PROGRESSIVES COME FORWARD WITH AN AMENDMENT TO THE BUDGET PROPOSALS

Ottawa, Feb. 22—Progressives today had a sub-amendment to the budget. Their amendment—which was moved by B. W. Fansher, of Lambton East—takes the ground that in reducing the income tax the Government is seriously departing from the principal of direct taxation, that the tariff reductions proposed in the budget are inadequate to bring relief to the consuming public. The sub-amendment also regrets that the Sales Tax on necessities of life had not been eliminated.

Under the old rules of the House, only one amendment to the motion to go into ways and means—the main budget motion—was permissible. But under the amended rule adopted last session, a sub-amendment is allowed. When the division comes, the House will first divide on the Progressive sub-amendment; then on the Conservative amendment; and then, if the issue is again pressed to a division, on the main motion. Thus, for the first time, there is likelihood of three divisions on the budget.

Credit to Liberals.

F. G. Sanderson (Liberal, South Perth) spoke of "people's budgets" and pointed to \$19,000,000 cut from taxes, \$39,000,000 off the debt and \$55,000,000 surplus, in resuming the debate.

The Minister of National Revenue (Mr. Euler) and his staff were entitled to considerable credit for the production of the surplus.

Mr. Sanderson made reference to the attack delivered by C. H. Cahan (Conservative, St. Lawrence-St. George) on Sir Henry Thornton last Monday. If there was anything in Canada for which the people should be grateful, it was the fact that Sir Henry Thornton and his assistants had lifted the Canadian National Railways out of the mire in which the Conservative party left it in 1921.

Government Attacked.

Peter McGibbon (Conservative, Muskoka) declared that in his budget ad-

dress last Thursday, the Finance Minister had for the first time in history taken upon himself the credit which was due to the goodness of the Almighty God and the products of the labor of man. Mr. Robb had presented a picture which no other man in the country could see.

The policy of the government, said Dr. McGibbon, was that of "closing down the factories of this country."

War Taxes.

Mr. Fansher at the outset of his address quoted figures to show that the revenues from special taxes due to the war were not meeting the expenditures arising out of the war. These should be kept in a special account as it would be well for the country to realize what the war was costing in dollars. War taxes were producing revenues of \$53,000,000 lower than war expenditures, yet at the same time the government was reducing income tax.

Mr. Fansher asked what progress had been made in the direction of implementing the Liberal platform of 1919. Of all the articles which that platform declared should be on the free list, only fertilizer had been actually put there, he said. He suggested that the government might move up to the next item and place cement on the free list before the close of the present year. If the government would arrange taxation so as to leave with the primary producer more of the money which he earned, there would not be so great a migration from Canada.

The Liberal party was pledged to low tariff, said Mr. Fansher. One budget brought down since the present Parliament was convened, had contained no reductions. The second budget, now before the House, was nothing more than a textile re-classification. Why should not the Liberal party come forward and fulfill its low tariff pledges?

Mr. Fansher then moved the amendment, seconded by John Evans (Progressive, Rosetown.)

MR. MARCIL RESUMES AS CHAIRMAN

Ottawa, Feb. 22—Hon. Charles Marcil resumed his place today as chairman of the Liberal Caucus. Recently when he was going on with his resolution about the Mexican affair, he resigned so as to have a free hand as he put it. Afterwards he withdrew the resolution stating that he had received some new light. Today Mr. Marcil was reinstated in his own place as the senior member of his party and E. W. Tobin who had been chosen in his stead was made vice chairman.

The caucus was devoted to a ventilation of views of private members regarding matters in their districts.

Father and Son Banquet.

A very enjoyable and successful Father and Son's Banquet was held at the New Memorial Hall of the Brunswick Street Baptist church last evening, at which a very large number of fathers and sons were present. The Fathers and sons of the different churches being in attendance at the banquet made it a very enjoyable affair. Speeches were made by many of the senior members present.

Liquor Cases.

Several liquor violation cases have been up before Police Magistrate Begin of Edmundston in the past few days and many convictions were recorded. All were violations of the section 69 of the Liquor Control Act and were treated with in an expeditious manner. Eight men were convicted and fined with fines ranging from \$10 and costs to \$20 and costs.

WARNING OF A STORM IS SENT FORTH

Washington, Feb. 22—The weather bureau tonight issued the following storm warning:

"Advisory, 10 p. m.: Southeast storm warnings ordered with change to southwest Thursday morning. Norfolk to Sandy Hook, and southwest warnings ordered north of Sandy Hook to Eastport. Secondary disturbances developing over Carolinas will move north-eastward with increased intensity and cause strong southeast winds, shifting to southwest Thursday morning, Norfolk to Sandy Hook, and strong south winds tonight, shifting southwest Thursday morning, north of Sandy Hook to Eastport."

RICHEST MAN IN FRANCE DEAD AT EIGHTY THREE

Paris, Feb. 22—Theodore Ernest Cagnacq, probably the wealthiest merchant in France as well as the most picturesque, is dead at the age of 89.

With his wife, he founded a department store many years ago in the Samaritaine department and built up an enormous fortune. Before the war this reached at least \$120,000,000, and has become even larger since then.
