DEVELOPMENT OF PORT OF SAINT JOHN A DOMINION MATTER SAYS THE HON. R. B. BENNETT, K. C.

St. John, July 26—The Duncan Report never intended that the people of Saint John should develop their port; this was the obligation of the whole Dominion of Canada, in the opinion of Hon. R. B. Bennett, leader of the Conservative Party of Canada, who addressed a large dinner gathering in the Admiral Beatty Hotel here last night. Mr. Bennett declared that the Port of Saint John was administered by the people of Saint John on behalf of and for the benefit of the people of the whole Dominion, and therefore all Canada should make a contribution to its development. In the course of his address he enunciated the policy of his party as being one of development to the fullest of the natural resources of the country, and the utilization of all the means at hand to afford employment for the people of Canada and keep them from seeking a vocation elsewhere. He scored the policy of the present Government at Ottawa as one which was causing the production of an adverse trade balance quoting the figures for the three months ended June 30, as the basis for his argument. He appealed for a greater expansion of the agricultural possibilities of the country, pointing out that Canada was importing dairy and other products which might be produced within its own boundaries.

The dinner was given to Hon. Mr. Bennett and his sister, Miss Mildred Bennett by the Conservative Club of Saint John. Frank T. Lewis was in the chair, and seated with him at the head table were the guests of honor as well as Dr. Murray MacLaren and Thomas Bell, federal member for St. John-Albert, who proposed and seconded the toast to "Our Leader"; Premier J. B. M. Baxter, who responded to the toast to the Province of New Brunswick; Mayor W. W. White, who spoke the toast to the City of Saint John; Senator J. V. Daniel, and Mrs. W. W. White, who proposed a toast to Miss Bennett, to which the leader's sister graciously responded.

During the evening delightful vocal solos were given by Mrs. McKiel and A. C. Smith, Jr. More than 250 people, a large number of them ladies, were present, including members of the federal and provincial houses and their wives. Practically all the counties of the province were represented.

At noon the visitors were guests at a joint luncheon given by the Canadian Club and the Women's Canadian Club at Saint John, and in the afternoon a reception was held in the Pythian Castle where many attended to greet Hon. Mr. Bennett and Miss Bennett personally.

Democracy, which, he asserted, was yet in an experimental stage, its responsibilities and its present day dangers from sectionalism, appeals to prejudice, and voters apathy was the subject of an eloquent address by Hon. R. B. Bennett before the combined Canadian Clubs of this city on Wednesday afternoon, at the largest luncheon gathering of the organization ever held at the Admiral Beatty Hotel. More than 300 taxed the seating capacity of the spacious Georgian ballroom to its utmost.

Mr. Bennett opened his address by referring to the thoughts which came to him as he passed through the beautiful valleys of New Brunswick as he journeyed Wednesday from Moncton to Saint John and dwelt on how much this section of the Dominion had meant to Canada. He could not but feel that confidence of the fathers were finding expression in the work of the sons of today.

Foundations

The fathers had laid foundations with hope and confidence and the speaker felt quite certain the fathers and Canada will not be disappointed. The young people will develop the resources at their doors when the time comes.

Hon. Mr. Bennett before entering upon his address proper said he was aware that he must not use the Canadian Club to tread on controversial or political ground and for that reason found his choice of subjects necessarily limited.

He consequently would speak on something that might be found ap-

plicable in every part of Canada, namely Democracy.

Democracy in Canada, he said, was often talked of in very extraordinary terms. Party was but an instrument of democracy created for certain effects, the peace, prosperity and welfare of the citizen. Our democracy was a new thing, a more or less untried thing. No permanent trial was possible in half or a whole century.

Sometimes he thought that young people did not consider it as often as they should.

People looked for liberty, equality, fraternity, but no such thing as a pure democracy existed at present. The only pure democracy he could think of in the past was the Athenian. Ours is a representative democracy. Democracy and liberty were not synonymous and great historians have taught how different they are. Democracy was opposed to mechanical reapers and binders when first introduced and if democracy, represented by public condemnation, had prevailed those machines would not have come into use.

In the development of democracy there must be some curtailment of absolute individual liberty. The price of civilization was that every citizen yield his allegiance to the laws of the country. The speaker was not in favor of passive resistance. It was necessary to obey the laws of the country because they were the views of the majority. Whether people liked it or not, they must yield to their will.

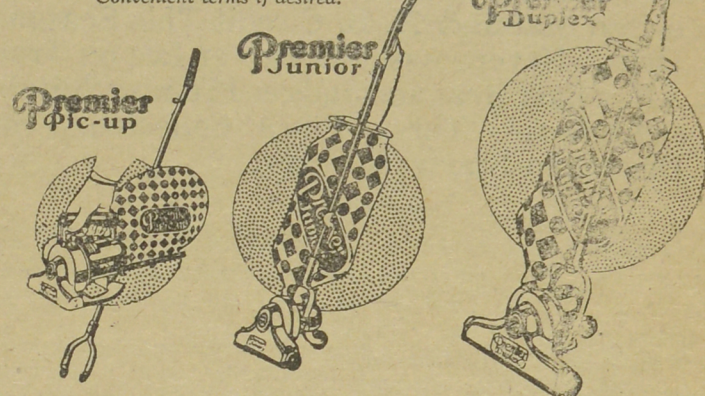

Plans and specifications can be seen and forms of tender obtained at the offices of the Chief Architect, Department of Public Works, Ottawa, Ont., the Resident Architect, Department of Public Works, 59 Victoria Street, Toronto, Ont., and the Superintendent, Department of Public Works, 196 St. Paul St. W., Montreal, P. Q.

Blue prints can be obtained at the office of the Chief Architect, Department of Public Works, by depositing an accepted bank cheque for the sum of \$100.00, payable to the order of the Minister of Public Works, which will be returned if the intending bidder submit a regular bid.

Tenders will not be considered unless made on the forms supplied by the Department and in accordance with the conditions set forth therein.

Each tender must be accompanied by an accepted cheque on a chartered bank payable to the order of the Minister of Public Works, for the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), which will be forfeited if the person tendering decline to enter into a contract when called upon to do so, or fail to complete the work contracted for. If the tender be not accepted the cheque will be returned. Bonds of the Dominion of Canada or bonds of the Canadian National Railway Company will also be accepted as security, or bonds and a cheque if required to make up an odd amount.

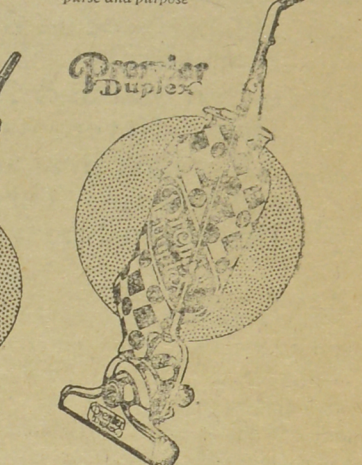
