ARTHUR DEMERCHANT OF PERTH IS COMMITTED FOR TRIAL; SEVERAL WITNESSES TESTIFIED

Andover, N. B., March 1—Arthur DeMerchant, charged with the murder of Edward E. Armstrong, was today sent up for trial following his preliminary hearing in the court house here before Magistrate N. A. Hanson. Several witnesses were heard, and a confession alleged to have been made by the prisoner, placed in evidence.

Witnesses testified as to the finding of the body on New Year's eve, and Dr. A. F. McIntosh testified as to the wounds found on the body. He said that there was a compound fracture at the base of the skull, with a hole in the head from which serum was oozing. There also was a fracture on the face.

The doctor stated he did not consider that the wounds in the back of the head could have been inflicted when Armstrong was standing, intimating that they must have been caused after he had fallen to the ground. Police Constable Wilson corroborated the doctor's testimony as to the nature of the wounds.

Mrs. Rose DeMerchant, sister-in-law to the prisoner and with whom the latter lived, testified that on December 28 Arthur DeMerchant had been occupied all day hauling wood. There was no food in the house except for

half-a-cup of milk. There were nine children in the house. She said that Arthur left home between 6.15 and 6.30 o'clock that evening and returned about 7.15, bringing with him bread, meat and milk. In reply to her enquiry he would not tell her where he had procured the food.

Says He Confessed.

She also testified that she had visited Arthur DeMerchant in his cell following his arrest on the charge of murder, on Sunday, February 19, and that he had confessed to her. He told her of coming out of Armstrong's barn with a pail of milk. Armstrong met him at the door with a pitchfork and said that he would kill DeMerchant. The latter knocked Armstrong down with a sledge stake. Armstrong laid there for a few minutes and then got up and came at DeMerchant again and the latter then confessed that he killed him.

She further testified that so soon as the prisoner had finished his confession Sergeant Leetch, of the Provincial Police, came to the cell door and that DeMerchant confessed to Leetch in her presence. Sheriff Frank Bishop also was present. Sergeant Leetch took down the confession as DeMerchant told it, she said, and then DeMerchant signed it while the sheriff Leetch and herself witnessed it.

Sergeant Leetch testified in regard to the confession and placed it in evidence. He identified the signature. The confession was not read in court. He declared that no threats or promises had been made in order to obtain the confession.

Arthur DeMerchant, the prisoner, appeared rather pale, but did not seem nervous. He did not ask any questions and did not have any counsel. Marvin L. Hayward, of Hartland, was the crown prosecutor.

On completion of the evidence the magistrate ordered the prisoner remanded for trial.

PREPARING FOR A DOUBLE EXECUTION

No Word Yet From Ottawa Regarding the Fate of Mrs. Doris McDonald.

Montreal, Que., March 2—The local police have had no communication from either Mrs. Dr. Palmer or Mrs. Greco, foster mother and mother respectively of Doris Palmer McDonald, now under sentence of death with her husband George, for murdering a taxi driver, since they left Montreal for Ottawa, ostensibly to interview the Minister of Justice on behalf of the condemned girl.

Meanwhile, preparations for the double hanging are being made, though there is a strong belief that Doris will not mount the gallows with her husband on the fateful March 23rd, the date set for the execution at Valleyfield. Nothing officially of course has as yet been announced, but it is generally thought that the girl's sentence will be commuted to life imprisonment.

GRUESOME CLUES FOUND IN MURDER CASE

Authorities Searching for Revolver Used by Slayer of a Winnipeg Woman.

Winnipeg, Man., March 2—A small axe, smeared with blood and hair which police are certain was the weapons used to batter in the skull of Mrs. Lottie Adams, whose dead body was found in a ditch near her home last Monday, has been found by two officers in the woods in the vicinity of the spot where the crime was committed.

The axe was unearthed at about eighty-five feet from where the body had been hidden. It was a new one, with the price tag still attached. Several of the dead woman's articles also were found. Today the authorities were continuing the search for the .32 calibre revolver used by the slayer, who shot his victim through the head as well as striking her with the axe.

PREMIER BRUCE WILL CONFER WITH HINKLER

Sydney, N. S. W., March 2—It is reported that Premier Bruce of Australia will confer with Bert Hinkler, now famous flier regarding the possibility of establishing an air mail service between Britain and Australia on an imperial basis.

