YORK COUNTY LEAGUE OPENS; FAST GAMES

U. N. B. Beat Devon Tigers by 2-0
Score—Frederickton Defeats
Marysville 5-1.

A pair of hectic ice skirmishes celebrated the inaugural of the York County league at the Arctic Rink last evening, at which a fair sized crowd was present. In the first game, the U. N. B. entry, composed of practically spares of the regular University squad handed the Devon Tigers, pre-favorites for the game, a 2 to 0 defeat in three fast sessions. The second game between the Frederickton sextet and the Marysville squad ended decisively in favor of the local team by the score of 5 to 1.

U. N. B. 2; Devon, 0.

Jake Lynch, of the University squad opened scoring activities near the end of the first period when he slammed one by "Tart" Titus for the opening tally. Play was fast and numerous individual rushes with some fairly good combination at times featured play in the early session. The Devon Tigers with a lineup similar to the one used against the Marysville sextet several nights ago, and incidentally similar to last season's team, were using combination, but their forwards couldn't seem to get working, and were missing passes many times in front of the cage.

The second period opened fast and was scoreless throughout, although both teams came near denting the twine on numerous occasions. Relief was used on both teams in this session. The Red and Black forward line was a spare one, not one of the regular offensive men being on the ice.

The third period began with a rush and play continued at that pace. In the final minutes of play, Titus stopped a hot shot and came out of his nets to clear; he bashed the rubber to the side of the rink, where Dobby Love was in direct position for a shot. It was while "Tart" was making his way back into the net that Love batted the second counter in making the count 2 to 0 for the College team. Scoring was ended with this tally and play ended with the Tigers trying desperately to score. Buck Miles on the wing being particularly aggressive.

The second game of the evening was by far the roughest game of the two. The first period was "real rough" the boys being evidently peeved at something, probably overly anxious to win the opening skirmish. The opening period ended scoreless. The remainder of the game was wholly Frederickton's and when the smoke cleared away it was found that the capital outfit had scored five counters while the Marysville tribe had secured only a bare tally which was batted in by "Hec" Miller in a skirmish in front of the net. Armstrong on the wing for the Frederickton sextet shoved all five goals across the black line for the capital aggregate.

But four of last year's Intermediate champions were on the ice last evening. Cliff Young, goaler, Harold Keene and Archie Sterling, defence and Albert Hanson. Mark Wade, Charlie Wade and Armstrong on the forward line make a strong offensive trio for the capital team this year. Bill Rutter, Eddie Burt, Trites, F. Wade, were used part of the game as relief. The Marysville team lineup was the same as the game played against the Devon sextet several nights ago at the arena.

Sussex, Jan. 19—The Colts relegated Frederickton to the cellar position in the first section of the New Brunswick Southern League, when they whitewashed them here tonight to the tune of two to nothing. The game was fast and replete with thrills, both teams putting up a stellar exhibition of hockey. The ice was in excellent condition and both teams staged excellent combination play. The first goal came in the second period when H. Radcliffe beat Hickson on an impossible shot on an excellent assist by Hunter.

A solo effort by Hunter in the third period tallied the second goal for the Colts. The game was clean and well contested, Frederickton staging a five-man offence in the third stanza which was at all times dangerous.

Irvine Hurt.

Irvine was hurt at the latter end of the first period, but after medical attention resumed play in the second stanza and carried on till the end of the game. Both goal tenders excelled themselves, making what seemed impossible stops time and time again.

Jack Brown, who refereed, was entirely impartial and comparatively few penalties were handed out.

RICKARD GIVES HIS OPINION OF 1927 FIGHTERS

All Champions Lead Classes—Declares Tunney Best of Bunch—
Dempsey in Second Place.

New York, Jan. 12—For the fourth successive year, Tex Rickard today lined up the rank and file of pugilists for The Ring, a boxing publication, and at the head of the parade set Gene Tunney, who just recently declared war on the promoter.

There was little variation from the generally accepted ratings of the leather toilers. All recognized champions lead their classes, except in the somewhat obscure junior welterweight section, where Ruby Goldstein gains top position over Mushy Calahan, hailed as champion of the 140-pound class.

In all but the heavyweight class, the promoter split the divisions into two groups, only the first of which were ranked numerically, among the ponderous battlers—Rickard set Tunney first, Jack Dempsey second and Jack Sharkey third before dividing the remainder of the heavyweights into two groups.

Rickard deplored the lack of outstanding foreign contenders in a copyrighted article, accompanying the selections, but declared there were "happy compensations—new records, healthy conditions, splendid champions and a rosy future." He declared Gene Tunney the "big sensation of last year, as he was the shining light of 1926."

RICKARD PLANS TWO ELIM. BOUTS FOR TITLE

Wants Heeney and Delaney on March 1—Risko and Sharkey For March 12—Dempsey Wants Bout.

New York, Jan. 19—Tex Rickard's plan for developing a suitable opponent for Gene Tunney underwent another shuffle tonight when the promoter outlined a program matching Tom Heeney and Jack Delaney for March 1 and Johnny Risko and Jack Sharkey for March 12.

Those matches are now tentative, but Rickard stated definite arrangements probably would be made before he departed for Miami tomorrow night for a conference with the champion.

According to Rickard, he plans to match the winners of both the March bouts to decide who will come out on top of the elimination process.

It was understood that Jack Dempsey had notified Rickard he would not box Tunney next June, but preferred to wait until next September. The promoter said such a decision by Dempsey was not final.

"I'm still in a quandary as the result of the Sharkey-Heeney affair, but if the results of these bouts show up favorably, I will pit the victor of the elimination against Tunney or Dempsey," Rickard said.

"I would prefer to have the winner in the elimination box Dempsey in June and the victor of that affair oppose Tunney in September. It will be along that line that I shall try to persuade Tunney to have but one fight this year."

The actual signing for the heavyweight elimination bouts is expected to take place tomorrow.

MONTREAL CLUB GETS SHORTSTOP FROM YORK CLUB

Joe Faber, Minor League Short Fielder Has Good Arm and Batting Average of .324.

Montreal, Jan. 19—Joe Faber, shortstop of the York (Pa.) club of the New York-Pennsylvania League for the past three seasons, was today purchased for a substantial cash consideration by the Montreal Exhibition Company. Ltd. He was regarded as the best prospect in the N. Y. P. League last season and several clubs had made offers for him, but none was heretofore willing to pay the high price that the York officials held on his release.

Faber broke into organized baseball four seasons ago, and each year has shown marked improvement and while with York contributed no small part to the winning of a pennant there. For more than a year Manager Stallings has been anxious to secure this player for Faber combines all the attributes of a successful player, combined with the fact that he is still young and seems to be on the threshold of a career that will eventually land him in the majors. He possesses that first essential of all good shortstops, namely, an excellent throwing arm. He can whip the ball across the diamond with lightning speed, and can get it away from any position. His official batting average, last season, was .324.

With the purchase of Faber the Montreal Club's infield for the 1928 championship race may be regarded as definitely determined upon. It will be a decidedly faster infield than Jersey City Club had last season. First base will be cared for by Frank Stapleton, purchased by Manager Stallings during the baseball meeting at Dallas, Texas, from the Bridgeport Club of the Eastern League.

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
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
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
