

# Answers to Enquiries in The Provincial Legislature

HON. MR. STEWART in reply to Mr. Dysart:

Q 1—What amount was expended during the past year in the several parishes and counties of the Province for so-called flood damages and to what accounts was same charged?

A—Roads, \$77,055.61 charged to ordinary road expenditure. Bridges, \$11,043.66, charged to ordinary bridge expenditure. Total \$88,099.27.

Q 2—Give names of supervisors under whose direction the work in question was performed and name roads where flood damage was repaired.

A—See attached statements. Names of the roads when expenditures was made not available as payrolls and accounts in connection with work are in charge of Public Accounts Committee.

More than 400 of these "never-works" have been seized by the Madrid police and sent back to the places of their birth, so that the streets of the capital will be comparatively clear for at least the time they need find their way back.

# SERIOUS FIRE AT MONCTON ON SUNDAY

Moncton, April 8—For two hours this morning, between two and four o'clock, the Moncton fire department fought a spectacular fire in a two-story double tenement, an unfinished building owned by James E. Weldon, on Cornhill street, and succeeded in preventing the fire spreading to any appreciable extent. A small occupied house near the burned building, also owned by Mr. Weldon, was badly burned.

The fire, which is believed by the owner of the buildings to have been of incendiary origin, completely destroyed the double tenement while more or less damage was done to several houses in close proximity.

Mr. Weldon estimated his loss at \$4,000 over and above \$1,000 insurance carried on the smaller building. The total loss will probably amount to about \$7,000 or \$8,000.

London, April 9—Mrs. Stanley Baldwin, wife of England's premier, has won considerable fame in diplomatic circles for her artistic taste, as shown in the Downing street suite of rooms, where the ceremony of receiving the great political and social persons of the world is held. The decorations and appointments of the suite have made it known throughout the world. Mrs. Baldwin is chiefly responsible for the exquisite beauty of the suite.

## Fresh Flowers Daily

The drawing room is marvelously paneled in old oak and filled with comfortable chair and settees, and many guests could sit about chatting without crowding the salon. Mrs. Baldwin is passionately fond of flowers in season from the country estate of the premier at Chequers, which are arranged by the chateleine.

Passing from the drawing room, the guest goes through a beautiful dining hall, where the drapings and carpets are apple green, and six old oak, heavily carved buffets are loaded with priceless Wedgewood service, which is used constantly. The banquet hall is next, and here on a marvelous old oak refectory table is served what the British call "high tea"—sandwiches, salads, sweets and tea and frequently the toasted scones with marmalade.

## Wealth of Curios

Various ladies in the political circle aid Mrs. Baldwin, and all who call sit on the broad settee beside their hostess, and have a leisurely chat just as long as she desires, when they are taken in charge by an aid, and shown the handsome portraits of all British prime ministers, if they are strangers, or the wealth of curios which fill this ancient dwelling. The reception is held weekly and lasts three hours.

# CHURCH BARS FINERY, MEN TO WEAR OVERALLS

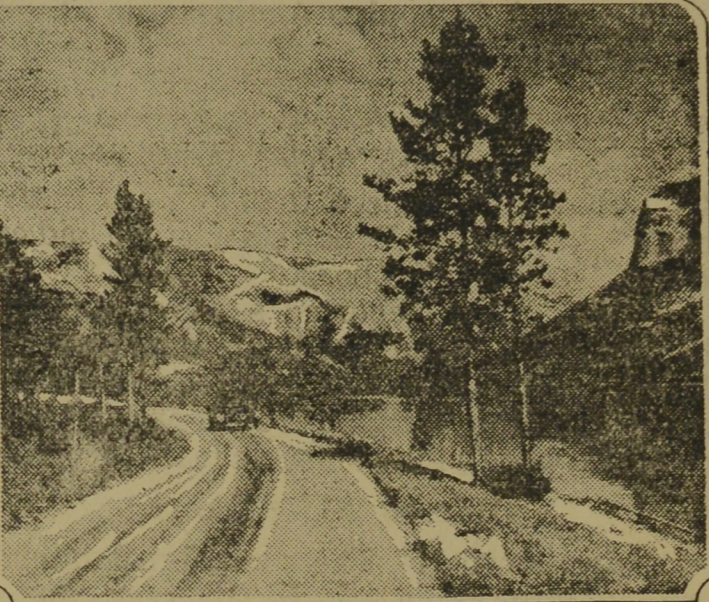
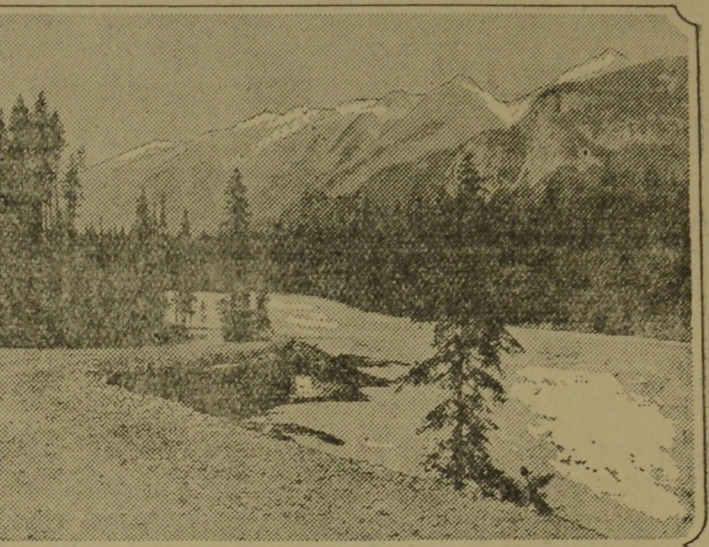
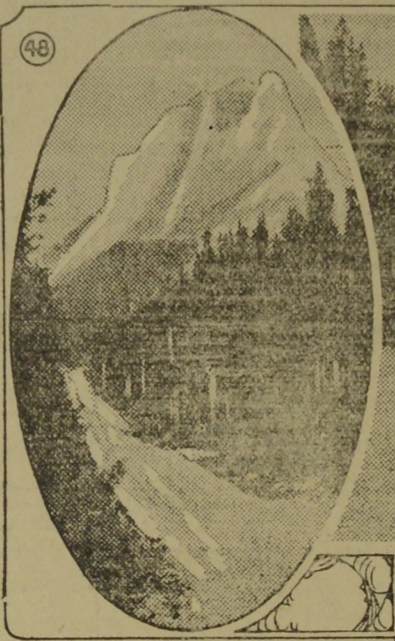

