GRAND CIRCUIT KALAMAZOO MEET DRAWS BIG ENTRY

Kalamazoo, Mich., April 9—The \$10,000 Exchange Club trot, long a feature at the annual Grand Circuit meeting here, drew an entry of 31 performers, W. P. Engleman, race secretary, announced. The race is the secondary feature on the big time program scheduled the week of July 16th. The headliner again is the \$25,000 American Pacing Derby.

Eleven states are represented in the Exchange Club nominations. Ohio leads with 10 entries. New York and Illinois each has five. Then follow Kentucky, Indiana and Michigan, two and Oklahoma, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Georgia one.

The other Kalamazoo stakes also attracted good entries. The \$3,000 2.06 trot drew 12 of the fastest trotters in the country in Pavonian, Mayworth, Doane, Guy Ozark, Hollyrood Susan, Jerita, Kahla Dillon, Minna Dillon, Nescopec, Thompson Dillon, Trumpet and Wellworthy. The \$2,000 2.15 pace and the \$2,000 2.20 trot obtained more entries than any of the others, drawing 44 and 43 respectively.

Twenty-eight juveniles were entered in the two year old trot and 35 steppers in the three-year-old division. Other stakes and entries received for each are \$2,000 2.15 trot, \$3; there year old pace, 28; \$3,000 2.08 pace, 22 and \$2,000 2.05, 20.

4 YEAR OLD TO START.

Tulsa, Okla., April 9—G. S. Davis of this city will introduce the four-year old trotter, Betty Ann Maxey to the high society of racing this year, having named her in the \$10,000 trot at Kalamazoo, Mich. and other events in the East. Last year at three, Betty won six of her seven starts on western half mile tracks and took her record of 2.09 1/4 in the second heat of a winning race at Aurora, Neb. Bi Shively will train and drive her.

FOUR CANADIAN HORSES ENTERED IN U. S. STAKES

Indianapolis, April 9—A total of 41 juveniles has been kept eligible to the F. P. Fox two year old pacing stake, which will be raced at the Grand Circuit meeting here, Sept. 3-8. This is the richest event for age and gait in the world. Twelve states and Canada are represented in the nominations. Here's the list:

Illinois 11, Indiana 8, Ohio 7, Wisconsin, Michigan, Pennsylvania, Oklahoma and Tennessee 2, Texas Mississippi, Georgia, Connecticut and Canada 1.

Four pacers, three Canadian steppers have been named in all three of the \$25,000 pacing stakes to be contested on United States courses this year. They are Captain Grattan and Maud Grattan, owned by Robert Trench, Teeswater, Ont., Grattan Bars, the property of Fred Thrower, Kerwood, Ont., and Peter McKinney, who belongs to W. R. Neill, Memphis, Tenn. The events are the New England Derby at Windsor, Conn. July 9; Page Dairy at Toledo, July 9-14 and American Derby at Kalamazoo, Mich., July 17.

BIG LEAGUE SEASON OPENS

Washington, April 10—Opening the American League's 1928 campaign a day ahead of the other entries, Washington and Boston will play here tomorrow with President Coolidge in the grandstand. Mr. Coolidge will do the usual tossing of the ball on the ball ground aiming at Clarence Owens, umpire in chief for the opening ceremony.

Vice-President Dawes, Speaker Longworth, members of the cabinet and other officials are expected to be among the spectators for part of the game at least.

RANGERS AND MAROONS CLASH TONIGHT IN 3RD

Montreal, April 10—Miller, newly acquired goalie, down from his home in Ottawa, will go through a light practice with the New York team tomorrow morning to fit himself as far as possible into the system of the champions of the United States section.

Decision to use the Ottawa athletic in the Ranger net for the balance of the series was reached at a meeting today between leaders of the two contending clubs and President Frank Calder of the N. H. L. In Miller the Rangers obtain for the remainder of the finals a goalie who is fairly conversant with the team's system, Miller having played the first half of the N. H. L. campaign in goal for the New York Americans. He was later sent to Niagara Falls by the Americans but Boston claimed that they had not waived on the goalie and he was placed on the Boston list, Miller, however being allowed to remain at Niagara Falls, but on the understanding that he would be available as a relief goal keeper in the N. H. L. if his services were required.

Miller a hockey, rugby and baseball star in his amateur days in Ottawa is regarded as a smart goal-keeper.

BEAU DILLON GOOD.

Topsfield, Mass., April 9—Beau Dillon, the fast Dillon Axworthy gelding that won all his 13 starts last year, will be the main dependence of the Jack Kingsley stable in the big pacing stakes in the Bay State and Orange County circuits this season. His biggest engagement is in the \$25,000 New England Derby at Windsor, Conn., July 4.

HOOF PRINTS

Topeka, Kas., April 9—W. B. Taylor, noted western reinsman, has made the Kansas Free Fair track here his permanent training headquarters. He formerly was located at Smithville, Mo. Taylor is busily tutoring 30 head including the good trotters, The Ultimate, 2.07 1/4, and Spud McCann 2.09 1/4.

The country's star pacers will have three \$25,000 stakes to shoot at this summer. By a strange coincidence, these events come in consecutive weeks. On July 4th, they'll go to the post in the New England Derby at Windsor, Conn. The week of July 9th, the Page Dairy will be contested at Toledo. July 17th is the date set for the American Derby at Kalamazoo, Mich.

Indianapolis, April 9—W. C. Bratton of New Ross, Ind. sold the fast pacing mare, Elizabeth Direct to Edwith Mathewson of Bridgeport, Conn. for a reported price of \$2,500. Elizabeth Direct will continue in the stable of the Indiana reinsman, Fred Swaim, who raced her last year.

A LANDLORD SEEKS RENT FOR SKY PLANES' USE

Berlin, April 9—Rent for the air through which the Luftansa airplanes fly on their regular service route was a new scheme devised by Samuel Schwartz, the owner of a house in Zehnden, near Berlin.

The daily flight of the planes above his house inspired Schwartz to seek means of turning the latest traffic innovation into profit. He unearthed a moldy paragraph of the German real estate law reading: "The right of a property extend to the space above and the ground beneath his property." On the strength of this Herr Swartz wrote the Luftansa demanding settlement of the current and past rental. In a courteous letter the Luftansa called the claimant's attention to paragraph 1 of the air traffic law entitling airplanes and airships to a free passage through the air in so far as they conformed with the existing air traffic regulations, and also to paragraph 905, rebutting the one he had quoted: "A real estate owner is not entitled to prohibit the approach to his property from above or below at a height or depth not conflicting with his interests."