AN ACRE GARDEN ON EVERY FARM

Bank of Montreal Issues Handsome New Booklet Entitled "Make the Garden Pay."

We have just received for review a very useful and interesting booklet dealing with a small, but by no means unimportant, part of the farm—the garden. This book, which is entitled, "Make the Garden Pay," is being distributed by the Bank of Montreal, which has already issued a number of the handbooks on farming subjects, such as cows, poultry, hogs and sheep, but this latest publication will have a wider appeal, as almost everybody is interested in gardening. Vegetables from the market are not so fresh and appetizing as those grown in one's own garden, and no piece of land equal in size will give as much yield from the money standpoint as a properly tended garden.

The booklet gives directions and advice in connection with the preparation of soil, the buying of seed and the various varieties best suited to Canadian conditions; also in regard to hotbeds, irrigation, harvesting and storing.

It is written by experts, but in simple language, and is profusely illustrated.

The garden, the book states, should be reasonably convenient to the house, but not a "botched-up" patch in the corner. It should be planted in long straight rows far enough apart to cultivate with a team and field cultivator. Such a garden will give the largest returns with the smallest amount of hand labor. It will add to the health of the family, give pleasure, furnish fresher, better vegetables, and save a lot of money.



Keeping Physically Fit in Mid-Ocean

A gymnasium on board an ocean liner is no longer a novelty. The floating palaces of today which cross the mighty oceans between Canada and the Orient and Canada and Europe have gone one better than the best hotels. There are hotels in this country that can invite their guests to baths in private swimming-pools; but how many of them can offer the busy man or woman the use of a gymnasium?

"How to keep fit at sea?" Board one of the famous "White Empresses", bound for the Orient from Vancouver, or cross from Quebec to Southampton by an "Empress of the Atlantic". These liners have gymnasiums on board, and you will have no reason to fear the consequences of a period of enforced leisure. On the Pacific the "Empress of Canada", "Empress of Asia" and "Empress of Russia", have gymnasiums which are in all respects like those of the three Atlantic Empresses. Spacious rooms, with excellent ventilation, and fitted with the latest equipment for almost every phase of athletic exercise. In addition, the Empress of Canada and the Empress of Australia have swimming pools, which are in the first rank of those to be found on board sea-going ships.

The apparatus with which the gymnasiums of the ships of the Canadian Pacific line are fitted is varied and diverting. The "horse" and the "camel" are perhaps the most popular among the machines. When travelling on the "Empress of Australia" and the "Empress of Scotland" to and from Canada this summer the Prince of Wales rode many imaginary miles on the comfortable back of the "horse" and also on the "camel's" hump. These beasts are electrically controlled, and when the current is switched on the "horse", which is properly saddled and has crupper and stirrups, proceeds to emulate the movement of a

horse in motion, and gives the rider a real and pleasant sensation of horse-back riding. The speed can be increased from a walk to a trot, from a trot to a canter, and from a canter to a gallop; but the "horse" is always a gentle beast and never throws his rider.

The "camel" machine is as popular as the "horse". The "camel" functions in a similar manner to the horse, but performs the rolling motion peculiar to the "ships of the Sahara". The "camel" usually works overtime when the Round the World and Mediterranean Cruise Empresses are nearing Egypt, the ladies especially being anxious to accustom themselves to riding on the hump of a camel.

There are bicycle machines in the gymnasium of the Empresses. These are fitted with dials which record distances travelled up to 500 metres. Bicycles are placed side by side, which offers the possibilities of racing competitions.

Rowing machines, pulley-machines, which test the strength and develop the muscle, are amongst the apparatus with which the gymnasiums are equipped, and boxing-gloves, medicine-balls, punch-balls, foils, single-sticks, and Indian clubs, provide boxers, fencers, and Indian-club artists amongst the passengers with every opportunity of indulging in their favorite pastime.

The gymnasiums themselves are spacious rooms, well ventilated, and fitted with electric fans which help to keep the air always fresh. During certain hours the rooms are reserved for the exclusive use of the lady passengers.

A physical instructor is on duty in the gymnasiums during the regular hours. He instructs passengers in the use of the machines, and during the longer voyages and winter cruises made by the Empresses, classes for physical exercises are frequently held.


