

EMBASSY CLUB OF LONDON IS RATHER EXCLUSIVE AND VERY DIFFICULT TO ENTER

Boston, Dec. 17.—The only entertainment club in the world where one can't buy his way in for an evening of pleasure is the Embassy Club of London. Perhaps that is the reason why countless Americans would gladly pass up a dozen or so more enjoyable restaurants and clubs in London for the privilege of saying, "When we were at the Embassy in London." And that too must account for the fact that they don't mind giving up four or five precious days of their limited tours to the job of trying to "negotiate an entrance" in this club made famous by the Prince of Wales and his coterie.

In truth, the Embassy Club is no more interesting than the Kit Kat Club, which is open to anyone with the price for the "couvert." The entertainment there is infinitely better and the dance music is just as good, if not more "jazzy" and up to the minute. And as for the crowd, well, if one goes often enough, he will see everybody at the Kit Kat that he can see at the Embassy. And, for sheer excitement, the Embassy is certainly a far cry from the famous "43 Club," which has a habit of being raided every fortnight.

An Exclusive Place.

But none of these places is as "exclusive" as the Embassy. And there is the story! On the eastward-bound boats one begins to hear the talk about the Embassy. A certain American man, not young or attractive, but "important," happened to be a member of this club, and his popularity was a thing of wonder. As it is impossible to go there without a mem-

ber, he was the key to the situation. And, strangely, this desire to go to the Embassy Club is not confined to the socially ambitious crowd.

For example, Grace Davidson, who tells about it in the Boston Post, happened to meet a young Boston man and his wife in London, agog with the one driving desire to "get into the Embassy." The man was fairly comfortable, but of no particular social standing. They had heard everyone talking on the boat of how hard it was to get into the Embassy, and the young Boston man made up his mind that he could accomplish the feat.

They arrived in London on a Thursday and had been so busy with the business of trying to make the Embassy that by Monday they hadn't had time to recognize Westminster Abbey or the Statue of Lord Nelson at Trafalgar square. Through devious channels the young man succeeded in making the acquaintance of the orchestra leader of the Piccadilly Hotel, who was a friend of the orchestra leader at the Embassy. He was advised to put \$125 in an envelope and send it up to the head waiter at the Embassy and see what happened. LIGHT FRUIT CAKE

1 cup butter
2 cups granulated sugar
1 cup sweet milk
2 1/2 cups flour
1 cup shredded coconut
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon lemon extract
1 pound blanched almonds
1 pound blanched raisins
1-2 pound candied pineapple
1-4 pound candied cherries
1-4 pound candied citron peel
Whites of 7 eggs beaten stiff
Cream butter and sugar, add milk eggs. Dredge raisins and almonds in flour, add all ingredients, mix thoroughly. Bake in ordinary bread tins two hours in a slow oven.

BUTTERMILK DOUGHNUTS

1 1/2 cups sugar
Butter size of an egg
2 eggs
1 cup buttermilk
1 level teaspoon soda dissolved in buttermilk
2-3 teaspoon nutmeg
1 teaspoon baking powder
1-2 teaspoon salt
Flour to make dough to roll out
Fry in deep fat

DARK FRUIT CAKE

1 pound butter
3-4 tablespoon lemon juice
1 pound seeded raisins
2 pounds currants
1-2 pound candied citron
1 pound dates
1-2 pound Brazil nuts
1-2 pound walnuts
1-2 pound almonds, split
1-2 pound candied cherries
1-4 pound lemon peel
1-4 pound orange peel
1 glass brandy flavoring
2 teaspoons cinnamon
1-2 teaspoon cloves
1 1/2 teaspoons nutmeg
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 quart flour
Baking powder, spices with flour.
Bake. Use some flour to dredge fruit. Sift in ordinary bread tins
3 1/2 hours in very slow oven.

Split hot biscuits, butter them and spread with cold beans mashed to a paste and mixed with mayonnaise and a chopped dill pickle.

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TOMATO JELLY AND EGG SALAD

Canned tomatoes
1 tablespoon granulated gelatin
1-2 tablespoon sugar
Bit of bay leaf
3-4 tablespoon lemon juice
Leaves from 1 stalk celery
Drain juice from tomatoes. To one cup juice add the gelatin, sugar bay leaf, lemon juice and celery leaves. Stir until boiling point is reached and gelatin is dissolved and strain. Put a layer of jelly in individual molds. When it begins to stiffen, place one hard cooked egg in each mold and surround it with jelly. When ready to serve turn the jellied eggs on to shredded cabbage or nests of lettuce leaves and serve with a boiled dressing.

Conscience is that still small voice that bothers a man after the Grand Jury has returned a true bill.

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




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