# Mountains Splendor Open to Motorists



A new 24-hour motor detour of 142 miles along perfect motor roads through the Canadian Rockies is announced by the Canadian Pacific Railway, which states that the trips will run every day in each direction from either Banff, Alta., or Golden, B.C., beginning on June 15 and ending on September 5. By this detour a traveler can leave the train either at Banff or Golden, stay the night at Lake Louise, and continue the motor drive next morning, rejoining the train that afternoon.

This new motor road, built by the Canadian Government through Rocky Mountain, National Park and Yoho National Park, is a very magnificent one. At one point it rises to a height over a mile above sea level, while at the highest point it is nearly three-quarters of a mile higher than at its lowest level. Nearly forty mountains tower in the vicinity of the road, and gigantic glaciers, roaring rivers, deep canyons and primeval forests abound. Wild mountain game are also met with in abundance at the roadside.

Motoring in the Canadian Rockies is the tourist's keenest delight, more especially after a railway journey. For this reason a schedule has been drawn up for the season of 1928, to coincide with the arrival and departure of trains at Banff, Field or Golden.


The large touring cars used for this trip are commodious and comfortable, with facilities for hand baggage. Johnston's Canyon, 16 miles from Banff, is the first stop made going west. Here the creek

Cuts through high rock walls and is spanned at intervals by tiny rustic bridges, reminders of Japanese prints. The canyon is deep and cool, and the walk of 30 minutes is delightful.

Lovers of nature should rise early at Lake Louise to see the coloring on this gem of mountain lakes, for the glaciers and high peaks are diffused with superb shades of rose and gold. A beautiful spot on this trip is Wapta Bungalow Camp, a veritable village of camps nestling on the shore of Wapta Lake—the source of the Kicking Horse River.

The Yoho Valley is beautiful beyond imagination, a virgin country unscarred by fires. Takakaw Falls are at the end of the valley and come tumbling down in a lacy pattern almost 1,500 feet. The Yoho Camp is a few hundred yards away. Emerald Lake, seven miles from Field, is a vision of sylvan loveliness, and a Swiss chalet adds to its attractiveness. From Field to Golden the highway follows the Kicking Horse River most of the way and the scenery is spectacular, the road hugging the mountain-side, with the river 700 feet below.

## Special Protection for Roads During Early Spring

### Warning to Drivers of Motor Vehicles and Heavily Loaded Teams

The new Brunswick Highway Act contains provisions to prevent damage to road surfaces and road foundations during the spring months. All who have to do with the operation of motor vehicles or teams on the highways should be familiar with the law.

It is provided that on all highways outside cities and towns:

No person shall operate a motor vehicle between the 15th day of March and the 20th day of May, without the permission of the Chief Highway Engineer or District Highway Engineers; or unless permission for the use of highways is given by the Department of Public Works, notice of which will be published.

This restriction does not apply to medical practitioners, nurses or clergymen in pursuit of their profession, or to the driver of an ambulance attached to the service of any hospital or police department.

It is also provided:

No vehicle carrying a load weighing more than 3,000 lbs., no portable mill on wheels, no log hauler, or tractor engine shall be operated upon the highways between the above dates without a written permission from the Supervisor of the road division.

The penalty for violation of either of these provisions is a fine not exceeding \$50.00. Highway Traffic Officers and the Provincial Police have been directed to be especially vigilant in apprehending all who disobey.

The Department of Public Works desires to impress upon automobile, truck and team drivers the provisions of the law and the penalties provided. It seeks their co-operation in an observation of provisions so greatly in the public interest. New Brunswick has an investment of over \$16,000,000 in roads and an annual maintenance bill of \$600,000. This investment must be protected.
