## DEVON IN DRAW WITH BORDER SIX

**Devon Tigers Fight 2-2 Draw with St. Stephen At Artic Rink—First Game in Intermediate Playoff.**

In the second series of the New Brunswick Intermediate finals commenced here at the Arctic Rink last evening, the Devon Tigers winners of the York County Intermediate League battled to a 2-2 draw with the St. Stephen Intermediates winners of their section and also victors over St. John in the previous week. The second and decisive game of the series will be played at St. Stephen in the early part of next week.

The game last night was replete with plenty of fast exciting hockey, only a fair sized crowd witnessing the contest. Referee Fred McLean got the game away a little after eight o'clock. St. Stephen put a snappy team on the ice, their fast skating and tricky forwards excelling in some splendid combination. They also showed some splendid checking tactics. The Tigers did not look up to usual form and in the early periods were a trifle slow and uncertain. The visitors took an early lead in the first period and held it until the second when the Tigers spurred and bagged two making the count 2 to 1 in their favor. It looked like the Tigers' game until late in the third when a high fast one went through Titus for the evening corner.

## HEENEY WINS DECISION OVER

Madison Square Garden, New York, March 1—The heavyweight ambitions of Jack Delaney crumbled once again tonight, this time before the bull like attack of the iron jawed battler from New Zealand, Tom Heeney.

Before a crowd of more than 18,000 that paid \$175,000 to see the first of the heavyweight elimination semi-finals, Heeney carried off the decision over the erstwhile French Canadian sharp shooter in 15 mauling, bruising rounds.

It was not a one sided victory for the blocky square jawed boxer from the Antipodes but it was decisive nevertheless and gained as the result of a determined rally in the last rounds.

In a struggle that was fast if not spectacular, punctuated by bruising clinches, Heeney emerged the victor because he was the aggressor all the way. Chunky Tom seldom gave handsome Jack a chance to get set for a knockout swing. Out boxed out smarted and out speeded by his rival, Heeney nevertheless kept charging in punishing Delaney severely about the body with an attack that was as persistent as it was damaging.

#### AL ESPINOSA WINS.

Bellevue, Fla., Mar. 1—Al Espinosa, of Chicago, won the Florida West Coast open golf tournament here yesterday with a score of 282 for the 72 holes of play. MacDonald Smith, New York pro., was second with 285; Wee Bobby Chickshank came in for third money with 287; Billy Burke, New York pro., was next with 288. The 282 of Espinosa was exceedingly low, the Chicago professional's play being exceptionally smooth, both at tee and green. Prizes aggregating \$2,500 went to the leaders.

Chicago, Mar. 1—The National Free cushion billiard tournament will be held in Chicago April 2-14, the National Billiard Association has announced.

Chicago, Mar. 1—The aid of the Illinois State Athletic Commission was pledged to Promoter Jim Mullen yesterday in his efforts to bring the lightweight championship match between Sammy Mandell and Jimmy McLarnin to Chicago.

If necessary, the commission will ask the National Boxing Association to use its authority to enforce the verbal promise given Mullen by McLarnin's manager before the McLarnin-Terris match in New York last week.

The commission at its weekly meeting adopted a resolution pointing out it held Mandell's signed contract and his \$5,000 forfeit to go through with bout. Also the commission feels Illinois entitled to the match. The governing body of boxing, which invited Promoter Rickard to bring the Dempsey-Tunney fight to Chicago last fall, referred to him in the resolution only as a "certain New York individual now engaged in a controversy with Promoter Mullen."

Mullen went to New York yesterday to see McLarnin and his manager "Pop" Foster, and Eddie Kline, Mandell's manager, went along to listen to Rickard's offer for the match. Mandell has already signed with Mullen, while McLarnin has signed with Rickard.

## NAT ROY ONE OF NOTED REINSMEN

Cleveland, March 1—Nat Ray, who led the country's reinsman in money earnings in 1926, is tutoring 16 trotters and pacers at the North Randall race track here for Grand Circuit hostilities.

Ray appears destined to enjoy another good season. Barring mishaps, he should have some formidable candidates for the big stakes.

Ray is particularly sweet on Daisy Grattan another one of those fast Grattan Royal pacers. This one has been timed in 2.01½ in a race and among other engagements is slated to go against the best sidewheelers in the country in the \$25,000 Page Dairy Pace at Toledo's second Grand Circuit meeting July 9-14 and the \$25,000 American Pacing Derby at Kalamazoo, Mich., July 16-21.

The remainder of his pacing division consists of Flying Direct 2.04½; The Girl, 2.04½; Royal Iroquois, C. Ray, Elizabeth R., Chilmat and Ruth Grattan.

For the two-year-old trotting futurities, Ray has a quartet in Precious Signal, Stout Signal, Gift and Margaret Brewer. The latter two are by the former Grand Circuit star, Peter the Brewer 2.02½ whom Ray campaigned.

