EXPLOSION IN FACTORY AT EAST LYNN, MASS., TAKES A TOLL OF SEVENTEEN LIVES

Lynn, Mass., Nov. 8—Seventeen persons were dead and six others were in a serious condition at the Lynn hospital tonight as a result of an explosion and fire which destroyed the plant of the Preble Box Toe Company and damaged six nearby buildings in East Lynn today.

Twelve of the victims were killed outright by the explosion or burned to death in the fire which followed it, while five others died after being taken to the hospital. Six of the dead and one of those now at the hospital were members of the family of Harry Blaney, who lived in a two-tenement house within 10 feet of the rear of the plant.

Burned in Fire.

His wife, Mrs. Lillian Blaney, and four of their children burned to death in the fire which swept their home after the explosion. These children were: Thelma, 13; Arthur, 10; Helen, 7, and Harriet, aged six months. Another Blaney child, Vivian, 15, was rescued from the burning house while still alive, but died a few hours later at the hospital. The father was in a serious condition at the hospital tonight.

Two other members of the family, Harry, jr., 17, and Norman, 14, were also taken to the hospital, but were discharged after treatment. Two other children had left the house just before the explosion occurred, Ella, 21, and Lillian, 12.

Explosive Materials.

The others who lost their lives were employees of the Box Toe plant, a one-storey building of concrete construction. The plant manufactured box toes for shoes, using celluloid and other explosive materials in the process.

The plant employs about 20, but several workmen had not reported when the explosion occurred.

The employees killed were: Louis E. Puffer, of Swampscott, foreman; William Clements, John Wilson, Percy H. Smith, Alfred P. Harris, John Cowder and Charles Mitchell, all of Lynn. Four others, Joseph McCarthy, James Wright, Everett Lewis and Israel Clements, died after being removed to the hospital.

Condition Serious.

Five other employees were taken to the hospital, where their condition was said to be serious tonight.

The explosion blew out the rear wall of the factory and a section of the roof collapsed. Houses in the neighborhood were shaken and windows shattered. Six of these dwellings caught fire, but the flames were checked by the fire department, which arrived soon after the explosion.

To Investigate.

Boston, Nov. 8—The state fire marshal's office today assigned three chemists to visit the plant of the Preble Box Toe Company in East Lynn, wrecked by an explosion early today. They were instructed to investigate the cause of the explosion.

Cigarette the Cause.

Lynn, Mass., Nov. 8—Live ashes thoughtlessly flicked from a cigarette or a cigar in a workman's hands appeared tonight the most logical explanation of a terrific chemical celluloid explosion which today snuffed out the lives of 17 persons. Tonight firemen, police and volunteers were still searching the rain-soaked, twisted wreckage for an employee reported missing and feared to be buried in the ruins.

MANY APPLES BEING SENT TO ENGLAND

Ottawa, Nov. 8—Canada's apples are becoming more popular in the British Isles. Exports so far this season, according to figures published by the Fruit Branch of the Department of Agriculture, amounted to 183,063 barrels, and 51,322 boxes. This is a substantial increase over the totals of 143,012 barrels and 211,943 boxes for 1927, and 160,114 barrels and 403,025 boxes for 1926.

The enormous apple crop in British Columbia is, however, reflecting on prices. Cables from Liverpool indicate the lowest prices for several years. MacIntosh apples, fancy grade, are selling at an average price of \$2.54 a box in Liverpool as compared with \$3.73 for 1927 and \$3.02 for 1926. Jonathan apples are priced at an average price of \$2.05 as compared with \$3.83 for 1927, and \$2.91 for 1926. King apples, No. 1 grade, are selling at \$5.17 a barrel as compared with \$7.35 for 1927, and \$6.20 for 1926. Shipments of Ontario apples are stated to be light and representative prices are not available.
