SIR RICHARD SQUIRES HAS EXECUTED A COME BACK IN THE NEWFOUNDLAND ELECTIONS

St. John's, Nfld., Oct. 31—With three additional seats, already conceded, finally declared in favor of the opposition, and with the same number definitely added to the government forces, twenty-one representatives of the opposition party headed by Sir Richard Squires, former Premier, were lined up tonight against an array of nine supporters of Hon. F. G. Alderdice, leader of the government or United Newfoundland Party. Ten constituencies, each electing one representative, were yet to be heard from, but the final result of Monday's election was merely a question of the majority likely to be secured by the Squires party.

Among the polls declared this afternoon was St. John's City East, where Hon. Mr. Alderdice led the poll with a count of 3,826 votes. His colleague, G. Byrne, was also elected with a total of 3,687 as against 2,956 for W. Brophy and 2,764 for E. Churchill, the opposition candidates. The result in St. John's East was the opposite of that in St. John's West, where Dr. Alex. Campbell, of the opposition, led with 4,352 votes. Sir Richard Squires' election in Humber had privately been declared.

Issues of Campaign.

The defeat of the Alderdice government was not unexpected by students of Newfoundland politics. Hon. F. C. Alderdice undertook the reorganization of the government after the retirement a few weeks ago of Hon. W. S. Monroe, the Prime Minister, and as leader of the United Newfoundland Party, appealed to the electorate in part on the record of the old government and in part on a constructive program offered for their consideration. Mr. Alderdice, in his manifesto, also stressed what he claimed was the moral issue of preventing the destinies of Newfoundland being "controlled by men already proven unworthy of trust." In this he referred to the resignation of Sir Richard Squires as Prime Minister in 1923 as a result of reported irregularities in several departments, which was followed by an investigation by T. Hollis Walker, K. C., an English jurist, as royal commissioner, whose report sustained those charges.

Sir Richard Squires has now sought and gained vindication at the hands of the electorate.

A contributing factor to the success no doubt has been the unpopularity of the high tariff, averaging more than 50 per cent, imposed by the Monroe government, which at the same time dropped the income and other direct taxation. The effect of the tariff was to increase very much the cost of living and in particular was unpopular with the fishermen, whose political organization was thrown up support Sir Richard Squires. In his manifesto Mr. Alderdice promised to remove duties on lines, twines, dory oars and other fishery accessories.

He retired from active business several years ago and is now enjoying the fruits of his labors. Mr. Snyder is no stranger to New Brunswick, he having made his first hunting trip to the Miramichi twenty-five years ago under the guidance of the Griffins, father and son. He spent several weeks salmon fishing on the river only last summer. He then learned from Mr. Griffin that the Rocky Bend pool was on the market, and after looking over the ground gave instructions to buy the property. Only a short time ago Mr. Snyder returned from a trip to the old country. It would not be a matter for surprise should he decide to spend his summers on the Miramichi in future.

Mr. W. T. Griffin, who will look after the property for the Messrs. Snyder, is one of the best known and most successful guides in the province. For a number of years he has specialized on salmon angling on the Upper Southwest Miramichi and has guided many American fishermen on
