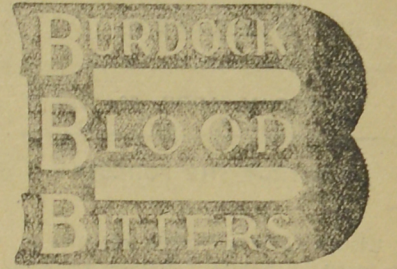
"The farm in Ontario is a lovely sort of place," he said, "and the words straight from home ought to cheer me up."

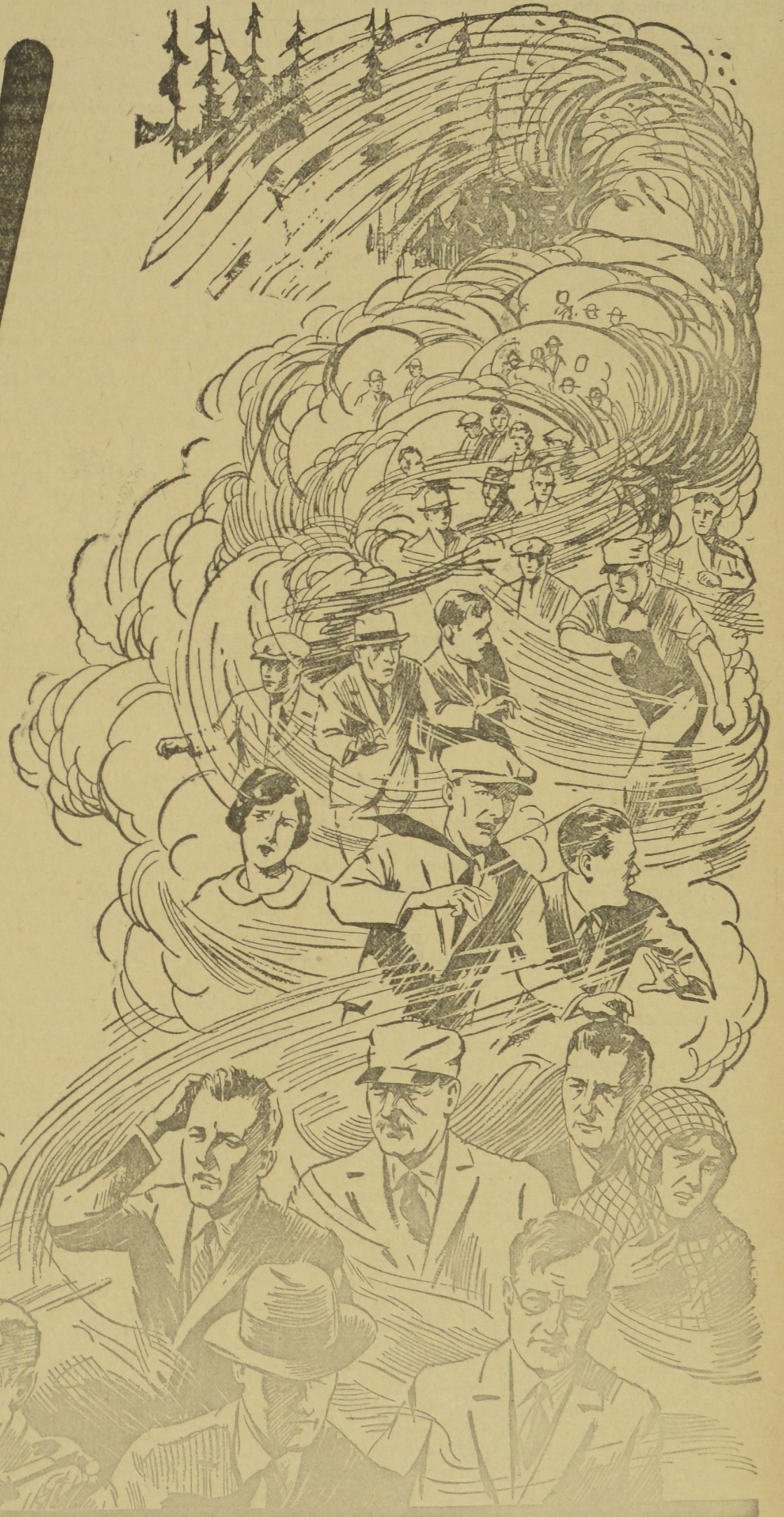
