

LEWIS BURDEN  
OF QUEENSBURY  
IS MISSING

Left His Home on Tuesday Morning and Has Not Been Seen Since — Has Relatives in This City.

Mr. Lewis Burden, eldest son of Mr. George F. Burden ex-M. L. A. of the Department of Lands and Mines has been missing from his home at Queensbury since Tuesday and grave fears for his safety are being entertained. For several years he has made his home with his cousin Mr. Harry Slipp and although not in the best of health was able to assist with the work on the farm. Nothing has been seen or heard from him since his departure from home on Tuesday morning.

Mr. George F. Burden, father of the missing man and Mr. E. E. Burden, a brother are at Queensbury today directing the search. Mr. Charles Fleet of this city is with them and is engaged in grappling the river. As the missing man was last seen going in the direction of the river it is feared that he may have fallen in and been drowned.

Up to three o'clock this afternoon there was no word of the missing man.

MINISTER ON  
TRIP TO WILDS  
OF THE TOBIQUE

Hon. Mr. Richards and Party of Crown Land Officials to Make Canoe Trip From Nictau to Bathurst.

For the purpose of inspecting the lumber, fish and game resources of that section of the Province, Hon. Charles D. Richard, Minister of Lands and Mines, left last evening for a canoe trip from Nictau to Bathurst, via the Tobique and Nepisiguit rivers, across the northern part of New Brunswick.

Accompanied by the Chief Game Warden, Major H. H. Ritchie, Provincial Forester G. L. Miller and Assistant Forester William McCormack, Hon. Mr. Richards left here by Canadian National Railways for Plaster Rock, whence they motored to Nictau where they stopped over-night preparatory to taking their canoes this morning for their trip of more than 100 miles with Bathurst as their destination.

U. S. HUNTERS  
GET A PAIR OF  
LARGE MOOSE

S. B. Geise of Sunbury, Pa., Secured a Moose with 54 Inch Spread of Antlers— Companion Got One.

The moose season has commenced in earnest in this province and the results of the hunt are beginning to show, in the number of moose heads which are being taken to the local taxidermists by visiting sportsmen. A number of large heads have been received at the taxidermy of George Davis the largest one having an antler spread of 54 inches. This one was secured by S. B. Geise, of Sunbury, Pennsylvania, who in company with John Vignat, also of Sunbury, have been hunting in the Miramichi woods for a week or more. The moosehead spoken of was brought in last evening and a survey of it disclosed that there are twenty five points on it, which is quite remarkable.

Companion Got One
