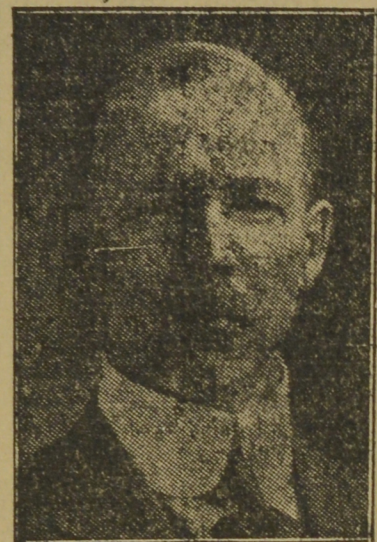

HON. MR. RICHARDS IS VERY OPTIMISTIC IN REGARD TO THE FUTURE OF THE PROVINCE

"It is clear that New Brunswick has emerged from the period of post-war depression and the implementing of the Duncan Commission's report as far as has been done makes the outlook brighter", said Hon. Charles D. Richards, Minister of Lands and Mines in the New Brunswick Government in a address at the Fredericton Rotary Club on Tuesday. "New life, courage and hope has been brought to us by what has occurred in the Diamond Jubilee year of Confederation; but we must now press forward with our own efforts and make what we can of the

natural assets and the great potentialities of this Province, of which we have not taken full advantage in the past."

Hon. Mr. Richards thus concluded a brief review of the events of the past year with which he preceded a bright picture of what the future has in store for New Brunswick in the expansion that is now taking place in the important industries which come within the scope of the Department of Lands and Mines, over which he presides. With three large organizations—International Paper Company, Fraser Companies and the Bathurst Company—prepared to make large investments in carrying out their programs for expansion of the pulp and paper operations, he predicted that New Brunswick would soon be occupying an important place in that industry. Readjustments and some dislocations must of necessity occur in the period of transition while the pulp and paper industry was replacing the long lumber business carried on for so many years so extensively in this Province and it was to be regretted that there must inevitably be the elimination of some smaller industries which would have to give way to the larger developments, but he felt convinced that the change would mean more to the Province as a whole. The change had to take place and New Brunswick was fortunate, he felt, in having three powerful organizations all prepared to make large investments to carry out their program of expansion in the Province. It must be obvious, he also observed that only large organizations could carry on the pulp and paper industry and compete successfully with the operations in the other Provinces such as Quebec and Ontario.

Pulp and Paper

In connection with the establishment and expansion of the pulp and paper industry in New Brunswick Hon. Mr. Richards said that for the insuring of a continuity of woods supply for the plants being established it meant the most careful and scientific means must be employed for the conservation of the forests and their protection from fire. These problems were among the most important administrative questions in the Department of Lands and Mines at the present time; investigations were being made which might lead to the early inauguration of some new protective methods. Forest products ranked second only to agriculture as New Brunswick's leading industry, the Minister pointed out, and the cut of lumber on the Crown Lands the past year had exceeded the average cut, which was 250 million feet; the total cut on Crown Lands in 1927 was 271 million feet and the estimate for the present year was that the cut would be about normal. From pri-

vate lands the cut the past year had been about normal, bringing the total cut in New Brunswick up to about 700 million feet, which was a large production and showed activity despite the much to be regretted bad spots such as existed at the time in the Miramichi valley and some other districts.

Mineral Development.

Hon. Mr. Richards dealt at considerable length with the expansion taking place in mineral development in the Province following the enactment of a new Mining Act at the last session of the Provincial Legislature. More attention had been given to mining activities and development of the mineral resources of the Province the past year than ever before and what was taking place could not have occurred had there not been a revision of the province's mining legislation. His aim had been to make the mining act as useful as possible to prospectors and one who should know had declared that New Brunswick's new Mining Act was "all that any reasonable man could ask for". Taking up the various mineral activities at present in progress in New Brunswick Hon. Mr. Richards first referred to the development of the antimony mines at Lake George, York County, declaring that "there is no question now that this development will proceed." He said that the Canadian International Corporation of Montreal syndicate, represented by Brigadier General Charles A. Smart, C. M. G., of Westmount, were carrying on the arrangements for proceeding with their extensive operations as rapidly as possible. A power plant was on order, a concentrating mill would be installed and this would be followed by a smelter so that antimony metal and the valuable by products would be manufactured within the Province. One actual development of importance such as this, being carried on successfully would provide the best possible kind of publicity that could be obtained to stimulate mineral development in New Brunswick, he declared.

