VISITS HOMESTEAD.

At Hopewell Cape near the scene of his birthplace and surrounded by friends and acquaintances of his boyhood days, Hon. R. B. Bennett, M. P., leader of the Conservative party, yesterday commenced what promises to be a triumphant tour of the Maritime Provinces. Hon. Lewis Smith, Minister of Agriculture, presided and read an address of welcome to the Conservative chieftain, from his old friends and neighbors which deeply touched him. In his reply Hon. Mr. Bennett did not discuss party issues, but referred to the heavy responsibility which he had taken upon himself in the acceptance of the party leadership and promised to devote every effort towards the repayment of the great debt which he frankly acknowledged that he owes to the Dominion of Canada. He stressed the great importance of service and declared that people living in small communities had opportunities to aid Canada quite as great as those living in larger centres.

While the speech of the Conservative chieftain was non partizan it was deeply interesting and impressive and held the undivided attention of the two thousand people who listened to it.

A brief address by Miss Mildred Bennett, who is accompanying her brother on his tour was a very pleasing feature of the meeting.

Other speakers included Premier Baxter, Dr. Murray MacLaren and Thomas Bell, Federal members for St. John-Albert, Hon. Lewis Smith and C. J. Osman, M. P. While their remarks were brief all took occasion to extend words of welcome and encouragement to the Conservative chieftain and his accomplished sister. The people of Albert, irrespective of party are proud of their own "Dick" Bennett and look forward eagerly to the day when he will be called upon to fill the highest position in the government of Canada.

CHURCH AND STATE IN ITALY

"A circular has just been issued by the Vatican addressed to the bishops of Italy. In future these are to treat directly with the State in matters regarding education and the Azione Cattolica (the Catholic Youth Organization) and if difficulties or incidents should arise, says the circular, the bishops are to communicate direct with Signor Mussolini. Previously all relations between Church dignitaries and the State in Italy were referred to the Vatican, which then communicated with the Government. The circular marks a new attitude of the Fascist Government, which seems ready to co-operate with the Vatican and has extended various invitations which have culminated in the Vatican's circular.

The strained relations following upon the dissolution by Signor Mussolini of the Catholic Boy Scouts will thus be temporarily ameliorated, but it is interesting to note how undecided the position of the Fascist Government is through the circular. Unlike the Liberal Party in Italy, it does not aim at a solution of the Roman question, but rather at more familiar relations between Church and State. It is difficult at present to see how the Vatican can gain anything out of such a situation. The Liberal party in Italy has in part held the view that until Italy has an ambassador at the Vatican as other nations have, the position between Church and State will always be ambiguous."
