AN AXE HELPS GOATS GET FOOD IN THE SOUTH

San Angelo, Tex., Feb. 18.—If any of the the 2,750,000 goats on the ranges of west Texas cannot find enough to eat their owners chop down trees or bushes so the animals may eat the leaves.

Shrubs in the range country are falling for the benefit of goats on ranches where cattle and sheep consume the regular forage. This is the season when grass for grazing is scarce.

CONDEMNED MURDERER IS A CAPE BRETONER

Sydney, N. S., Feb. 20.—"I have nothing to say," declared John J. McDonald, well known Sydney resident and father of George McDonald, now under sentence of death for the murder of Adelard Bouchard, Montreal taxi driver, on July 17, when queried by the star today as to whether he had received a letter from his son.

Although non-committal on the subject, Mr. McDonald feels deeply the tragic end awaiting his youngest son, George, whom he termed the "baby" of his family. The McDonald family is one of the oldest and most highly esteemed of this city.

During the days of the "boom," Mr. McDonald conducted a bakery here, a business which he carried on successfully for 10 years.

Owing to marital troubles he and his wife separated several years ago. She is now living with her daughter in Portland, Maine. The remainder of the family consisted of three boys.

Don McDonald, the eldest son, was instantly killed in Halifax five years ago, when he was electrocuted when he stepped on a "live wire" which had fallen during a rain and wind storm.

Herman McDonald, the second son, went to the States, where he is now located.

George had a dangerous hobby of carrying guns, school chums declare. Often, they say, he came to school armed with revolvers, handcuffs and police clubs.

After leaving school in the sixth grade he commenced his criminal activities. Police records show that he spent a term in the boy's reformatory at Halifax. Later he was arrested for forging a cheque on his mother; but the charge was withdrawn. Not long afterwards he was arrested again on another charge of forgery and was sentenced to a term in Dorchester penitentiary. After serving his term at this institution, he made his way back to Sydney. This was during the steel strike of 192. He secured a job at the steel plant. When the strike was brought to an end, he left the city and was unheard of until a year or so later, when he arrived back once more, decked in the uniform of an American naval officer. He spread about the city a highly colorful story of being master of an ocean going liner.


He even went so far as to invite a prominent clergyman here to come and visit his ship, which was supposed to be lying in the stream at North Sydney, which is situated about five miles from Sydney. He also hired five local youths, promising them well paying positions on this mythical ship.

Their hopes and aspirations were suddenly dashed when they learned that no such steamer had ever entered that port and that George had left the same night for parts unknown. He was next heard from in Halifax, where he was again faced with forgery charges. He then made his way to the States.

MY NEIGHBOR SAYS.

The liquor from any canned fruit may be made into a fruit jelly. Served with whipped cream it makes a nice dessert. Chopped nuts stirred into jelly as it begins to harden are a worthwhile addition.

When using sour milk or cream in making cooking or doughnuts mix them up the night before and set them on ice. They will roll out with less flour, will be light and keep moist much longer than by the usual method.

To restore faded upholstery beat the dust out, then brush. Apply a strong lather of castile soap with a hard brush, wash off with clear water, then wash off with alum water. On becoming dry the colors will look as well as ever.

To keep paint brushes in good condition after using clean the bristles with turpentine; wash out the turpentine with common yellow soap and water; straighten out the bristles with a comb; wrap the brush in paper and put it away where it will not be subjected to heat or excessive moisture. Brushes should never be immersed in water for any length of time. The future value of the brush depends on the cleaning and care you give it.

WHITE MOUNTAIN ICING.

One cup granulated sugar, 1-3 cup water, 1 egg white, 1 teaspoon vanilla 1-16 (pinch) teaspoon cream of tartar.

Place sugar, water, and cream of tartar in a sauce pan and stir until sugar is dissolved. Boil without stirring, until syrup will thread when dropped from tip of spoon (240 degrees F.) Pour syrup gradually over stiffly beaten egg white, beating constantly. Continue beating until of right consistency to spread. Add flavoring and spread over cake. Chopped walnuts scattered over frosting as soon as it is spread make a pleasing addition.

If results prove that the white mountain icing has been cooked or beaten too long, it may be placed in a pan over boiling water and beaten. A few drops of hot water

CORN MEAL MUFFINS

One cup corn meal, 1 cup flour, 2 slightly rounding teaspoons of baking powder, 1-4 cup sugar, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1 egg, 1-4 cup of sweet milk, 2 or 3 tablespoons of melted butter.

Sift the dry ingredients together twice. Add milk add shortening and then dispose in a hot well buttered pan. Bake 25 minutes.


