WORLD'S RECORD

Barred Rock Hen in N.  
B. Laying Contest  
Finished Year With  
332 Eggs — Highest  
Official Record.

After smashing the Canadian official egg laying record and coming within one of beating the world's record for its breed a Barred Plymouth Rock hen belonging to the winning pen of Mrs. Edward Hart of Grand Bay, Kings County, in the N. B. egg laying contest, will be shipped home tomorrow by the Canadian National Railways. In the neighboring republic a few years ago a White Leghorn hen which had made a record in an egg laying contest was honored by a berth in a Pullman car, but Mrs. Hart's wonderful bird will be content to travel by express with charges collectable when its destination is reached.

Has Laid 332 Eggs.

This remarkable bird this morning laid its 332nd egg, and completed its year under the regulations which govern egg laying contests. As it started laying on November 2nd of last year it had been planned to keep it on the
