## CANADIENS LOSE TO OTTAWA WHILE MAROONS WIN

**Maroons Defeated Leafs 2-1 — Grosvenor Gets Only Tally in Senator-Canadien Battle—Pirates Continue Strong.**

Montreal, Feb. 19.—Montreal Maroons battled their way to a 2 to 1 victory over the Toronto Maple Leafs here last night and thus obtained undisputed possession of third place in the standing of the Canadian division of the N. H. L. The Maroons are one point ahead of Connie Smythe's battling Leafs and one point behind the second place Ottawa Senators. The Montreal team, however, has played one game less than either the Senators or the Leafs.

Last night's game was a strenuous battle with the locals being forced to come from behind to take the honors.

The Leafs took a one goal lead in the initial session when Keeling picked up a loose puck at the side of the Maroon defence and turned a drive between Benedict's pads. In the middle frame, the Maroons tied it up when Jimmie Ward dashed around the right side of the Toronto rear guard and with big Art Duncan draped all over him, managed to shove the disc past John Ross Roach. The winning counter came in the final period, Hooley Smith scoring the deciding goal five minutes after the start when he accepted a perfect pass from Stewart right in front of the Toronto net.

Ottawa 1; Canadiens 0

Ottawa, Feb. 19.—Leonard Grosvenor, a home bred front line relief player, chose Saturday night to bag his first goal since he entered major hockey this season and by the stroke that sent the puck hurtling into the cage of the Montreal Canadiens the recruit gave Ottawa a 1 to 0 victory over the pace setters of the National circuit.

The counter came after eight and one half minutes of gruelling hockey had been reeled off in the final period. Throughout the first and second periods the teams fought hard and fairly even but their scoring efforts were futile against the masterful net tending and the superb defences which continually checked them.

Pirates 2; Americans 0

Pittsburgh, Feb. 19.—The Pirates defeated the New York Americans last night for the first time in two years 2 to 0 and by virtue of the victory took undisputed possession of third place in the American division of the N. H. L.

The Pirates' two wing stars Darragh and White accounted for the tallies. Darragh crashed home the initial goal on a brilliant solo effort in the second period and White added the other counter with a similar thrust in the final session.

Captain Roy Worters turned in another spectacular exhibition for the Pittsburgh team. Himes and Conacher stood out for the Americans.

## Close Games Witnessed In Commercial Battles

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A fairly good crowd attended Saturday night's commercial hockey double header and witnessed two of the closest games played this winter in the commercial loop. The first battle between Hartt Boot and Shoe and the Canadian National Railway sextets ended in a 0-0 draw. No overtime was played on account of the limitation of time. Each club is entitled to a point apiece. The second half of the dual bill saw the John Palmer team on the biggest end of a 2 to 1 score at the expense of the Chestnut Canoe puckchasers.

Although the ice was not in ideal shape for hockey both games were thrillers. Shooting and puck carrying were at a disadvantage; however players on all teams performed rather brilliantly at times, getting in long shots on their opponents nets, rather than carrying the disc through. Goal tenders were conspicuous by their steady work in the nets and kicked out many shots. Play however was mainly in the center areas and rival checking featured both skirmishes.

C. N. R. 0; Hartt Boot and Shoe 0.

Despite pre-game opinion in favor of the railway team's winning, the Hartt aggregation held their own with their faster skating rivals and checked consistently well. Both Tart Titus and Victor Burns opposing goalies had plenty to do and did it well. Earl Chapell back on the Hartt defence was a big help to the Hartt team and featured with his dangerous rushes and all round defence work. Pee Wee Harrison and Gulliver were the threats of the railway sextet nobly assisted by Robertson on the defence. The game throughout was fast and ended with a 0-0 score.

John Palmer 2; Chestnut Canoe 1.

The John Palmer team featured a changed lineup in battle of the evening. "Sprig" Bailey (that loquacious backstop of diamond battles) who has played in the Palmer nets for the majority of its games this year essayed to play the center position and his place in the nets was taken by young Grant. "Sprig" played a good game at center notching the winning counter in the final session for the Palmer crew. The Chestnut Canoe outfit missed the dashing play of their rapid shooting defenceman Don Horncastle who was not in condition to play. His position was filled by Bill Dunlap who though aggressive was not in the class with his brilliant teammate. "Dukey" Delong of the Palmer sextet countered the first on a long shot in the first period and the scoring ended until the third session. Bailey flashed the disc into the twine's near the middle of the last stanza and near the close of the period Jim Feeny secured Chestnut's only tally on a close one. Larry McLean refereed both games.

