Canadiens Win 15th in N. H. L. Game Last Night

Defeated Ottawa Senators 3-1 — Clancy and Joliat in Fight—Americans Trim Leafs — Boston Bruins Move Into 1st Place.

Montreal, Jan. 10.—Canadiens completed 15 straight games without a loss by defeating the Ottawa Senators 3 to 1 here tonight. Previous to the game the Senators were the only team which the Canadiens had not beaten in their meteoric hockey flight at the top of the Canadian section of the National Hockey League.

Thirteen thousand fans witnessed the Canadiens give one of their fastest displays of the season. The Ottawa team was seldom in the picture and only the work on the part of Connell the Ottawa goalie, kept the Flying Frenchmen from piling up a more commanding margin. Joliat, Morenz and Hart did the scoring, the first two coming in quick succession early in the second period. Hart counted in the third session.

With less than 30 seconds to play in the final stanza, Clancy and Joliat came to blow beside the Ottawa net. Both received major penalties and fines of \$25 a piece.

Americans 2, Toronto 1.

New York, Jan. 10.—Capt. Billy Burch scored both goals that gave the New York Americans a 2 to 1 victory over the Toronto Maple Leafs in a National Hockey League game here tonight. Alex. McKinnon, American right winger, assisted the American captain in both goals.

Dr. Bill Carson, Toronto centre player, scored the Toronto goal. All the scoring occurred in the second period.

In the third period, when the Americans were seriously handicapped by penalties, the Toronto team used four men on the attack, but a tight defence and Miller's spectacular goalkeeping prevented them from tying the score. Near the close of the game the Americans had Green and Reise in the penalty box together.

Keeling was slightly injured during the game, but returned to play.

Bruins in First.

Boston, Mass., Jan. 10.—The Boston Bruins moved into a first place tie with the Detroit Cougars in the American division of the National Hockey League by defeating the Chicago Black Hawks, 3 to 1, here tonight. Frank Frederickson, Oliver and Connor scored the Bruin goals and Wasnie spare right wing of the Black Hawks, achieved Chicago's single point.

RED TAPE LOSES RECORD FOR FAST HALF MILER

Lloyd Hahn Unofficially Breaks Half Mile Record at Boston—Wore Flat-Soled Shoes.

Boston, Jan. 11.—Lloyd Hahn will become the holder of the world's record for the half mile before the indoor season is finished.

That is the prophecy of Jack Ryder Hahn's coach who saw the Nebraskan in 53 4-5s for the half in Brooklyn Saturday night only to lose official credit for the world's record mark because all the conditions for record making were not fulfilled. The lack of a two inch wooden border on the track known as the pole was the cause of Hahn's failure to be officially credited with breaking the world's record of E. B. Parsons 1m 5-5s.

Hahn's feat Saturday was all the more remarkable because of the track. He had to run his half mile on a flat track without banked corners and wore flat soled shoes.

Few Horses get in More Than 10 Starts a Season

Harness Season Only Lasts About 20 Weeks — Few Horses Start More Than 15 Races — Patsy Leaf Tied at 15 Victories with 30 Others for 1927 Racing Season.

Boston, Jan. 11.—With the light harness racing season extending from June to November, a matter of 20 weeks it is a busy trotter or pacer that can make more than that number of starts. As a rule, horses take the word in about 10 races during the season. A few move by that mark but not many.

In the 1927 campaign the trotter Patsy Leaf tied at 15 victories with the pacers Hamsa Dillon, King Direct and Bert Abbe. After winning at all of the early sweepstake meetings except Trenton, Patsy Leaf was shipped to Northern New York where he had almost everything his own way in the Buffalo Road Drivers' stakes.

Bert Abbe won all of his races in the Bay State and Orange County Circuits except at Greenfield, Sturbridge and Springfield where he was defeated by Carolyn Logan. At Endicott he paced a third heat in 2.03 1/4. Later on he clipped the fraction off in a race at Malone.

