Capitol-Fusilier Feud Ends in Overtime Draw

Three Periods of Overtime Necessary in Second Section Opener Last Night—Hickson Unable to Play and Was Replaced by Young in the Capitol Nets—Sterling Exhibition—Orlo Keene Back in Local Lineup—Earnst, New Comer Gets One for Fusiliers—Large Crowd See Brilliant Overtime Ice Battle at Arctic.

Fighting desperately for three hectic overtime ten minute periods the St. John Fusiliers and the local Green and White sextet were unable to break the deadlock, and the opening game of the second section played here last evening at the Arctic Rink was shunted into the record books with a 3-3 score attached to it. The game was probably the best seen here this winter and provided the large crowd which thronged the arena with six periods of whirlwind hockey which had the fans on edge throughout.

As in the previous ice skirmish here between the two teams, they appeared from a spectacular point of view to be about equal; with the southern team having the edge in combination play and the local team excelling in individual brilliance. A feature of the evening's play was the superior goal tending of the rival goalies "Cliff" Young and Wilson for the Fusiliers.

"Cliff" Young in the local nets played a wonderful game, making marvelous saves and stopping long shots and close ones with equal ease and certainty. Earl Hickson regular Capitol goaler, was not able to don the pads for the section opening clash on account of trouble with his eyes and Young filled his place in admirable style. Young, playing his first senior game in the twines made twenty-seven stops in the first period and allowed but one shot to sift by him on its merits, the other two were decidedly of the fluky variety. Wilson, the soldier goaler also played remarkable hockey in the other nets and after the second period was well nigh impregnable.

Scoring Alternate.

St. John commenced the game with their regular lineup with the exception of "Brad" Gilbert defence veteran who subbed for part of the first period. The Capitol offensive was strengthened by the return of Captain Orlo Keene who played his usual reliable game on the wing after a two weeks layoff. The game opened fast with individual efforts featuring the first five minutes. The Soldier team used Earnst and Phil Stein at different stages of the game

and Ernst beside scoring the opening counter played a rugged game for the team from the south.

Ernst Gets First.

What looked from the boards to be a fluky one slipped by Young about halfway through the period giving the Fusiliers a one goal lead. St. John was using combination rushes which were effective. Charlie Wade and Eloi McKenna were doing some real defense work and time after time on solo and combined efforts. The period ended with St. John on the upper end of a 1-0 score.

Second Period.

The second session started with a rush; "Kato" Keene was in front of the Fusilier net on top of rebounds trying desperately to shove in the tying counter. Keating and Clark on the Fusilier firing line were using an effective two man defence and made several combined visits down the ice only to be frustrated by the smoothly working Capital rear guard.

C. Wade Gets Capital First.

A wonderful piece of stick handling through the entire Fusilier sextet and a beautiful pass to the front of the cage by Charlie Wade and "Si" Keenan who was skating over everything smashed the disc into the twines on a nice shot for the initial and tying Capitol counter. Play continued at the fast pace commenced and both teams used relief frequently. Creighton, Harrison and "Knucker" Irvine were used alternately on the front line. A feature of the period was the net tending of the rival custodians who both seemed to be right on.

One Apiece in Third.

Bartlett, on the Fusilier defence and fresh from his recent Nova Scotia-Varsity Grad game was playing a steady game on the back division ably assisted by Brad Gilbert and young Ernst, a newcomer. Bartlett got two minutes for tripping soon after the period opened and was followed by Aldy Clark a few minutes later for a like offence. With the period over half gone Keating, center flash of the Soldier team scored St. John's second counter on a solo attempt and quick shot. Play became faster; but it was not until with about a minute or less to go that the Capitols evened the count and necessitated overtime play.

Mixup Caused Argument.

Chalmers batted in the evening counter from a mixup in front of the opponent's nets. The bell rang in the heat of the argument with Wilson lying flat in his goal and half the Fredericton and St. John team on top of him.

First Two Not Enough.

The first ten minute overtime period was fruitless. In the second with play getting faster and more heated Bartlett notched what looked to be the deciding tally when another one of those slow tantalizing disc pokes twisted into the meshes under Young's skates.

Capitols Stage Do-or-Die.

With about another minute of play Eloi McKenna flashed the tying counter by Wilson on a side shot which bounced off of Bartlett's pads. Both teams battled gamely but ineffectually for the winner in the final ten minutes; but the rival net minders ruled otherwise and the game ended with the tired play-

Boston, Jan. 24—For the third time this season the Boston Bruins and the Pittsburgh Pirates battled to a scoreless overtime tie in a National Hockey League contest here tonight. In their three meetings the teams have played a total of 210 minutes without a tally. The single point gained by the Bruins as a result of the tie placed them at the head of the American division of the league as the New York Rangers with whom they were bracketed in the standing were idle tonight. The game was rugged and rough through out and 16 penalties were imposed by the referee. Smith, Pittsburgh defense man, earned a major penalty in the final moments of the game by tripping Clapper of the Bruins to cut off a score.

New York, Jan. 24—The world champion Ottawa Senators came out of their slump when they shut out the New York Americans 2 to 0 in a National Hockey League game here tonight. It was the champion's first victory since January 7 when the Americans were also the victims and their first on Garden ice in three games this season.

59 HORSES ARE ELIGIBLE FOR HAMBLETONIAN

3-Year-Old Stake Has Entry of 59 Eligibles Coming Season—Fireglon 2:04 and Scotland 2:05 Entered in This Class.

Chicago, Jan. 24—A total of 59 colts and fillies has been kept eligible to this year's Hambletonian 3 year old trotting stake, richest event in the light harness racing sport. With the January payment being made on so large a number, the fixture is certain to be worth more than the 927 edition, which had a value of \$54,194 more than the Kentucky Derby.

Among the eligibles are the star two year olds of last year, Fireglow 2:04; Scotland 2:05; Spencer 2:05½; The Virginia Senator 2:07¼ and Red Aubrey 2:08¼. This quintet proved the greatest group of juveniles ever to race in one season. Fireglow retired with the world race record for age and gait of 2:04.

PLAYER TRADES BOUND TO MAKE BIG DIFFERENCE

New York Jan. 23—A winter season that saw some of the game's most prominent stars bought, sold or traded apparently has a stage for another free for all scramble for National League pennant honors next summer.

The sensational player shifts of the off-season have left four clubs and possibly six to be reckoned with in any discussion of championship potentialities. Heading the list are the Pittsburgh Pirates defending title holders. Donie Bush seeking his second pennant in as many years at the helm of the Corsair crew probably will find chief opposition coming from the St. Louis, Chicago and New York clubs. Cincinnati on the strength of a fine 1927 finish and Boston with Hornsby also are considered in the running by observers. Brooklyn and Philadelphia on the basis of their records last year and their present "paper power" seems slated for second division berths, although both are strengthened.

Art Gagne led the scoring fest with four counters to his credit. Morenz scored two, while Mantha, Joliat, Deduc and Lepine got one apiece.

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
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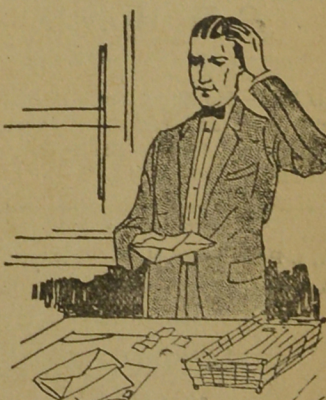
