- 2 egg yolks
- 2 tablespoons

Few grains salt

1-2 cup cream

Cream, sugar and butter together. Add the well beaten egg yolks and beat mixture thoroughly. Place in a saucepan over the fire and stir until the constituency of cream. Do not boil.

STANDARD WHITE CAKE

- 2 cups flour
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1-2 cup butter or other shortening 1 cup sifted sugar
- 3-4 cup milk
- teaspoon vanilla
- 3 egg whites, beaten light

Prepare pan. Sift flour once neasure, add baking powder and sift again together. Cream shortening thoroughly, then add sugar gradually and cream together until light and fluffy. Add sifted flour and baking powder to creamed mixture, alternately with milk, a small amount at a time. Beat after each addition until smooth. Add vanilla; fold in egg whites. Bake in loaf or layers in moderate oven. (Loaf; one hour -350 degrees Fahrenheit. Layer: twenty to twenty five minutes-375 degrees Fahrenheit).