Hamsa Dillon began racing in 1927 at the sweepstake meetings. He kept winning until dropped off at Trumansburg, N. Y. At that point in one heat he pulled three shoes and was drawn but came back later in the week and won. His card shows that he won 15 races out of 16 starts.

Of the four horses that won 13 races last year the two year old filly Shirley Harvester is the only trotter. As a yearling she was sold at the Chicago auction for \$110 to Warren Daniels. As he was unable to get an advance on that figure he took The Harvester filly home and trained her in return for his work. Shirley Harvester won all of her engagements worth over \$3500 made a race record of 2.09 3/4 and again passed under the hammer at Chicago when W. B. Eckert of Reading Penn. paid \$2500 for her without an engagement.

The other winners of 13 races last year were the pacers Walnut Grattan Jr., Peter Direct and Beau Dillon. The last named is a four-year-old by Dillon Axworthy out of Zule Belle by Pettigree. He was raced over the Eastern tracks and made a record of 2.06 3/4.

The contest will yield a purse of \$1200 for the winter as well as the prospect of a match with Willie Hoppe present holder of the 18.1 crown.

There are 130 horses wintering at the Goshen mile track. Walter Cox has 68, Frank Phillips 25, George Walsh 14 Ed Kirby 13, Charley Mabrey six and Louis Prigge four. Fred Hyde has nine at the half mile track Edmond Butler 11, Pete Goode five, Ned Gibson four, Jerry George six and Harry Leonard two.

SUSSEX TIE WITH FUSILIERS LAST NIGHT

Sussex, Jan. 10.—After 90 minutes of gruelling hockey, the Sussex Colts and the Saint John Fusiliers failed to break a deadlock and the score ended one-all and there also ended the game. The contest was packed with thrills from start to finish. Despite the heavy ice it was a great game to watch. Towards the end of the three overtime periods, however, the ice carried much water and the players readily over-skated the puck.

Both goalers put up a stellar exhibition of hockey all the way with Wilson, in the "army" nets, having the greater number of shots.

He stopped eight sizzling shots in two minutes in the first period in big league style. The first goal was scored by Clark for Saint John in the first period after about 15 minutes had elapsed on an individual play from centre ice, capped by a terrific drive.

Sussex's Goal.

The goal for Sussex was scored by Harris Wall when about half a minute had elapsed in the second period. It was a solo effort and gave Wilson no chance. The Colts have certainly made a find in Norman Lutz, who has been moved back from the forward line and played a defensive game equal to anything ever seen on Sussex ice. He is fast on his skates, full of pluck and has a wicked shot.

Best of Play Here.

In the first period the Colts had decidedly the best of the play and only phenomenal saves by Wilson prevented Sussex from scoring on numerous occasions, the Fusiliers goalie being peppered with shots at close range.

The second period also favored the Colts, individual rushes the full length of the ice by both teams being a feature, both goalies making many sensational stops.

The third period, while fast, was about even as to territory play. H. Radcliffe being hit on the side of the jaw with a stick, had to retire about three minutes before the period ended.

Both teams showed the effect of the terrific strain in the 30 minutes' overtime and while many excellent saves were made, the shots were mostly at long range.

The referee, Jack Brown, of Moncton, handed out penalties very freely, all for minor offences. Wall drew two minutes for holding and Thompson two minutes for body checking outside the defensive area in the first period.

In the second period Wall and Hunter drew two minute penalties each for tripping and Brooks drew two minutes for holding and Thompson and Kley, of the Fusiliers, drew two minutes for holding and Thompson and Ferguson drew two minutes for tripping.



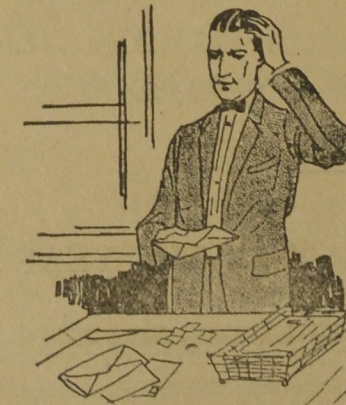
