

## MANUFACTURE OF RAYON IS HELD SHOCKING

Washington, Oct. 16—The manufacture of rayon proves to be a shocking business—electrically.

The textile division of the Department of Commerce reports that in knitting mills rayon yarns are found to have a tendency to take up static electricity generated by belting. This has been found not only bad for the nerves of the machine operators, but a handicap in the knitting of fancy designs.

Some mills are treating the yarns with oils which shunt or ground the static.

## OREGON DEMOCRATS HAVE VERY LITTLE HOPE OF CARRY- ING THE STATE FOR SMITH

Portland, Ore., Oct. 15—Herbert Hoover will carry this state in which he spent much of his boyhood, according to predictions even of many Democrats. They are conducting the fight for Governor Smith as best they can under the circumstances, but they already have written off Oregon's five electoral votes as a total loss.

They are slightly more optimistic about seven electoral votes of the state of Washington across the beautiful Columbia river. There the Democrats have a strong senatorial candidate in Dill, who is seeking re-election, and a strong candidate for governor, Scott Bullett, of Seattle, who is supported by many Republicans who are dissatisfied with the record of their nominee, Governor Hartley.

Most of those familiar with west coast politics feel Hoover will sweep the entire Pacific slope from San Diego to the Canadian line. Yet they do not believe he will equal the majorities of Harding and Coolidge. Governor Smith is expected to poll a tremendous vote in all three states, though practically no one in his honest moments believes it will be enough to save him.

### Dry Activities.

In Oregon, as in Washington, dry activity, religious feeling, west coast pride, and dependence upon tariff protection operate in Hoover's favor in addition to the fact that the Republican party is naturally the big majority party in this section. Also lumber, one of the great industries of both states, has taken hard bumps lately and interests affected by this slump feel in most cases that Hoover, with

his Pacific coast background, has a better understanding of their problem than a man who grew up in a city neighborhood where the nearest thing to a tree was a telephone pole.

Yet Hoover has not aroused the enthusiasm which might have been expected here in Oregon, where so many of his early associates were made. Portland has numerous classmates of Hoover, and at Salem are many who knew him as a boy. He left some sore spots in southern Oregon recently when he refused to permit political demonstrations on the fishing trip he took while in the west for his notification ceremony. Another reason is that Republicans are so cocksure they are not conducting as intensive a campaign as in more doubtful states.

Democrats got off to a bad start in Oregon. Former Governor Oswald West, one of the picturesque characters of the state, who can swear more in a minute than General Dawes did in a whole campaign, and who as governor put on a cowboy hat and personally went out and captured an escaped convict after other authorities showed symptoms of buck fever, was not recognized by the Democratic National Committee as promptly as he felt he should have been after his election as National Committeeman.

West won the election as National Committeeman in the Democratic primaries, but his predecessor held on for some time. West was strongly anti-Smith in the pre-convention fight but after finally recognized by the new Democratic National Committee after the convention, he pitched in to

do what he could for Smith in a state which has never gone Democratic except in 1912, when Wilson carried it by a plurality due to the Taft-Roosevelt split.

### Explains Stand.

West is an extreme dry and often has to explain his support of Smith.

"I'm going to stand by the Democratic party now just like I would stand by a drunken friend," West told the United Press. "I wouldn't go off and leave my best friend because he got drunk and I'm got going to leave the Democratic party because it has gone wet temporarily."

Hop growers, although not a large voting bloc, are the subject of a unique fight. Many are inclined toward Smith because he is wet. But it happens the Republican National Committeeman, Ralph Williams, is extensively interested in the hop business himself and while his partner is for Smith, Williams takes the position that the hop grower is better off now than he was before prohibition and that if Smith were elected, everybody would start growing hops and force down the price.

Oregon raises the choicest hops and due to the extensive homebrew activity which has grown up in the last few years, Oregon hop farmers are getting rich fast.

Oregon has a strong anti-Catholic trend which is not pronounced in this campaign largely because it is felt Hoover is not in danger in the state. Under strong Klan and Protestant pressure several years ago, Oregon passed a law requiring all children to attend public schools. The Supreme Court of the United States finally threw this law out as unconstitutional infringement upon private and parochial schools. Oregon is the originator of the direct primary, the initiative and referendum and the recall, the reforms advocated by progressives

15 years ago. But a new generation has grown up here. The militant political spirit of 1910 has softened and the dignified gentlemen who lounge leisurely in the comfortable Arlington Club—which seems a bit of the cultured Boston of William Dean Howells transplanted out here in the bustling west—are steering the state into a more conservative course.

## VICE REGAL PARTY ON A VISIT TO N. S.

Digby, N. S., Oct. 16—His Excellency Viscount Willingdon, Governor-General of Canada, arrived by car in Digby this morning coming from Annapolis Royal, where he spent Sunday. The vice-regal party were met by H. B. Short, M. P., Mayor T. E. G. Lynch, Town Clerk Alfred Boden, members of the town council and others. A visit was made to the Maritime Fish Corporation plant and the Governor-General, who is vitally interested in the fishing industry, expressed his delight with the facilities for handling fish.

After an inspection of the fish plant the distinguished guests spent the luncheon hour at the home of H. B. Short, M. P., leaving shortly after for Yarmouth. The party were accompanied by George E. Graham, General manager and vice-president of the Dominion Atlantic Railway.
