JOHNNY KING BREAKS TWO PIN RECORDS

Local Bowler Sets New Mark For 3 Strings and 5 Strings—High String of 154 Yesterday.

Johnny King, popular clever Palace Alley bowler, hung up two new records yesterday afternoon at the Palace Alleys when he broke the 3 string record held by himself previous to yesterday, and also the 5 string record, formerly held by Murray Kierstead.

Bowling in competition with several other local bowlers, Johnny King broke his own 3 string record of 373 by one pin rolling a total of 379 for a new Palace Alley record. Not content with this, the lengthy pin teaser rolled a 5 string aggregate of 606 which was 14 pins higher than the record made by M. Kierstead of 592 early last year. King rolled a single string of 154, bowling six successive spares with a strike climax for his highest string. Incidentally, this is probably the highest string bowled on the local alleys for quite a period of time, and is deserving of mention.

Following are the five strings bowled for the new record: 154, 109, 116, 111, 116—606. Kierstead's former record scores: 118, 113, 104, 139, 118—592.

Miles Defeated.

Hamilton, Jan. 3—Canada's first choice on the Olympic marathon team for 1928, Clifford Bricker, of Galt, experienced little difficulty in winning the annual Hamilton-Dundas ten-mile road race here yesterday. A field of 23, including the best middle-distance runners in the province, finished behind the Galt flash. Johnny Miles, formerly of Sydney Mines, N. S., now of Hamilton, finished second, Charles Snell, of Toronto, was third.

San Francisco, Jan. 2—George Wilson's Wildcats defeated Red Grange's Yankees, 6 to 0, in a game of professional football today.

The field was slow and muddy. Both teams resorted to a passing attack for a large part of the game.

Swim Records Made.

St. Georges, Bermuda, Jan. 3—Two world's records were created by members of the Women's Swimming Association of New York at the water carnival in the St. Georges Hotel pool here last night. The carnival was held under the auspices of the Bermuda Athletic Association.

Agnes Geraghty clipped a second from the 200 meter breast stroke mark held by Marie Baron of Holland. Miss Geraghty's time was 3.17 2-5.

Martha Norellus broke Gertrude Ederle's record set in 1922 for the 500 meters free style by 1 2-5 seconds. The new record is 7.20 3-5.

CANADIENS WIN OVER HAWKS 3-1

Coliseum, Chicago, Jan. 4—"Les Canadiens," the spectacular Frenchmen from Montreal, who are leading the race for the National League hockey championship, defeated the Chicago Black Hawks here tonight by a score of 3 goals to 1, in a fast and well played game. A crowd of 6,000 saw the contest.

Chicago made a game of it in the first period, holding the speedy Canadiens even, matching speed, and back-checking so effectively that the famous team play of Les Canadiens was well broken up.

Sussex Squad Arrived This Morning — Hay May be With Them — Will be Fast Game With Good Ice—Lineups Show Some Minor Changes.

The Fredericton Capitols get into action tonight for the first home game against the Sussex Colts, tailenders in the Southern N. B. league, and local hockey fans will get their first taste of hockey this season. Incidentally, it will be the first taste of hockey as played per C. A. H. A. rules for the Capital fans.

The Sussex team will arrive here at noon. As far as is known at present writing the lineup will be the same as played against the Moncton Atlantics a week ago. Several minor changes will likely be made before the team takes the ice tonight against the Capital team.

The local team lineup is likely to be identical with the one which lined up against the Fusiliers last Friday night at the Saint John arena. Several of the local squad have minor injuries which may keep them out of the clash this evening, but the probability is that all the players will be on hand in good condition for their first home engagement of the season.

With the ice in perfect condition the game ought to be a whirlwind of good fast hockey and a record crowd is expected for the initial scrimmage at the Arctic Rink tonight at 8 o'clock.

U.S. OLYMPIC SKATERS ON WAY TO NORWAY

Chicago, Jan. 4—The advance guard of America's Olympic athletes, the skating team, left Chicago yesterday on their way to Pittsburgh and New York to sail for Norway where they will be guests and pupils at the Oslo A. A. for three weeks, training for the Winter Olympic sports which start at St. Moritz, Switzerland, Feb. 12.

