Woman and her Three Children Burned to Death in Chicago

Fire Destroyed Their Tiny Frame Cottage Early Today—Her Husband and Three Occupants of the House Were Rescued After Being Badly Burned—Element of Violence in Primary

Chicago, Ill., April 10—A mother and her three small children were burned to death when fire destroyed their tiny frame cottage here early today. The husband and father and three other occupants of the house were rescued from the burning cottage, suffering burns which hospital physicians said probably would prove fatal.

The dead were Mrs. Elizabeth Wittiger, 32. Lillie 3, Warren 2, and Margaret Wittiger 1.
