## F. H. S. Defeat Rothesay In Opening Game at Rink

**Won Interscholastic Opener Last Night 4-1 At Rink—Superior Checking And Team Work Of Locals Big Factor—Eddie Colwell Coaching Team—Crawford Stars For Visitors.**

It was the hectic third period which proved the undoing of the Rothesay Interscholastic team in their first of a two game playoff against the local high school sextet at the Arctic Rink last evening. The game which was a steller exhibition of high school hockey went two fast periods and ended with the Yellow and Black squad holding a slim 1-0 margin; but in the final frame calculations went astray and when the smoke of the local offensive onslaught cleared away the score was 4 goals to 0. The game was thus transferred from a close struggle to a sure thing in almost less time than it takes in telling. Percy Minue and Dave Pickard accounted for the three goals in the final session; the elongated and rugged defenceman getting a pair of them in succession. Rothesay secured their only tally in the closing minutes when rather a fluky one stole by Beatty in the Yellow and Black cage. The final score ended 4 to 1.

High School Check Well.

The game opened with a rush and the pace remained steady throughout three gruelling periods. The local sextet were having a little the better of territory play and Mason cool headed Rothesay custodian made some brilliant saves. Crawford, fast skating captain of the visiting team was doing some splendid stickhandling and skating but could not seem to penetrate the defence of Pickard and Miller. Peters and Rainnie supported their captain well on the offensive line composed of the diminutive center flash Bruce Macdonald and flanked by that hardy youngster Minue on one wing and Eddie Burt light but fast other winger were doing nice combination work and were continually shelling away aided by Pickard and Miller who flashed occasional shots. The Yellow and Black squad coached by Eddie Colwell showed splendid checking tactics and broke up innumerable dangerous rushes throughout the play.

It was not until the second period that the first counter was netted. A long fast wing shot from the stick of Captain Bruce McDonald of the local sextet hit the twines behind Mason for the opening counter about half way through the second period. F. H. ## FINALISTS IN MARITIMES TO TRY ALLAN CUP

**Will Probably Play Series In Montreal On March 7—Quebec Will Be The Team—Return Game To Provincines On March 9.**

Montreal, Feb. 22—Frank Morrissey, secretary of the Quebec Amateur Hockey Association, last night received a wire from Fred Marples, secretary of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, to the effect that the Quebec hockey champions will be drawn against the Maritime champions in the first round of the Allan Cup play-offs. It mentioned that the Easterners would probably play the first game of the series in Montreal on March 7 with the return game in city of the Maritime winners on Mar. 9. This, of course, depends on how soon the champions can be decided in both sections.

This season marks the first time in the history of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association that the Maritime Provinces will have a representative in the Allan Cup. Therefore, their debut will be against a Quebec team.

The relative strength of hockey in the provinces by the sea and in Quebec, Ontario and the western provinces has long been a matter of doubt in amateur circles. Montreal fans will be given an opportunity to see what the Blues can produce. If the players that come here in the play-offs are of the same calibre of Joe Lamb, a Nova Scotia product, the Quebec champions will be in for a very interesting time.

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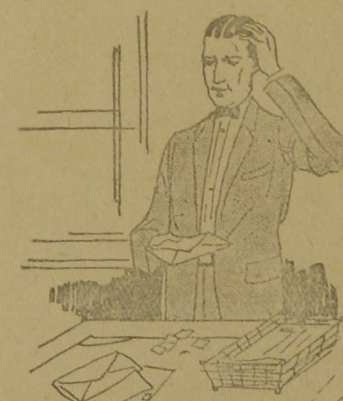

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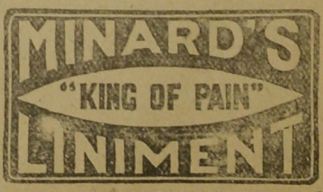
