JOHNNY TOBIN GETS RELEASE

Does Not Wish to Continue Any Longer in Game—Only .300 Hitter on the Red Sox Team.

Boston, Jan. 31—Johnny Tobin, Red Sox outfielder yesterday was given his unconditional release by Pres Bob Quinn not because the Boston club owner desired to part company with the veteran but simply out of consideration for Tobin's wishes.

Tobin by the way was the only .300 hitter on the Red Sox team last season. He came to the Boston club in June 1926 when Flagstead broke his collar bone. He had for years been associated with Bob Quinn when both were connected with the St. Louis Browns. He was a free agent at the time and came in the emergency caused by the injury to Flagstead a disposition to help out Mr. Quinn being one of the reasons for his doing so. He had made up his mind to retire. He was told at the time he signed up that when he wished to get out he would be given his unconditional release. He came back in 1927 played in 111 games and had a batting average of .310.

MONCTON BEAT FUSILIERS AT HUB ARENA

Moncton Jan. 30—The Moncton Atlantics set back the Saint John Fusiliers in the Arena here tonight by a 3 to 0 count in one of the fastest and most pulse stirring games of hockey fans have witnessed in this city in recent years. From the time Referee Jack Brown dropped the rubber the 1,600 fans jumped to their feet as the players dashed about after the disc and they were on their feet most of the time after that.

It was a bad night for the Fusiliers to come here and play the Atlantics. What those bomb throwers were up against was the fastest and smoothest working team in the league smarting under the defeat of last Friday and it was but natural that this team would do its utmost to redeem themselves before a home crowd and they did.

HORSES BEING PREPPED FOR '28 OHIO FAIR FRAY

Charley Valentine, Veteran Reinsman is Getting Trotters and Pacers Ready for the New Season.

Columbus O. Jan. 31—Charley Valentine veteran Grand Circuit reinsman is busily engaged in prepping a large string of trotters and pacers for the 1928 fray at the Ohio State Fair Grounds here.

His fastest performer by record is the gray trotting gelding, Dr. Strongworthy 2.04 who the last few years was campaigned by Tommy Murphy. Valentine formerly had this son of Ortolan Axworthy in his stable. He made a great campaign with him several seasons ago, after which Tommy Murphy stopped off at Columbus and paid a reported price of \$20,000 for him. T. D. Van Camp, then his owner, got the gelding back at the last Old Glory sale in New York.

Valentine expects great things of High Noon (4) 2.04. This trotter showed real class last season winning five races and being in the money in four other battles and appears headed for a good year in the stakes.

Others in the Valentine string are Captain Volo 2.10 1/2, pacer; Miss Chester, three year old trotting filly by Binville; Milton Watts and Cora B., trotters and numerous young green performers. Valentine is being aided in his training work by his son, Dennis.

CANADA TENNIS STAR IS BEATEN BY YOUNGSTER

Montreal, Jan. 30—Tennis reminded one of hockey at the semi-final matches of the Canadian covered court tennis championships which were concluded yesterday.

It's the breaks that count. Jack Wright, Intercollegiate champion and Canadian Davis Cup star Canada's only hope in the tournament going on at the Montreal Indoor Tennis Club should have entered the final round but the breaks were against him.

Three times he was at match point and three times Frank Shields youthful New York crack, who is looked upon as one of the coming players of the age, pulled out and in the end eliminated the last—not of the Moslems—but of the Canadians.

The Wright-Shields match was the feature of the semi-final tussels yesterday afternoon. The result of it was that no Canadian will contest the final of the Dominion championship indoor play which is to take place this afternoon. Two Americans will fight it out one of them being the present champion, George M. Lott Jr., of Chicago and Frank Shields up and coming net star of the American metropolis for whom experts predict the brightest of futures.

MORENZ LEADS SCORERS IN N.H.L.

Hay of Cougars Second — Joliat and Carson Trail Leaders—Hainsworth Still Leads the Goalers.

Montreal, Jan. 31—Morenz of the Montreal Canadiens and Hay of the Detroit Cougars were well out in front as scorers in the National Hockey League records last week. With 27 points to his credit Morenz topped the list in the International Division while Hay was first in the American sector with a total of 22 points.

Next to Morenz was Joliat his team mate with a total of 24 points and W. Carson of Toronto was third with 19. Morenz had shot 20 goals and made seven assists, Joliat had 18 goals and six assists and Carson 14 goals and five assists.

F. Boucher of the New York Rangers was second to Hay in the American side with 14 points while MacKay of Chicago, J. Sheppard of Detroit and Johnson of the Rangers was tied for third place with 13 points each. Hay had shot only 12 goals but made 10 assists.

Johnson of the Rangers and R. Dutton of the National Maroons continued to be the iron men of the game. Johnson has been on the ice 1,367 minutes in 24 games, while Dutton has toiled 1,250 minutes in 22 games. No one has committed as many fouls as Shore the big defense man of Boston who has served 90 minutes in the penalty box this season so far. Johnson of the Rangers was nearest him with 73 minutes.

Manager Lehman of Chicago who recently re-entered the game topped the goalkeepers of the American Division with a percentage of .984 for his first two games but Winkler of Boston who was the real leader with .955 for 24 games. Hainsworth led the International Division with a percentage of .971.




