The Fredericton Exhibition which will conclude its 1928 showing tomorrow evening at twelve o'clock has been from point of attendance, amusement attractions and horse racing, etc. one of the best held in the history of this city. The crowds which have been growing since early in the week are swelling to major proportions and when the final results are made known after the exhibition, the total attendance threatens to eclipse that of last year and previous years.

Judging will be completed today in all departments and all awards will be made. Tomorrow afternoon there will be the usual parade of live stock in front of the Grand stand in the Trotting Park and in conjunction will be the complete program of outdoor amusements across from the stands. The Masonic Concert Band from Halifax which has been playing all week will be present.

The weather after threatening early this morning cleared up fine around twelve o'clock and the races this afternoon which include the big Free-For-All with such high class track stars as Ruby P., Jeanette Royal, Bessie McKillo and others will be the big attraction this afternoon at the fair. Intermittent showers fell last night but not enough to harm anything. Today is Children's Day and all school children are being allowed into the grounds free of charge.

Annual Conference Finished Today at Noon — Some Interesting Discussions on Scaling, etc. in Morning.

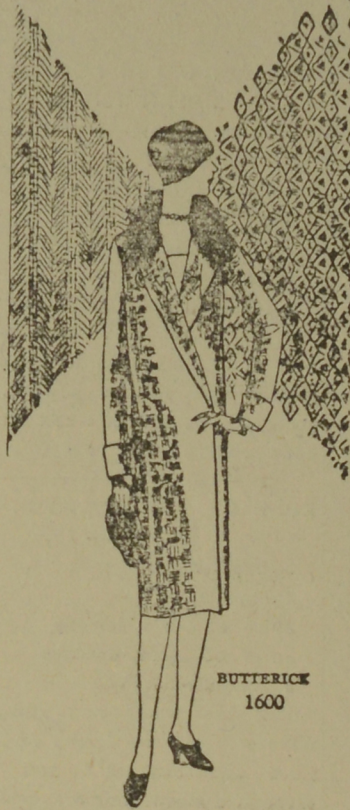