Copper Deposits.

Operations by the same interests at the copper deposits at Annidale, Kings County, were next referred to, the Minister stating that the assay of the ore had shown an higher percentage of copper than the famous Noranda mine could boast of and experts' reports had made General Smart and his associates confident that the quantities were sufficient to make the profitable operation of the property possible and they were going ahead with extensive development plans there, also. Operations at Elm Tree river in Restigouche county, where there are valuable deposits of lead-silver would probably soon be commenced while the same was true of the deposits of franklinite, molybdenite and iron in Gloucester county.

Gloucester Iron Mines.

In connection with the immense deposits of iron ore in Gloucester County Hon. Mr. Richards said that Sir James Dunn, a native of Bathurst now prominent in financial circles in London, was interested with the development plans and had sent an engineer to Norway to inspect a new method for smelting ore of a similar character and the manufacture of sponge iron. This new method was working out satisfactorily in Norway and it was believed its introduction would make possible the establishment of a large industry in Gloucester County. Establishment of the \$250,000 experimental plant of the Maritime Education Company at Rosevale, Albert County, for the extraction of oil and valuable by-products from the immense deposits of shale was another definite undertaking which had been commenced during the past year referred to by the Minister.

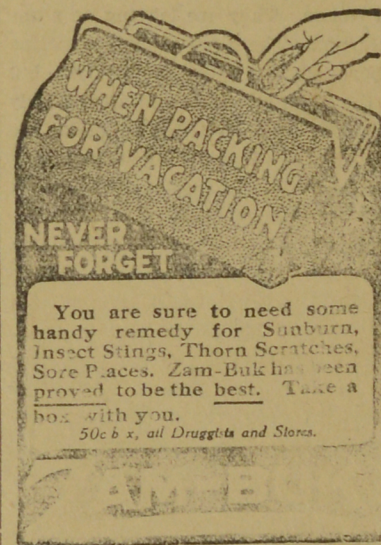
Mr. Wildman Praised.

In connection with what was being done to bring the opportunities for mineral development in New Brunswick to public attention Hon. Mr. Richards said that he wished to give credit to Mr. H. G. Wildman, mineralogist of the Natural Resources Department of the Canadian National Railways, who he referred to as "a remarkable man of unusual attainments and practical experience, who has given us great assistance and has done much

towards making possible what is now being done". He also referred to the interest which General Smart was taking in the development of the natural resources of the Province and quoted references made by Dr. Goodwin, formerly of the Ontario Bureau of Mines and a native of this Province, as to the rich mineral wealth of New Brunswick and their possibilities of development. Concluding his reference to mineral development Hon. Mr. Richards said that he intended to have steps taken which would insure continued investigation by a geological expert of the mineral resources of the Province. By what method this could be done, he was not yet prepared to say, but it was hoped it could be accomplished by some co-operative arrangement which would work out advantageously also for the Provincial University. He was satisfied there was a large field for profitable expansion in the development of the mineral resources of the Province and the government were prepared to go a long way in giving assistance in this regard.

