





# Midweek Market

The spell of wet weather which prevailed this morning for about half an hour did not scatter the farmers who had come in for the midweek market at Phoenix Square and there were a quite a large number of teams present. Produce was plentiful with apples being the chief seller. The price of apples was \$2 per barrel. Potatoes also were on hand and were bought for \$1.50 per barrell. Butter and eggs again were high and sold for 45 cents and 50 cents respectively. Other prices were as follows: veal 12 to 19 cents Ib; Lamb, 20 and 28 cents; squash 3 cents per pound; pumpkin 2 cents per pound; tomatoes (green) 25 cents per peck; fowl 30 cents per pound; carrots 5 cents per bunch; beets 5 cents per bunch; cabbage 10 cents apiece.
