PREMIER KING CABLES WISHES TO VARSITY GRADS

Have Arrived in Paris—
Deluge of Telegrams
—Mayor of Toronto
Send Congratulations
For Team.

Paris, March 4—Toronto Grads, Olympic hockey champions, have arrived here laden with silver cups given by Berlin in appreciation of the splendid exhibition game the Grads played against their substitutes while visiting in the German City prior to coming to Paris. W. A. Hewitt, of Toronto secretary of the Ontario Hockey Association who is managing the team, stated that the game was one of the best ever seen. The Grads beat their spares 5 to 4.

Hugh Plaxton, C. Deane, N. Mueller, L. Hudson and Roger Plaxton arrived in advance of the balance of the party for they chose an aeroplane for their mode of travel.

Deluge of Telegrams.

Mr. Hewitt and P. J. Mulqueen, chairman of the Canadian Olympic committee, said they had received a deluge of telegrams and congratulations in connection with the Grads' decisive victories over all opposition in winning the World's amateur hockey championship.

Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Prime Minister of Canada cabled the following congratulatory message to the Grads: "My colleagues join me in sending hearty congratulations on your splendid victory at St. Moritz. Canada is proud of your achievement."

Sam McBride, mayor of Toronto wired congratulations to the Grads on their wonderful achievement and stated that the citizens were delighted. The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association also wired in the same vein.

Tonight the Grads will play the Paris team at the Palais de Glace and will then journey to London to meet an All-Star English team on Sunday on March 9th the distinguished hockeyists will be presented to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.

Mr. Hewitt commenting on the trip said that the sight which impressed him most was that which occurred at Vienna when everybody at the rink stood up with bowed heads when God Save the King was played before the game. The Grads played against the Austrian team.

McLARNIN WANTS MANDALL FIGHT

New York, March 4—Jimmy McLarnin, sensational Vancouver lightweight filed a challenge with the New York State Athletic Commission for a title match with Sammy Mandell, king of the division. McLarnin accompanied his challenge with a cheque for \$2,500. The commission accepted the cheque and placed McLarnin at the top of the contender-ship in place of Sid Terris of New York, whom the coast star knocked out in a single round last week. Terris had been recognized by the commission as the outstanding challenger for the title for the past two years.

Maroons Trim Canadiens 3-2 In Fast N. H. L. Fixture

Joe Lamb Secures One of Tallies—Senators Defeated Hawks—Pirates Lose to Detroit—Ironstone Lives Up to Name in Initial Tryout—Bruins and Leafs Tie Thereby.

Montreal, March 4—Montreal Maroons edged two points nearer to first place in the standing of the Canadian section of the N. H. L. by a scoring of a 3 to 2 overtime victory over their intra city rivals and holders of first place, Canadiens, at the Forum last night. Fourteen thousand fans, them majority of them wild eyed Canadian supporters witnessed the contest which was one of the most exciting and thrilling hockey battles of the local season.

The Maroon victory was well earned, and the big red team deserved the points. They gained a two goal lead in the second frame and then threw away their margin in less than five minutes after the start of the third session by allowing the Canucks to dash through a temporarily disorganized defence to score two goals and knot the count. It was a brilliant spurt by the Canucks but the Maroons settled down as quickly as they had blown up and went on to win the honors in overtime.

It took exactly one minute and twenty seconds of play for Hooley Smith star centre to score the winning goal. The Maroons were one man short at the time.

Smith also scored the first Montreal goal and Lamb scored the second. Lamb's goal followed a brilliant combination play with Philips and Oatman. Morenz and Joliat tallied for Canadiens.

Senators Win.

Ottawa, March 4—The Ottawa Senators tightened their hold on third place in the international circuit of the N. H. L. by giving the Chicago Black Hawks a hockey lesson and a 3 to 1 defeat here Saturday night. The small crowd of some 2,200 fans in attendance saw the world's champions rise to stellar heights in offensive play to send home their goals and then quickly revert to close defensive tactics that made the thrusts of their opponents harmless. Besides entrenching the Senators in third place in the league standing, the win served to move them up closer to the pace setting Montreal Canadiens.

Alex. Smith, youthful relief defense man led the scoring forces of the title holders against the Chicago host with a neat pair of goals in the opening period. Both tallies resulted from lone dashes and came after the lanky rear guard had corkscrewed through the entire opposition to send the rubber high into the Chihawk citadel. Finnigan netted the other for the winners four minutes after Duke Keats had begged in the second period the solitary goal for the visitors.

Detroit 3, Pittsburgh 2.

Pittsburgh, March 4—Detroit defeated Pittsburgh last night 3 to 2 in what Pirate fans described as a heart breaking contest for it greatly reduced the locals' chance of getting in the play-offs.

The deciding goal was registered on a fluke assist that bounded into the home net from the stick of Milks, corsair star. Laughlin, Detroit defence was behind the Pirate cage at the time and the break occurred when he tried to pass out to an incoming team-mate.

Drury and Tex White made Pittsburgh's tallies and Detroit's first marker was the work of George Hay and the second an effort by Pelango.

Leafs and Bruins Tie.

