and salt into bowl; add the shortening rub in very lightly with the tips of the fingers; add the milk and well beaten egg; enough milk to form a dough that can be rolled out one quarter of an inch thick. Brush with melted butter spread with the prunes and sprinkle with the sugar and grated lemon or orange peel; roll the same as jelly roll. Put into saucepan that has been brushed with melted butter; cover, set the pan in another pan of boiling water; steam two hours. Serve warm with fruit sauce or sugar and milk. If the double boiler is large enough use it instead of saucepan.

LIGHTNING CAKE.

1 cup flour
1-3 cup sugar
1-2 cup milk
1 tablespoon melted butter or margarine
1 teaspoon baking powder

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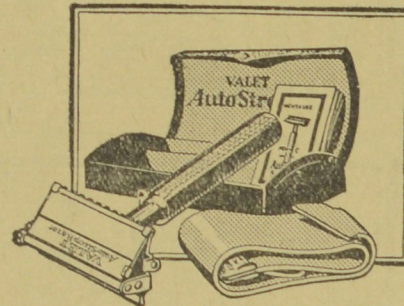
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
