AN ALLEGED PERJURY CASE
FROM SUNBURY COUNTY IS
BEFORE THE CIRCUIT COURT

Albert McCoy and His Wife, Elizabeth McCoy Indicted on Perjury Charge—Trial of the Wife is Now Going on Before Mr. Justice LeBlanc.

The York Circuit Court met this morning with Mr. Justice LeBlanc presiding in the absence of Mr. Justice Crockett, who had asked to be relieved from trying the perjury cases of the King vs. Arthur McCoy and his wife Mrs. Elizabeth McCoy.

Mrs. McCoy was arraigned for trial at the opening of the court, Mr. M. L. Hayward of Hartland appearing for the Crown and Messrs. J. H. F. Teed and C. L. Dougherty for the accused. The following petit jurors were called and sworn:

Bliss Nason, Karl Walker, E. Staples, Arthur Crowley, Gordon McLean, Milton Gibson, John McIntosh, John Lister, Fred Coburn, Harry Slipp, C. H. Burt and Lee H. Burt.

The case against Mrs. McCoy arose out of an action by Mrs. Emma P. Glasgow of Fredericton, who has a farm adjoining the McCoy property on the Richibucto Road. The defendant and her husband are said to have disregarded a court order issued to prevent the running at large of their cattle, and they are also alleged to have disregarded an injunction subsequently issued. It is in connection with affidavits concerning the latter that the action for perjury arose.

Wanted Press Excluded

At the commencement of the trial this morning Mr. Teed moved that the jurymen not taking part in the case be excluded from the court room and that the press be instructed not to publish a report of the evidence. This motion was not allowed by the Court.

Wedding Bells.

Burpee Charles Peterson son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Peterson of Fredericton Junction and Miss Florence May Palmer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Palmer were married at the Parish Church on Thursday morning, January 19th at nine o'clock. Witnesses Examined

The witnesses examined this morning were Howard H. Blair, J. B. McNair, Charles H. Sterling and Sheriff Bliss. Mr. Blair admitted in his evidence that although gazetted as a Justice of the Peace he had never taken out his commission. Mr. Teed contended that he had no power to act.

The case is being continued this afternoon. The case of the King vs. Albert McCoy, husband of the first named defendant will be next taken up.
