OBSERVANCE
HERE ON SUNDAY

Plans Completed For
Annual Observance of
Close of World War—
Program at Cenotaph
Graves Decorated.

Plans in this city for the observance of the tenth anniversary of the signing of the Armistice, which ended the titanic World War, November 11, 1918, have completed and the usual ceremonies will take place. The chief feature of this observance will be the annual service at the cenotaph in which the citizens will be permitted to take part. On Sunday, the usual yearly Armistice Memorial Service and reclamation of graves will be held, conducted by the Fredericton Branch, Canadian Legion, B. E. S. L.

Cenotaph Program

The program at the cenotaph on Sunday morning will open the proceedings with a few remarks, after which the hymn "O God Our Help In Ages Past" will be sung by those present. Rev. George Telford of the St. Paul's United church will conduct the prayer. Then there will be a reading of the Honor Roll by Sergeant Major Augustus Fowler, to be followed by an address by Very Rev. Dean Scovil Neales. The hymn "Abide With Me" will next be sung and then the placing of floral wreaths.

Two Minutes Silence

At eleven o'clock, two minutes silence will be observed, not only at the cenotaph but all over the Dominion at this time similar silence for two minutes will be hallowed. The sounding of the "Last Post" will be by Bugler Seymour Tyler, after which the benediction will be pronounced by Very Rev. Dean Neales. The sounding of the "Reveille" by

Court Completed November Docket Yesterday Afternoon — Last Case is That of Tripp vs. Tripp.

The New Brunswick Divorce Court completed its November term yesterday afternoon when they finished the case of Harry Tripp vs Leah Tripp, the last case on the docket. Adjournment was then made until December 11, when judgments will be handed down by the court. In the latter case, heard before the court, Mr. Justice Crockett presiding, infidelity is the charge made by the plaintiff, Harry Tripp against his wife. The couple are from Albert County. The husband alleges that the defendant separated from him and went to live with Allan Murray at Irish Settlement, Westmorland County. Evidence showed that she had bore the latter several children.