He has one candidate for the \$60,000 Hambletonian three year old trotting stake the Kentucky Derby of the harness turf in Peter Reamore. This colt is the property of H. B. Rea of Valencia, Pa., for whom Ray swept the three year old trotting futurities on the Grand Circuit with Guy McKinney in 1926. Other three-year old trotters in the string are Nellie Signal who defeated Spencer leading money winning two year old trotter of 1927 at Toledo last year and Bay Lee. A promising four year old trotter is Peter Greatworth with whom Ray won over the ice at Toronto, Canada this winter.

Middletown, N. Y., March 1—Entries to the four Orange County Circuit half-mile track trotting meetings are listed to close Monday. The members of the circuit and scheduled dates are Endicott, N. Y., July 24-26; Elmira N. Y., July 31-Aug. 2; Goshen, N. Y., Aug. 7-9, and Middletown, N. Y., Aug. 14-16. Each has the following events carded: First day free-for-all trot \$2,000; 2.10 pace \$3,000; 2.21 trot, \$2,000; second day two year old trot, \$3,000; three year old trot \$3,000; 2.15 pace \$2,000; 2.16 trot, \$2,000; third day 2.11 trot, \$3,000; 2.26 trot \$2,000; 2.05 pace \$2,000.

Hanover, Pa. March 1—Two more foals, both fillies by the world fastest living trotting stallion Guy McKinney (4) 1.58½ have arrived at the Hanover Shoe Farms here. Their dams are Helen Dillon (2) 2.08½ and Michailowa 2.07. Another recent arrival is a chestnut filly by Azoff 2.14½, Sara Volo.

Urbana, O., March 1—Dr. Hugh M. Parshall, Urbana reinsman whose stable accounted for more races than any other last year, will try to bring the Guy Axworthy trotting stallion, Oliver Evans, back to the races this season. This horse has been serving as a progenitor for the last seven years and before his retirement because of an injury was considered a fast colt. One of his engagements is the \$7,500 Hotel Commodore Perry trot at Toledo's second Grand Circuit meeting, July 9-14.

Canton, March 1—A. L. Walter, who brought out the good pacer, Trampsmug 2.02½ which scored five straight victories on the Grand Circuit last year, has added the four-year-old trotting gelding, Bitter Sweet to his stable here. The addition is a son of Chestnut Peter (3) 2.05½ and Doven Lassie.

## BIG LEAGUE BALL TOSSERS COME TO TERMS

**Players Signing up Rapidly—Vance Still holds Out—Tony Lazzerri Not to Terms Yet—First Week Gone.**

New York, March 1—As the Spring training season gets under way the holdout season is drawing to a close. Nearly every day brings word of a few more players agreeing to terms with the clubs and several of the remaining holdouts have shown signs of coming around.

Brooklyn is still one of the worst sufferers and Dazzy Vance and Arnold Statz still reported unsigned still standing firm in his demands. Vance is working out daily with the Robins, and club officials say they expect to reach an agreement with him before long. Statz is still asking for an increased salary and a bonus for a .300 batting average which was a rarity last year in the Robin lineup. Waite Hoyt who has not yet signed with the Yankees is in Hot Springs getting into condition for the day he and Ed Barrow can agree. The only other Yankee holdout, Tony Lazzerri, is maintaining complete silence.

The Giants are still without the services of pitchers Vic Aldridge, recently acquired from Pittsburgh, and Jess Doyle in spite of Manager McGraw's ultimatums.

The Cincinnati Reds are also suffering seriously from the prevalent mania. Carl Mayes and Rube Bressler are still unsigned. Pete Donohue not only has refused the salary cut passed out all around but has intimated that he could find more pleasing surroundings somewhere outside of Cincinnati.

Cleveland has reduced its holdout list to one with the appearance of Luke Sewell who intimated that Brother Joe would soon be on hand to adjust any salary difficulties.

The St. Louis Cardinals and Washington have reduced the number of their holdouts to one each pitchers Flint Rhem and Sam Jones respectively. The signing of Sammy Hale allows the Athletics to equal the proud boast of the White Sox and Pirates that all of the names on their rosters likewise appear on contracts.

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
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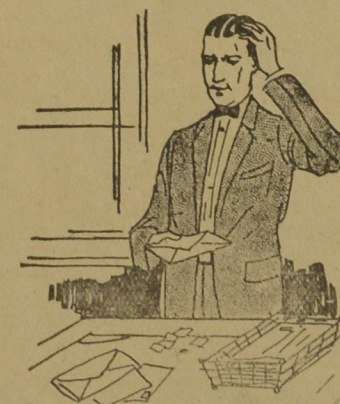

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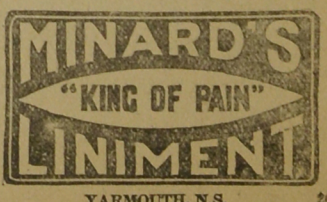
