HOUSE BURNED TO GROUND BUT CHILDREN SAVED

Home of Charles Sarr, Glencoe, was Literally Swallowed by Flames Tuesday Morning — Started From Stove.

A large house, valued quite highly and belonging to Charles Sarr of Glencoe, near Nashwaak Village, was burned to the ground on Tuesday in the early hours of the morning. With the exception of an organ, which was pulled out by the farm hands, practically nothing was left in the wake of the raging flames. Five small children were the only occupants of the house at the time of the fire. The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Sarr were away but luckily the children were awake and able to make their way out of the house unaided.

Started From Stove.

It is assumed that the fire started from one of the stoves. The workmen around the farm had lighted the fires about six o'clock in the morning and had left the house to go about their morning tasks. One of the hands chanced to come back to the house and found the dining room in flames. The children had already discovered the presence of fire and had made

Oaths of Allegiance taken at Resumption of Appeal Court This Morning — New Crown Case Taken Up

The Appeal Division of the Supreme Court resumed this morning after having adjourned from Tuesday, taking up the action of the King vs Beliveau and Cormier, ex parte LeBlanc a case which had been added to the Crown paper at the first of the week. The court was presided over by Chief Justice Sir Douglas Hazen, and Justices Grimmer and Crockett. The last named, Justice Crockett, sat in place of Justice White who was unable to attend on account of illness.

Four Attorneys Admitted.

Previous to the regular work of the work, four attorneys were admitted before the court. They were Kenneth Borden Palmer, Russell Robertson Sheldrick, Mariner Gerald Teed and George W. MacDonald. P. J. Hughes, K. C., upon recommendation of Council of Barristers' Society moved for the admission of the above named as attorneys of this court. The oaths of allegiance and of attorneys was administered by the Registrar on order.

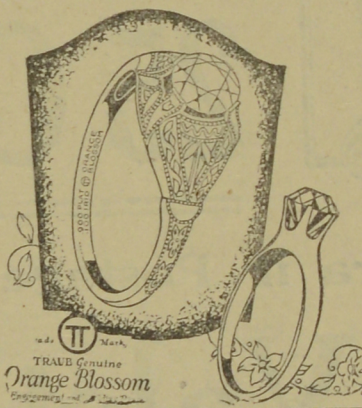