Toronto, March 4—Playing with their backs to the wall and with Joe Ironstone an unknown quantity in big league hockey guarding their citadel, the Toronto Maple Leafs battled the sturdy Boston Bruins through 70 minutes of guerilla-like hockey to a scoreless draw last night.

A victory for the Bruins would have placed them at the head of the American group. However the split in points enabled them to draw up on even terms with the New York Rangers for the leadership. The point gained by the Leafs meant little as they are practically out of contention.

Stellar defensive work by both teams was the brightest feature of the contest and the opposing forwards found the path to the goal cages a difficult and perilous undertaking. Duncan, for the Leafs and Shore of Boston handed out many terrific body checks and were both outstanding in their defensive work. The hero of the night was Ironstone leading net guardian of the Canadian Professional hockey league, who came to the aid of the Leafs when Roach was stricken with an attack of gall stones which necessitated his removal to hospital. Ironstone who has a string of shut out records to his credit, secured while guarding the Toronto Falcons' net, gave an impressive display against the Bruins.

HORNSBY IS TO GET \$40,000 SALARY.

Boston, March 4—News from the Braves' training camp at St. Petersburg, Fla., that Rogers Hornsby had signed a three-year contract at \$40,000 a year with an annual \$600 bonus to act as captain of the tribe over shadowed all other baseball news here today.

Hornsby's New York contract was for \$45,000 a season.

Judge Fuchs has been highly pleased by Hornsby's attitude and the way he has taken his sudden transfer from the New York team where he had been regarded as a likely successor to the managerial shoes of John J. McGraw. Hornsby reported to camp a week earlier than was expected and has been exerting a splendid influence on the rest of the players.

BOXING

Chicago, March 4—Sammy Mandell the lightweight champion had his say last night on the controversy over next summer's 135 pound title match declaring that McLarnin might never get another chance at the light weight honors if he didn't accept the one offered now for a contest here next June.

McLarnin has fyled a challenge with the New York Boxing Commission.

"McLarnin may be a sensation" Mandell said "but he is still a challenger. I want to defend my title here in Chicago. I have signed with Jim Mullen and I intend to go through with it."

"I won't say that I can beat Jimmy McLarnin but I will say that he can't beat me. McLarnin is a great fighter but I am sure that he can't beat me. I studied him in the fight when he knocked out Kid Kaplan and I saw nothing that caused me any great alarm. McLarnin is a great puncher but he is easy to hit."

MANTHA TO MANAGE BALL CLUB THIS YEAR

Montreal, March 4—Sylvio Mantha will manage the Ahuntsic Baseball team in the City Baseball League this season.

Mantha played well last season with the Ahuntsic nine. He has an offer from the Montreal team to go along with the team to their training camp.

A meeting of the City Baseball League will be held this week-end, when the final plans for the summer campaign will be discussed and the players' contracts passed upon. Beau-rivage, the newcomers to the City League will be managed by Charlie Laverriere. St. Laurent owners have appointed A. Laurin formerly of the St. Henri team to look after the St. Laurent interests. Chappie Johnson will again trot out a strong team of colored ball players.

The league will start its season activities in April 22 at the Shamrock Grounds while several other fixtures will be staged on the New Baseball Stadium.

FIRST PLAYOFF IN MONTREAL ON MARCH 9 AND 12.

Montreal, March 4—The winners of the series between Victorias and Martin which starts tonight at the Forum, will enter the Allan Cup play-offs representing Quebec against the Maritime Provincians Champions, either Truro Bearcats or St. John Fusiliers. Both games will be played in Montreal, the first taking place Friday, March 9 and the second on Monday, March 12. It will not be known whether the games will be played at the Forum or the Arena until the Maritime-Quebec games will be played in the west-end but if Martin wins, Oscar Benoit will have the games at his Arena.

The survivors of the Maritime-Quebec round will be drawn against the Ottawa Champions on Friday, March 16, and Monday, March 19. If Quebec beats the Maritimes, the first game will be played in Ottawa with the return match here. If the Maritime team beats the Quebec representatives both games will be played in the Capital.

276 QUALIFY FOR E. C. PYLE'S MARATHON WALK

Los Angeles March 4—Two hundred and seventy-six runners and walkers among them international figures in marathon events, have qualified for the \$48,500 cross country trek to New York city, starting here Sunday it was announced today. All entries have passed preliminary tests in the way of ability to jaunt long distances and were pronounced by physicians as fit to start the 3,400 mile grind. The entry list was considerably larger but many were eliminated in the physical examination. C. C. Pyle who is staging the marathon announced that in starting the race the runners would be sent away in groups of 25. The first stop will be Puente, Calif, some 20 miles distant where the contestants will remain over night. Arthur Duffy the man who first travelled 100 yards in 9 3-5 seconds and who has been appointed referee for the trans-continental jaunt was to arrive here today from Boston.

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
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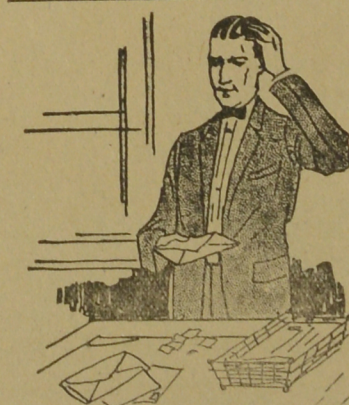
