

## MRS. J. B. DICKSON PASSES AWAY AT THE HOSPITAL

Her Death Followed an Operation — Belonged to a Well Known Marysville Family and Was Highly Esteemed

The death occurred at the Victoria Public Hospital last evening of Mrs. Mary Louise Dickson, wife of Mr. J. Bacon Dickson, barrister-at-law of this city, following an operation which was performed early in the morning. The late Mrs. Dickson had been in delicate health for some time past and her condition suddenly growing serious, she was taken to the hospital on Tuesday evening for an operation. The operation did not have the looked for results and her condition becoming gradually worse during the day she passed away between five and six o'clock in the evening.

The deceased was a daughter of the late Mr. Alexander Gibson, Jr., of Marysville, former M. P. for York and a granddaughter of Mr. Alexander Gibson, Sr., the founder of the town. Trained at the Mount Allison Ladies College, and New England Conservatory of Music she was an accomplished vocalist and had frequently been heard in public. She was one of Marysville's fairest daughters, a bright and lovable woman, held in universal esteem and her sad and untimely death will be sincerely deplored.

The deceased lady was thirty-seven years of age and is survived by her husband, by her mother Mrs. Charlotte I. Gibson, and two young children David M. and Marjorie. A half brother Harry Gibson is a resident of Vancouver. The heartfelt sympathy of the community will go out to the members of the family in their bereavement.

The funeral will take place on Friday afternoon, with services at the homestead at 44 Waterloo Row at 2.30 o'clock. Rev. George Telford will conduct the service and will be assisted by Rev. J. M. Rice of Marysville. Interment will be made at the Rural Cemetery.

## CITY TOURIST COMMITTEE IS ORGANIZED

A Good Start Made at Meeting Yesterday Afternoon — Large Sign Boards to be Erected at Entrances to City.

The tourist and publicity committee recently appointed by the city council met at the exhibition offices yesterday afternoon and organized. Ex. Ald. Frank L. Cooper was elected chairman and Mr. C. L. Sypher secretary treasurer. Those present at the meeting were His Worship Mayor Clark, Ald. Mitchell and Currier, F. L. Cooper, J. D. Black and R. P. Allen. The other members of the committee are Ald. Ross and H. S. Campbell.

The matter of getting out a booklet setting forth the attractions of Fredericton was discussed and a committee was appointed to go into the matter and report at a later meeting.

Mr. Black outlined the work being done by the provincial government with a view of building up a tourist industry. He presented statistics showing that 23,000 cars from the United States had entered the province last year at border points for a thirty day period and predicted a large number for coming season. He also pointed out that last year was the best Fredericton has ever known from a tourist standpoint.

#### To Erect Signs.

Mr. Black suggested that the city council be asked to have large signs of the bill board type erected on the highway at the two chief entrances of the city, setting forth that Fredericton is the capital of the province and extending a welcome to visiting motorists. He embodied his views in the form of a motion which was seconded by Mayor Clark and unanimously adopted.

## EXPORTS TO THE U. S. SHOW A FALLING OFF

Total For the Last Quarter Was \$285,088 as Compared With \$316,644 for Same Period of 1927.

Exports to the United States for this district during the quarter ended March 31st totalled \$285,088.42, according to a statement just issued by Mr. Frederick C. Johnson, American vice-consul at Fredericton. The total for the corresponding three months of 1927 was \$316,644.92 which means a falling off of \$31,556.50.

The largest item of exports was spruce lumber which had a value of \$95,559.24. Hardwood lumber came next with a value of \$59,545.49. Laths valued at \$39,906.14 was the next largest item a falling off of \$21,000 in comparison with the previous year.

Strange to say potato shipments showed a substantial increase compared with the corresponding quarter of the previous year. The total value for the quarter just ended was \$28,215.39 compared with \$14,545.30 last year.

Pulpwood shipments for the quarter just ended totalled 668 cords valued at \$12,306.03. Exports of shoe racks were valued at \$2,237 against \$468.50 last year.

Shipments of Christmas trees totalled 6907, valued at \$3457.50 as against 8915 valued at \$4,458 last year.

Exports of shingles, spruce poles, tamarack knees and toothpick wood showed a substantial increase over last year.

The total value of returned American goods was \$405.84 against \$11,399.15 for the previous quarter.
