## SOLUTION OF VALLEY RAILWAY PROBLEM WILL SOON BE FOUND, ACCORDING TO PREMIER BAXTER

Bathurst, Aug. 22—Negotiations toward the acquisition of the Saint John and Quebec Railway, commonly known as the valley, were proceeding very satisfactorily at the present time and it was hoped a solution would be reached soon, it was announced by Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, premier of the province this evening at the large gathering of Conservative supporters in the Opera House here, at which the special speaker was Hon. R. B. Bennett, K. C., leader of the opposition in the Federal Government.

Referring to the highway situation in the province, Premier Baxter declared that there was as fine roads in New Brunswick as could be found in any other province, not excepting the by-roads. The Minister of Public Works had issued orders for a comprehensive program to keep the surface of the roads in good condition.

"And I say to every supervisor or other employee of the highway department," declared the Premier, "that he need expect no political pull to retain his position should he choose to disobey the set orders and fails to earn his day's pay and use his brains in the upkeep of his particular section of the provincial highways."

#### Scores Government.

Hon. Mr. Bennett scored the present federal government for allowing the young men and women of the country to migrate to the country to the south, where, he said, in many cases they were employed in manufacturing products which could as well be manufactured in Canada instead of being shipped to the United States. He pledged the support of the Conservative party in carrying to fulfillment the recommendations of the Duncan Commission which had as yet not been realized, including the provisions for the iron and steel industry.

The Conservative chieftain and his sister Miss Mildred Bennett, were warmly welcomed in Bathurst. At noon Miss Bennett was the guest of honor at a luncheon in the Gloucester Hotel, at which the hostess was Mrs. Angus McLean. Hon. Mr. Bennett and his sister were both dinner guests of Mr. and Mrs. McLean at their cottage "Duart" this evening. Miss Bennett was presented with a beautiful bouquet during the meeting by Miss Jean Mance Landry, daughter of Mayor Landry.

#### In the Evening.

The chairman of the meeting was J. L. Ryan, who in his introductory remarks pointed out that since the earliest times there had been chieftains and stressed the honor received by a former New Brunswick boy when at the greatest Conservative convention ever held he was named to lead the party.

Alderman J. B. Hachey in the absence of Mayor Landry, extended a welcome to the visitors on behalf of the town.

J. S. Dumas, who was a defeated candidate in the last election, gave an address in French.

Premier Baxter gave a general review of the work accomplished by the Conservative party during the last three years. He told his hearers that they would compare his utterances in the past and find them in nearly every case implemented. "Our record," he declared, "is one of truthfulness to the principle of things worth while in the affairs of Canada."

#### Hon. Mr. Bennett.

Hon. Mr. Bennett referred to the several reciprocity bills which Canada had had with the United States at various times, affecting the export of products into the country to the south. This tax affected practically all products and as for manufactured goods, he said, they were met with a toll at the door large enough to keep them out.

No country in the temperate zone had so varied resources as had Canada, said the speaker. On the other hand Canada had established a record as the first customer of the United States of all countries of the world, that republic having received \$750,000,000 Canadian money in exchange for iron, steel, etc. In this he referred to his visit to Nova Scotia when he saw the great steel plants idle because Canada was purchasing her pro-

duct over the border. Far worse in this regard, however, declared Hon. Mr. Bennett was the export of some 591,000 men and women to the United States in the last six years, not counting the many thousands who went on visits and never returned. The two went hand in hand he said. The reason that the young people left their homes was because there was no work, due in a large degree to the spending of Canadian capital in the United States and should and could as well be used at home.

Canada hadn't a chance to compete on equal terms with other countries, he said, but it was the duty of the government to see that the young people stay in their home country and find them employment.

The fault lay with the present government, he said, who did not know how to handle the situation, or knowing did not care. What was the remedy? All that was required was a chance to compete. No favors were asked. How did the Canadian workman want to be protected? He wanted a job. He pointed out the great benefits which the pulp mill had been to the North Shore. In Nova Scotia, he said, everywhere could be seen pulp wood being shipped away to Maine and it was quite likely that young men from the same province assisted in its manufacture later.

In conclusion he asked what will the country become if it continues to lose its greatest assets, its men and women.

He urged his hearers to ponder over the matter which was of vital importance in the life of Canada today, so that, he said, not only our own people but those who come after us may find enjoyment and expression in the land of their nativity.

## LUCERNE CURBS LIQUOR SALE

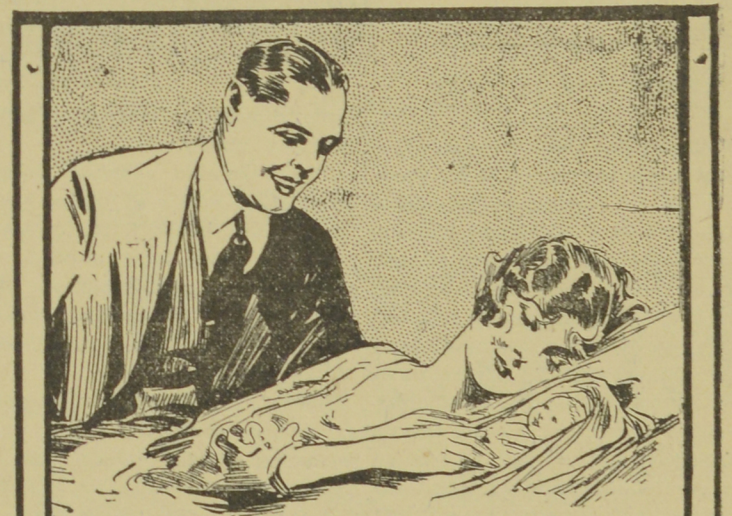

## REPORTS HUGE INCREASE IN GAME BIRDS

Olympia, Wash., Aug. 23—Chinese pheasants are over-running the Northwestern states, being reported numerous in every section. They are a boon to hunters and are hailed by agriculturists as beneficial to crops.

Since pheasants have increased, the farmers declare, grasshoppers, crickets and locusts have almost entirely disappeared. 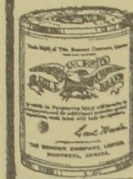
