WHEREABOUTS OF  
MISSING MAN

Lewis Burden, Who Disappeared From Home in Queensbury Tuesday Not Yet Found — Engaged in Search.

Despite all efforts to discover the whereabouts of Lewis Burden, who has been missing since Tuesday of this week from his home in Queensbury, the operations of police and relatives have been futile so far. The supposition that Mr. Burden may have been drowned led to grapplers being used in the river across from his home and Charles Fleet went up from this city yesterday to aid in the rescue work. He was accompanied by Sergeant John Bird and several officers of the New Brunswick Provinces Police.

Relatives of the missing man, which include his father, George F. Burden and his brother, E. E. Burden are assisting in the search in the Queensbury district today. Captain Salt and Sergeant Bird of the Provincial police are carrying on investigations relative to the young man's disappearance. It has been learned that Mr. Burden has been working at the home of his cousin, Harry A. Slipp for the past few years and it was from his home that he mysteriously disappeared on Tuesday evening. Those on the farm said that he was last seen going toward the barn early in the evening.

FOUR ARRESTED

Farmers are Now Getting Ready to Place Goods on Market — Foreign Shipping of Spuds Has Started.

The harvesting of potatoes in the province of New Brunswick has been practically completed and the farmers are now preparing to place their goods on the market or place them in winter storage. Reliable farming sources claim that the potato yield this year has been about average with some parts of the province growing large and good quality "spuds" and others not quite so good. The close of the present month will see a windup in digging operations and as mentioned before shipping will commence.

Shipping Commenced.  
Shipping operations are being carried on at the present time and the expectation is that Quebec will receive the largest quantity of the New Brunswick market. Already carloads have been sent to main points in that province, as Montreal, Quebec and Three Rivers. Some of the provincial market will be sent to Cuba and parts in the