The Norwegian invitation extended by Sigurd Roll, ex-consul, for three weeks of practice, was accepted by managers of the American skating team, as it will give the Americans a chance to get accustomed to the European methods in skating races.

The American representatives are Irwin Jaffe of New York, Valentine Blais of Utica, N. Y.; German Perleberg of Cleveland, and Eddie Murphy and O'Neill Farrell of Chicago. Oscar Hanson and George Lloyd, trainers, both of Chicago, accompanied the team, which will give an exhibition at Duquesne Gardens in Pittsburgh Tuesday, and then continue to New York to board the Oscar II for Norway.

Billy Barton Entered in Stayers' Handicap at Birmingham Next Week.

Swindon, England, Jan. 4—Billy Barton, Maryland jumper, has been entered in the Stayers' Handicap at Birmingham next week.

If the weather proves enough in the next few days for him to have the necessary workouts, he may start. The blizzard and cold wave of the last week has upset the training of Howard Bruce's steeplechaser, and fulfillment of his first engagement in Britain depends entirely on the weather.

The cold wave started just when Billy Barton was ready for some work. The Wiltshire Downs, ideally suited for training a candidate for the Grand National have been frozen and impossible for exercising. The thaw now under way has softened the ground, however, and if it dries out sufficiently in the next few days, Billy Barton's trainer believes he can have him in condition.

YORK COUNTY HOCKEY LEAGUE DRAWN UP

A hockey meeting last night at the Arctic Rink resulted in the formation of a York County Intermediate league, for the current season. The league was successful last year, the Fredericton Intermediates being in the N. B. playoffs and some good hockey was provided.

Representatives from Fredericton, Devon, Marysville and U. N. B. were present at the meeting and the same four teams were voted to constitute the league. Trafford Donovan was elected president of the league. "Buck" Miles of Devon was elected Treasurer and John Neil of Devon was nominated for the position of Secretary.

The assembled representatives laid down the following rules to be observed by the league this season. (1) No player allowed to join a team after the 15 of January. (2) Roster calls for not more than 12 players. (3) No senior player allowed on any team. (4) No team permitted to take a player from another team in the league. Announcements of schedule will be given out later.

N. B. HOCKEY

Campbellton Defeat Bathurst 3 to 2 Last Night—20 Minutes Overtime Needed.

Campbellton, Jan. 4—After 20 minutes' overtime play, Campbellton defeated the Bathurst squad in the regular league fixture here tonight by a 3-2 score. The game was a thrilling and spectacular contest from start to finish, fast solo rushes and clever team plays being the order of the evening.

Here and There

What is considered the largest, grizzly shot in the Canadian Rockies this season was taken by Miss A. Van Vleck, daughter of Ernest Van Vleck, prominent New York architect who headed a hunting party into the Selkirk district. The party went in north of Revelstoke.

An amount of grain greatly in excess of the entire production of western Canada in the year 1887, 4,454,000 bushels, were hauled to elevators over Canadian Pacific lines in one day in the west during the middle of October. This constituted a record haul of grain for this railway company.

The second shipment of horses from Canada to Russia was a record shipment, according to Louis Kon, Soviet representative, there being only one horse that died during the passage. The next shipment is expected to go forward in November, and this will bring the total number up to 3,300.

G. N. Torgren, ex-M.P. for Sweden, recently left for the Peace River Country in order to locate suitable farm land for the establishing of a large colony of Swedish farmers, who are said to be in a position to undertake farming on an extensive scale. He has already canvassed Mexico and the Southwestern States, which he finds unsuitable.

The new Canadian Pacific Railway elevator at Midland has begun to receive grain, and shortly all the construction work will be complete and all departments of the plant in operation. The opening of this elevator marks the extension of Canadian Pacific enterprise to another port on the Great Lakes and a new factor in retaining a greater proportion of the Canadian export grain trade for Canadian ports.

The largest party of major league baseball stars to hunt moose in New Brunswick entered the woods for a two-weeks stay after the World Series. The party entered at Clarendon on the Canadian Pacific main line and included Benny Bengough, Mark Koenig, Eddie Collins, Joe Bush, Sam Jones, Fred Hoffman. A number of newspaper writers and cameramen were included in the party.

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
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
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