The Balanger and Schwartz bouts are given a secondary place on the program which is headlined by a ten round contest between Clarence Rosen and Pete Firpo, who meet for the fourth time to settle their bantamweight feud.

Chicago Feb. 17.—Del Fontaine middleweight champion of Canada and Red Uhlan, of Cleveland, who will meet in a ten round feature bout next Monday night are putting the finishing touches on training preparations in Chicago gymnasiums.

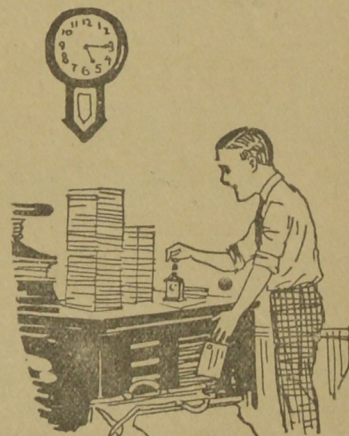
## CANADA WINS OLYMPIC HOCKEY CHAMPIONSHIP

## MANY N.S. FANS THINK WILDCATS ARE BETTER TEAM

**Would Place Champion Bearcats as Only Second to Kentville Sextet—Wildcats Ask For Exhibition Game.**

Truro, Feb. 20.—The figures given in this morning's Chronicle, in a Kentville dispatch caused Truro fans to delve into statistics. Totalling up the goals in the Nova Scotia Eastern League schedule it is found that Kentville scored 30 and Truro 28. The Wildcats won nine games (one being forfeited by the Socials), and lost five. The Bearcats won eight and lost six.

It may be noted also that the Bearcats played three games without "Doggie" Kuhn's support. The fast wing man through illness to one of his shoulders is not even yet in his proper form.

What do these statistics amount to? The fact cannot be gainsaid that the Truro Bearcats finished stronger than the 1927 champions. To win both playoff games is ample evidence.

A report is circulated tonight that Kentville hockeyists wired a challenge to the Bearcats for a match game in the Halifax Forum for Saturday night. "If this is so can anything be found to show the weakness of the Wildcat supporters?" questioned a hockey authority here. The Bearcats won the league championship by using their heads. Surely no one thinks for a moment that the headwork that led them to within site of the Provincial and Maritime championships will allow them more risks. At this late date the Bearcats will have a strenuous playoff on Monday night and if successful will have more hard battles to face. There is nothing to be gained by meeting the Wildcats in an exhibition game.

## PULLMAN CARS NEED A VAST LINEN SUPPLY

The extravagance of railway travellers in the use of hand towels is registered in the housekeeping books of sleepers and parlor cars.

It takes more than 9,000,000 pieces of linen to keep the \$600 cars equipped and almost half of these are hand towels.

Every year almost 2,000,000 new ones must be purchased to replace those that wear out or "disappear from service."

Keeping up the Pullman linen supply is a considerable task. The twelve-section drawing room car on a typical one night's run carries 200 hand towels, 160 sheets, 120 pillow slips and four porter's coats.

Four hundred linen carriers and checkers are employed to distribute and receive back supplies.

1,000,000 Pieces in Daily Wash  
Every day 1,000,000 pieces are put into the wash. Two of the company's laundries wash an average of thirty tons of linen a day.

When it comes from the ironing machine it is inspected and pieces bearing stains are put aside for treatment.

There are eighteen sewing rooms where a force of 100 seamstresses make repair as many as 300,000 damaged pieces a month.

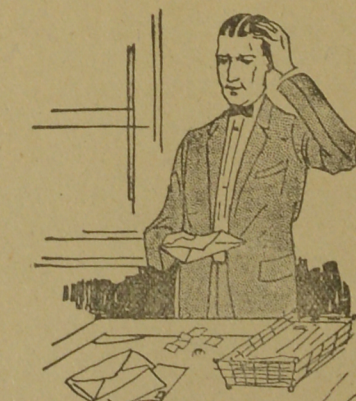
