## THE WALKING STICK IS NOW GOING INTO THE DISCARD

The walking stick, so long the symbol of the Englishman at home or abroad, apparently is doomed to pass into the limbo of forgotten things—or discarded things. A writer in the London Daily Express, after relating how thousands of walking sticks are annually left in trains and street cars by absent-minded travelers, later to be sold at auction with other unclaimed articles, declares the day of the cane has passed. He writes:

"A walking stick, I suspect, hates to be the despised appanage of a generation which never walks at all. The heart of a walking stick is broken as soon as it is born. It sobs like the two lonely buttons on the back of the tail-coat that once gloried in the pride of the sword belt."

"The walking stick is as old as the first trees in the first wood. It is the ancestor of the battle-axe, the mace, the spear, the lance, the quarter staff, the single stick and the sword."

### Genesis of the Walking Stick

"The first walking stick was a branch wielded by the ape-like man or the man-like ape in self-defense. Its evolution through the ages is a theme worthy of Hazlett of Lamb or Beachcomber. Many volumes might be written about famous cudgels and celebrated bludgeons."

"At least one volume would be dedicated to the Irish Shillelagh. My first walking stick was a blackthorn which my father cut for me out of a hedge in County Down. 'James,' he said to me, as we trudged along a country lane, 'would you like a black-thorn stick?'"

"It was my first glimpse of manhood, and I was naturally raised to a state of ecstasy."

"Then came the memorial summer day when my father showed me my own blackthorn growing in a hedge. I begged him to cut it for me at once. 'No, James,' he said, with a whimsical smile, 'it will not be ready to cut till Christmas.'"

### Cut on Christmas Day

"I marveled at the mystery of my blackthorn that was being fattened for me like a turkey. I trembled lest it should be discovered by some miscre-

ant prowling about in quest of tall, straight blackthorns with tapering grace and symmetrical knobs or blobs and the proper culminating root or head."

"At least once a week we stealthily stole a glance at it, and always my small heart throbbed with delight in knowing that it was safe and secret. My father cut the blackthorn for me on Christmas day and dressed it for me with the skill of a craftsman. No more sally rods for me I was a man at last."

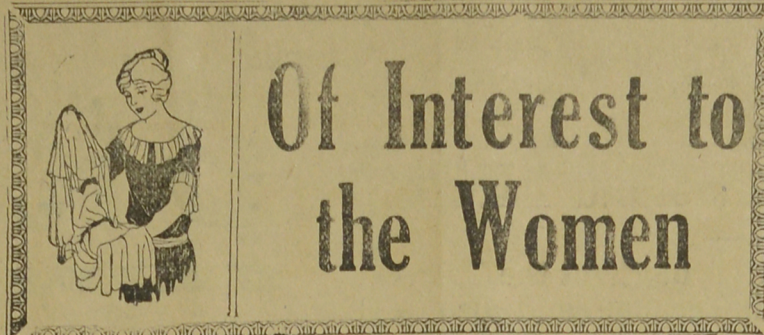
"Alas! We walk no more, and the walking stick is a dandisical ornament. It is anachronistic in this age that despises Shank's mare. We are not worthy of its high comradeship and friendship. We are degenerates who have lost the noble art of walking."

"Let us relegate the walking stick to the limbo of forfeited joys and desecrated nobilities. Let us abandon the pretense of being tramps or pilgrims or drovers of shepherds. A race that loses thousands of walking sticks every year will soon forget how to use its legs."

## NINETY NINE POSTMASTERS IN N. B. FIRED

Ottawa, Feb. 27—From Oct. 1, 1926 to Feb. 1 1928 a total of 421 postmasters were dismissed throughout Canada. This was the answer given by the postmaster general, Hon. Peter Veniot to J. C. Brady (Conservative, Skeena, B. C.) in the House of Commons this afternoon. Of this number the province of Quebec contributed the largest proportion accounting for 122 dismissals. Nova Scotia came next with 106, New Brunswick was third in line with 99 and Prince Edward Island had one.

### HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

A mother of our, Mrs. A. H. M. says she must make things "stretch" and contributes some of her economies she writes 'For the baby in short clothes I buy long dresses and cut skirt in half finishing top of bottom half with a yoke and the bottom of top half with a bit of lace. Thus I get two dresses for the price of one and a little work. From the ends of knit shirts I make petticoats for the little girl finishing the bottom of the skirt with a little embroidery or a band of goods matching the dress with which it is to be worn.'

Mrs. A. W. says that she makes her rugs look like new by rubbing them with a cloth wrung out of water in which mild soap flakes have been dissolved. She adds the flakes while the water is hot and when it is cool adds a little ammonia. The rugs must be thoroughly dry before they are walked on.

Miss M. B. D. made her mother a kitchen set from coffee cans and taller ones from the drug or candy stores. She says they cost only 30 cents and a little fun. She writes "I bought a card of lid knobs for five cents placed them on the lids. Then enameled the cans to match the kitchen cabinet and labeled them coffee, tea, etc."

### CONTRIBUTED RECIPES

A way to use left overs is contributed by Mrs. H. G. in a recipe which she names "Hot Pie". She writes "When I find there is not enough left over roast for supper I cut what there is in small pieces put in a dish and add 1 onion cut up fine. Next I add a layer of canned tomatoes then a few strips of bacon and a few sliced potatoes then any left over gravy and season with salt and pepper. Place pie crust over the top and bake until the potatoes are done and the crust is nicely browned."

"I seldom throw away orange peel" writes Mrs. C. G. F. "but cut it in strips and soak. Then drain and cook until tender in a little water. Next I make a sugar syrup and cook the peel in it until candied. This is delicious to add to loaf cakes or use as candy."

Mrs. W. S. makes Graham Cracker Delights from graham crackers spread with an ordinary cake frosting. She spreads the frosting of any desired flavor on one cracker and places another on top making a graham cracker sandwich to which her children are very partial.

The two recipes for hamburger which follow were contributed by Mrs. H. G.:

Hamburger: Mix hamburger with onions, salt and pepper. Boil cabbage until tender and wrap hamburger in cabbage leaves and pin with toothpicks and fry in grease. When browned well and water and let parboil until tender. Make gravy by adding flour and water. I usually serve mashed potatoes with this.

Hamburger Loaf—Mix hamburger with onions, salt and pepper, spread with onions, salt and pepper spread half in bottom of buttered casserole. Boil eggs until hard, shell, and slice on top hamburger. Add rest of hamburger and bake in oven.

### BAKED BANANA.

Put six bananas cut into halves lengthwise and place in shallow baking dish. Blend 1 tablespoon sugar 2 tablespoons melted butter and 2 tablespoons lemon juice. Pour half this mixture over bananas using rest for basting. Bake in a slow oven 30 minutes until tender. Just before removing cover with 25 marshmallows brush with butter and brown. Serve at once.

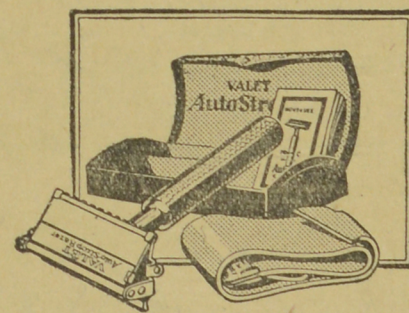