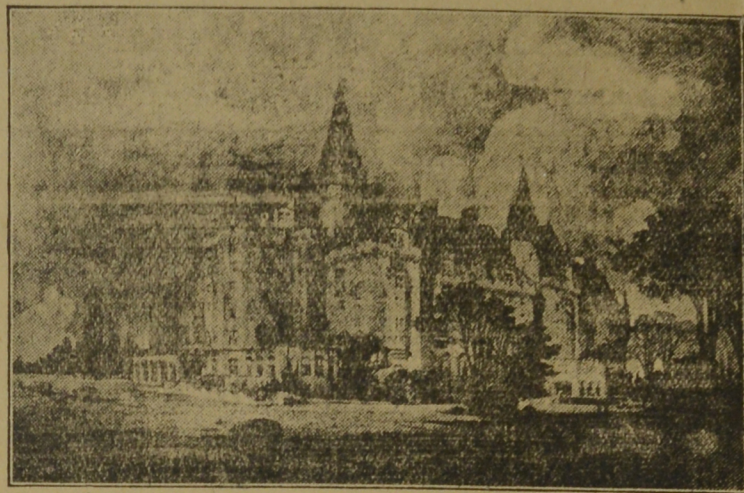
Recreational Resources.

Hon. Mr. Richards touched but briefly upon the "splendid opportunity for the development of New Brunswick as a tourist and recreational ground." Hunting and fishing opportunities were amongst the Province's most valuable attractions and the figures of the New Brunswick Tourist Association's report showed the tourist industry estimated to have been worth more than \$11,000,000 to New Brunswick last year. With proper advertising and publicity and the providing of the necessary facilities for adequately accommodating those who came, there could be a further expansion and the Government was prepared to devote even more money than last year to the exploitation of the province's recreational resources. In this connection he mentioned the opportunities offered for the establishment of suitable hotels and camps and declared that the Government was prepared to further improve the already good motor roads to increase the attractiveness of New Brunswick to the steadily growing number of auto tourists. He asked cities, towns, municipalities, Rotary Clubs and similar organizations to do what they could to stimulate the people of the Province to view the future with that confidence which was now justified and to utilize the natural assets of New Brunswick to the fullest degree in the promotion of prosperity.

ENLARGEMENT OF THE CHATEAU LAURIER HOTEL

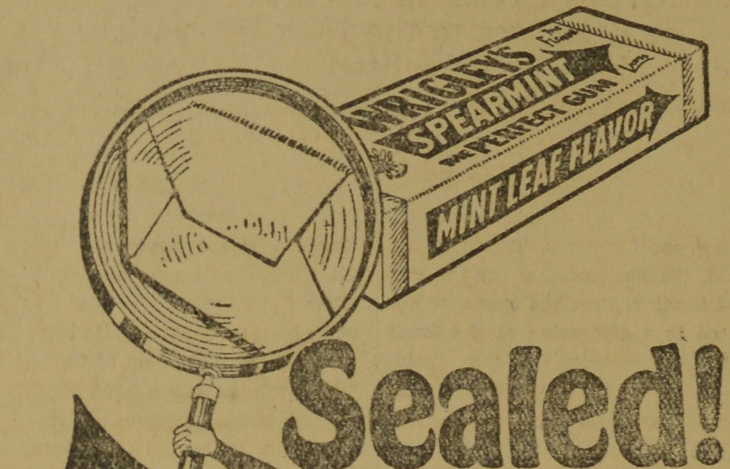

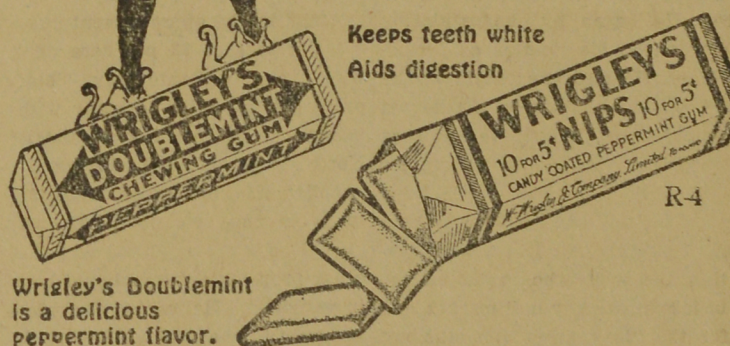
