SEVERAL HUNDRED PEOPLE PERISH IN THEATRE FIRE AT MADRID ON SUNDAY NIGHT

Madrid, Sept. 23—Several hundred persons are believed to have perished in a fire which broke out tonight during a performance in the Novedades Theatre. More than 200 injured are under treatment at hospitals and emergency stations.

The theatre was packed to the doors with a typical Sunday audience for a performance of "Lo Mejor Del Puerto," when, during a brief intermission, at 8.50 p. m., there was a great burst of flames on the stage.

The theatre holds 3,000 and the capacity audience rushed for the exits. The occupants of the stalls and boxes were able to leave before the flames spread into the auditorium but those in the galleries were less fortunate and the exits were soon choked with struggling masses.

The novedades is one of the oldest and largest theatres in Madrid. The flames spread with terrible rapidity through the wooden fittings.

Hundreds Trampled.

Hundreds of persons were trampled by those who pushed on from behind while others were suffocated and doubtless burned to death.

The interior of the theatre was soon

roaring with flames which then spread to adjacent buildings. The alarm quickly spread throughout the city and Premier Primo De Rivera and municipal authorities hastily followed the police and firemen who were already busy at the scene. Every available motor car was commanded to help remove the injured. A regiment of infantry from nearby barracks assisted in moving those hurt. All of the first aid stations in Madrid were quickly filled with injured, more than 20 of whom died. The number of bodies in the smoking ruins could not be learned but it was feared that hundreds had been unable to escape from the cheap seats in the upper tiers of the house. There had been many children in these balconies.

Such dense crowds were attracted by the billows of smoke and flames, that the police had great difficulty in controlling them in the neighborhood of the theatre.

Searchers found 25 bodies huddled together on one of the stairways. Others were seen in various parts of the theatre but it was impossible to count them in the semi-darkness lit only by torches carried by searching parties.

CIVILIAN GETS GAS MASKS FOR WAR USE

Budapest, Sept. 24—Hungary's entire civilian population is to be provided with gas masks. Former Premier Stephen Friedrich, who addressed Parliament on the dangers threatening Hungary as a marching ground for foreign armies, asked the war appropriations committee to set aside \$1,000,000 in the War Office estimates for the purchase of these defensive shields.

Stressing the decisive part which gas and chemicals will play in future wars, former Premier Friedrich, who is now a member of Parliament, said: "I believe in war, because mankind has no law which can check it. For hundreds of years Hungary has been devastated by wars, and the country's destiny places it among the warring nations of Europe. Sooner or later we shall be dragged into a war, and we must not leave our people unprotected."

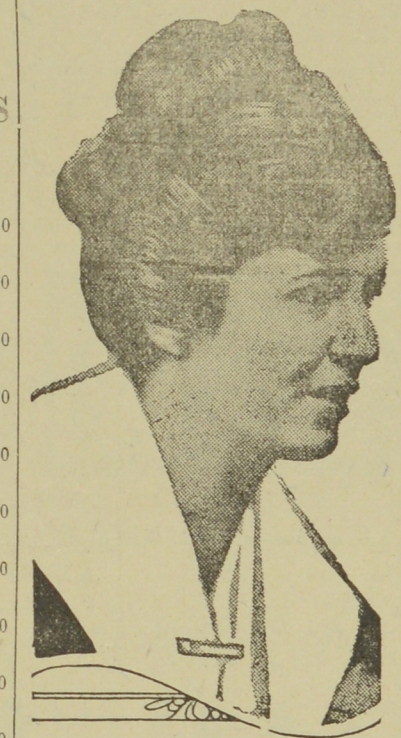

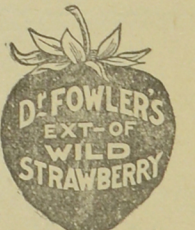
